Europe to accelerate trials of gene-engineered COVID-19 vaccines - sources

- European officials aim to speed up trials for coronavirus vaccines containing genetically modified organisms, two EU sources told Reuters, in a move that could help shots developed by companies like AstraZeneca and Johnson & Johnson.
- The European Commission is expected to put forward the plans as early as next week. They are part of a wider EU strategy aimed at securing enough doses of a possible vaccine for the bloc as it fears lagging behind the United States and China.
- The GMO vaccine plans are expected to be announced as part of an "EU strategy for the development of a COVID-19 vaccine", which the Commission will unveil on June 17, according to a draft agenda of the EU executive.
- Officials have told Reuters that as part of the strategy the Commission will also announce plans to use an emergency 2.4-billioneuro (\$2.7 billion) fund to make advance purchases of promising vaccines against the new coronavirus. https://news.vahoo.com/exclusive-europe-accelerate-trials-gene-104645333.html?.tsrc=daily_mail&uh_test=2_04

- Officials from the National Health Commission and Beijing Health Commission briefed WHO's China country office, to share details of preliminary investigations ongoing in Beijing.

FDA terminates emergency use authorization of hydroxychloroguine for Covid-19

- The US Food and Drug Administration has revoked its emergency use authorization for the drugs hydroxychloroguine and chloroguine for the treatment of Covid-19.
- After reviewing the current research available on the drugs, the FDA determined that the drugs do not meet "the statutory criteria" for emergency use authorization as they are unlikely to be effective in treating Covid-19 based on the latest scientific evidence, the agency noted on its website on Monday.

Colleges are ditching required admission tests over covid-19. Will they ever go back?

- taking the SAT or ACT was considered essential to apply to the most selective colleges and universities. All but a few ultracompetitive schools required test scores.
- For the high school Class of 2021, though, testing mandates are rapidly vanishing as the coronavirus crisis has obliterated exam schedules. This shift, coupled with growing skepticism of the tests that predated the pandemic, could produce lasting change in college admissions, as a gigantic test-optional experiment gets underway.
- It is now possible for rising high school seniors to apply without a score to more than half of the Ivy League, to most top-ranked liberal arts colleges, to all public universities in California and nearly all in Virginia.
- In recent years, the tests have fueled an intense debate among admissions leaders. Many say scores provide valuable insight when weighed alongside grades and other information as they sift through tens of thousands of applications a year. Others say that tests aren't worth the trouble and that they needlessly deter many worthy applicants. For these skeptics, high school transcripts, application essays and recommendations tell them most of what they need to know.
- Others have ditched testing requirements permanently, including Indiana University in Bloomington and all of Oregon's public universities.

Make up for COVID-19 losses by investing in California higher education; state's economic recovery depends on it (*commentary*)

- As the COVID-19 pandemic spread across California, the state's public universities and colleges transitioned from bustling campuses to virtually empty ones sending their costs soaring and revenues spiraling.
- University of California and California State University systems reported losses totaling more than \$1.4 billion since the outbreak, mostly from the increased costs of online instruction and lost revenues from shuttered dorms, dining halls and other programs. California Community Colleges estimate they will lose \$1 billion over the next year.
- Gov. Newsom, faced with a \$54 billion budget deficit, proposed a 10% cut in public higher education funding in his May budget proposal. The Legislature is considering a budget next week that will replace most of the higher education funds the governor cut. But the Legislature's replacement funding is contingent upon the state getting billions in federal funds to offset its COVID-19 revenue losses.
- One in every 10 employees in California is a graduate of CSU, with more than half of alumni staying in California and contributing to the state's economy. UC is the state's third-largest employer and is responsible for sparking statewide innovation, with an average of five inventions per day. UC is also the world's largest public research university system, providing a health care system that is saving lives and a research enterprise that is seeking cures and a vaccine for COVID-19.
- California Community Colleges educate those on the frontlines of the battle against COVID-19. They train 70% of the state's nurses and 80% of California's firefighters, law enforcement personnel and emergency medical technicians.

State leaders had sought to restore funding in recent years. But California's per-student funding is still far behind where it was in the • mid-1970s. 

College Savings Plan Bankruptcy Exemption Bill Passes Senate


- On Thursday, the Senate approved a bill that would stop creditors and debt collectors from taking Golden State Scholarshare 529 college savings plans in personal bankruptcy cases.
- Under Senate Bill 898, authored by Senator Bob Wieckowski (D-Fremont), Golden State Scholarshare 529 college savings plans would join current bankruptcy exemptions such as veterans' benefits, alimony, unemployment, retirement accounts, and social security payments.
- Scholarshare 529 college savings accounts were created in 1999 by the state to provide low-cost savings plans and portfolios to help families save for college education. Money can also be withdrawn tax-free at any time to help pay elementary, middle, or high school expenses. As it is a financial account attached to an adult, Scholarshare 529 accounts can currently be tapped by creditors to pay for a parents bankruptcy judgement.
- After passage on Thursday, SB 898 is due to be heard next week in the Assembly. https://californiaglobe.com/section-2/college-savings-plan-bankruptcy-exemption-bill-passes-senate/


U.S. Data Covid-19 Case Cluster (past 48 hours)


Demographic Trends of COVID-19 cases and deaths in the US reported to CDC






How are COVID-19 cases progressing in each county?




