Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) 2024-2025 For Transfer to CSU and UC

Completion of the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) will permit a student to transfer from a community college to a campus in either the California State University (CSU) or University of California (UC) system without the need to take additional lower-division general education courses. For certain majors at some of the UC campuses it may be more advantageous to complete a campus-specific general education pattern. IGETC certification is valid for community college transfer students only. Those who have already transferred to the CSU/UC systems may under some circumstances return to Norco College to complete IGETC requirements. A course can only be certified if it was approved for IGETC when it was taken. This is the approved list for courses taken Fall 2024 through Summer 2025. See www.assist.org for prior years.

Note: Riverside City College and Moreno Valley College are separate colleges and the courses that are approved for IGETC may vary. Students who wish to take courses at another institution and apply them towards IGETC should always first consult with a counselor to make sure the course will fulfill the intended requirement.

Note: Norco College's POL-1/1H or ETS/POL-21 fulfills the CSU graduation requirement in both U.S. government and California state and local government. Students who have completed ETS/POL-23, or who have received a score of 3 or higher on the AP U.S. Government and Politics exam, or who have taken a U.S. government class at an out-of-state institution may have fulfilled the U.S. government requirement but will still need to fulfill the California state and local government in order to graduate from the CSU.

IGETC Advisement: Former UC, CSU and students with coursework from other four-year institutions, including outside the U.S., should consult with a counselor to determine whether they should complete IGETC or the lower-division general education requirements at the campus they plan to attend.

For the UC: Students who initially enroll at a UC campus, then leave and attend a California Community College, and subsequently return to the same UC campus, are considered "re-admits" by the UC. Such students cannot use IGETC. However, students who enroll at a UC campus, then leave and attend a California Community College, and subsequently return to a different UC campus may use the IGETC pattern. It is recommended that students meet with a counselor to discuss possible further IGETC limitations.

Notes:

- 1. Courses cannot be double-counted to satisfy more than one area, even if a course is listed in more than one area. The only exceptions to this are several courses in Area 6A Language Other Than English, which can also be counted towards area 3B.
- 2. ** UC limits transfer credit for some courses. Students may review the UC Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) with a counselor for information on course limitations.
- 3. A grade of "P" in approved coursework taken as Pass/No Pass through RCCD is acceptable for IGETC certification. It is important to keep in mind that some CSU and UC campuses may have limitations on the number of "Credit/No Credit" ("Pass/No Pass") courses that may be used to meet degree requirements. The UC system allows a maximum of 14 semester units graded "Pass/No Pass" (Credit/No Credit) basis of the 60 transferable semester units required for admission. There is no system-wide policy for CSU campuses. Therefore, each campus has established its own policy on limitations of courses transferred with grades of "Credit/Pass".
- 4. Some of the UC campuses do not accept or recommend IGETC for certain majors, (i.e. Engineering, Sciences). Students should consult with a counselor to determine the most appropriate general education pattern for their major and intended transfer institution. - 5. IGETC area 7 is effective for students beginning at a CCC in fall 2023 and beyond. Students with continuous enrollment prior to fall 2023 may choose to complete the pre-fall 23 IGETC pattern without Area 7 and with 9 units from at least two different disciplines completed in Area 4.
- 6. There may be transfer limitations on certain types of credits please consult with a counselor to discuss any such limitations.
- 7. It is highly recommended to make an appointment with a counselor to complete a student educational plan (SEP).

IGETC for **STEM** - Students pursuing certain Associate Degrees for Transfer may be eligible to complete IGETC for STEM, deferring two to three lower-division GE courses until after transfer. IGETC for STEM is applicable only to majors in which the Transfer Model Curriculum explicitly indicates the availability of the option. **At Norco College, currently only ADT's in Biology, Chemistry, and Environmental Science allow IGETC for STEM.**

CSU GE for STEM is applicable only to majors in which the Transfer Model Curriculum explicitly indicates the availability of the option. **At Norco College, currently only the ADT in Biology allows CSU GE for STEM.**

"CSU GE Breadth for STEM" certification as part of an Associate Degree for Transfer in Biology would require that the student has completed:

- a. All courses in Areas A, B, E and F of the traditional GE Breadth curriculum; and
- b. One course in Area C1 Arts and one course in Area C2 Humanities; and
- c. One course in Area D

Graduation Requirements

The governing board of Riverside Community College District shall confer the associate degree or certificate of achievement upon the student who has completed the following requirements:

Residence Requirement

For an associate degree, students must complete 12 units in residence within the District.

For a certificate of achievement, students must complete 50% of the certificate's coursework at any of the colleges within the Riverside Community College District with 1 course completed at the college awarding the certificate.

For an apprenticeship certificate, registered apprentices must complete at least two terms of an approved registered apprenticeship program at Riverside Community College District, with a grade of "C" or better.

Grade Point Average Requirement

Completion of the requirements for the associate degree with a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.0 in the degree-applicable courses. If units accumulated beyond those required for the degree lower a student's cumulative grade point average below 2.0, RCCD may compute the grade point average based solely on those courses used to satisfy the degree requirements, provided that the coursework used to compute the grade point average fulfill all major/area of emphasis and general education requirements.

If coursework is applied towards degree requirements from an institution using a "+/-" grading scale, the original grade points assigned by that institution as indicated on the transcript will be used to calculate the cumulative grade point average. Honors for graduation will be calculated in the same manner.

Each course in the associate degree's major requirements must be completed with a grade of "C" or better or a "P" if the course is taken on a "pass-no pass" basis.

Each course in a certificate of achievement must be completed with a grade of "C" or better or a "P" if the course is taken on a "pass-no pass" basis.

Unit Requirement

Associate of Arts and Associate of Science degrees require a minimum of 60 units of degree applicable coursework. Associate Degrees for Transfer (ADTs) require 60 units of CSU or UC transferable coursework.

Some courses are considered "non-degree applicable" and do not count towards the 60 unit minimum. For a listing of non-degree applicable courses and to see which courses are CSU-transferable, please see the Courses section of the catalog.

Catalog Rights

Graduation requirements apply to students who are enrolled for any term (summer, fall, winter, spring) indicated by this catalog: summer 2024 through spring 2025. Students who enrolled prior to this current year and who have maintained continuous enrollment have the option of meeting the current requirements or those in effect at the time their continuous enrollment began. Continuous enrollment is defined as attendance of one term during each academic year.

5. Academic Coursework Taken at Other Colleges and Universities

Transcripts from other accredited institutions, submitted as official documentation of a student's record, must be printed no more than 90 days/three months ago, be in a sealed envelope from the institution and be submitted to the Admissions & Records office at the student's home college. Course credit is accepted from institutionallyaccredited institutions. Credit from institutions which are in candidacy status will be accepted after full accreditation is granted. The two years preceding full accreditation will also be applicable towards an associate degree.

6. Petition for Graduation

Students may apply for degrees and certificates during the following application periods:

Summer: First day of Summer term through July 15 to graduate in Summer

Fall: First day of Fall term through October 15 to graduate in Fall

Winter: First day of Winter term through February 1 to graduate in Winter or Spring

Spring: First day of Spring term through April 1 to graduate in Spring

Students who want to participate in the commencement ceremony must file their application by April 1 and may be missing no more than nine units to graduate. Students may earn more than one degree at the college.

Certificate and Associate Degree Applications

Students will need to log into their MyPortal/WebAdvisor account online and choose Degree Application or Certificate Application from the Students Menu in order to apply for their degree/certificate. All official college transcripts or verifying documents must be on file with Norco College in order for the Evaluation/Graduation office to review applications and determine eligibility. A graduation check with a counselor is recommended before applying.

7. General Education Requirements

General Education is designed to introduce students to a breadth of study through which people comprehend the modern world. It reflects the conviction of Riverside Community College District that those who receive their degree must possess in common certain basic principles, concepts, and methodologies both unique to and shared by the various disciplines.

Students who have been awarded a bachelor's degree from an institutionally-accredited institution in the United States will be exempt from the general education requirements should they pursue an Associate of Arts or Science degree at one of the District's colleges. This does not apply to ADT's.

Students pursuing an associate degree must complete either the RCCD GE, CSU GE, or IGETC general education pattern:

<u>Plan A</u>: The RCCD general education pattern which requires a minimum of 24 units. (See page 3 of this document)

<u>Plan B:</u> The California State University General Education (CSUGE) pattern which requires completion of a minimum of 39 units. (See CSU GE Pattern, separate handout)

<u>Plan C</u>: The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) pattern which requires completion of a minimum of 34 (UC) or 37 (CSU) units. (See IGETC Pattern, separate handout)

Students should see a counselor for advice in selecting the general education plan that will best match their educational and career goal.

Scholastic Honors at Commencement

Honors at commencement will be awarded to students with a cumulative GPA of 3.30 or higher. Their names are listed in the commencement program as receiving the Associate Degree with Distinction (3.30 GPA) or with Great Distinction (3.70 GPA). A gold tassel will be worn by students graduating with honors. Coursework taken during the final spring semester will not be used to calculate honors at commencement. Grade point averages are not rounded up. If coursework taken at one or more accredited colleges is used to satisfy degree requirements, the overall cumulative grade point average will include the combination of all grades from all transcripts used.

Dean's List

Each semester, those students who have demonstrated outstanding scholastic achievement by completing at least 12 units of credit-graded work in one semester or 12 units of credit-graded work earned in no more than one academic year (fall, winter and spring, with summer being excluded) with a grade point average of 3.0 or better (completed units will be considered only once for a particular Dean's List) will be recognized by a letter from the Dean of Instruction.

Transfer Limitations

Students who wish to transfer are encouraged to complete an associate degree prior to transfer. Transfer requirements are different than associate degree requirements. There may be transfer limitations of credits based on institutional accreditation, course modality, AP/IB, CLEP and other forms of Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) and any other relevant factors - please consult with a counselor to discuss any such limitations.
