Call 1166': The COVID-19 helpline center in Pakistan

- Originally set up for parents and caregivers to get support and information about polio and other vaccines supported by UNICEF and partners, the helpline is now being inundated with tens of thousands of calls every day about the coronavirus disease (COVID-19).
- 250 call agents currently staffing the helpline which operates in shifts, from 8:00 am to midnight every day, seven days a week.
- More than 80 per cent of calls of the 70,000 calls a day received every day at the helpline are related to basic information on COVID-19,

Fauci warns of serious consequences if US reopens too soon

- If there is a rush to reopen without following guidelines, “my concern is we will start to see little spikes that might turn into outbreaks,” he said. “The consequences could be really serious.”
- In fact, he said opening too soon “could turn the clock back,” and that not only would cause “some suffering and death that could be avoided, but could even set you back on the road to try to get economic recovery.”

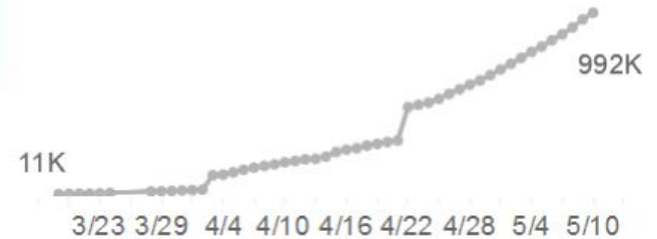

We can expect cooling to continue west of the mountains through the middle of the week. Temperatures will be **above normal for inland areas** today. More **significant cooling and windy for deserts** early to mid week. The marine layer will continue to deepen into the week with more clouds west of the mountains and temps becoming **below average** Tuesday and Wednesday except coast. Temperatures will start to warm back up next weekend as a weak ridging pattern develops over SoCal.
