


(REPAIRS) Many of the buildings, classrooms, science labs, and job training equipment in the Riverside Community College District are deteriorating and outdated. This measure will address urgent, basic and future repair needs such as removing asbestos, mold and lead paint; upgrading outdated electrical wiring and gas and sewer lines; fixing leaky roofs; and improving earthquake safety to make sure all students learn in classrooms that are clean and safe.








Student Headcount

Enrollment Trend as of 8/13/24








