- World Number one tennis player Novak Djokovic was tested positive for coronavirus after Grigor Dimitrov, Viktor Troicki and Borna Coric confirmed having the infections. After the cancelation of the Adria Tour finals in Croatia, Djokovic flew back to Belgrade, Serbia and in the airport, his infection was tested and confirmed.
- Djokovic said in a statement: "We organised the tournament at the moment when the virus has weakened, believing that the conditions for hosting the tour had been met... I am extremely sorry for each individual case of infection. I hope that it will not complicate anyone's health situation and that everyone will be fine."

Parks and playgrounds deserted amid new Guetersloh outbreak

- Given that all the schools and nurseries are closed in Guetersloh the north-west German district at the center of the country's latest COVID-19 outbreak
- Parents are worried since lockdown was reimposed after 1,500 workers tested positive for coronavirus at a nearby meat factory.
- Along with nurseries bars, gyms, swimming pools and cinemas are closed again. Businesses only just trying to recoup money lost during the height of the crisis are now facing more losses.
- They claim the virus was able to spread at the plant because the many migrant workers employed there live in cramped conditions. LAX adding thermal-imaging cameras, other measures to screen for coronavirus

• Los Angeles International Airport is introducing new measures aiming at slowing the spread of coronavirus during the summer travel season.

- The airport is introducing new thermal imaging cameras that can check temperatures from a distance as people walk into the building. The cameras let airport staff check temperatures of passengers without having to stop each person individually.
- "If you had to stop and check each one individually it would be a very long process," said Justin Erbacci, an official with Los Angeles World Airports. "There would be queues outside. It would probably be anti-safe because you would have a queuing problem and physical distancing problem."

Riverside County to begin coronavirus antibody testing as part of prevalence study

- Thousands of Riverside County residents will soon be contacted and asked to take part in a coronavirus antibody testing study being sponsored by county health officials.
- About 3,500 randomly selected county residents will be asked if they are interested in taking part in the study, which could determine whether they have been exposed and developed COVID-19 antibodies. The study will help determine the Riverside County prevalence of COVID-19, which will be used to inform planning efforts. Potential participants will be contacted by telephone or email starting later this week.
- "We are asking those who are contacted to strongly consider taking part in the study," said Kim Saruwatari, director of Riverside County Public Health. "It's important to know the extent of the spread of the virus have developed antibodies. That information is vital as we move forward."

Ventura County residents can get free coronavirus antibody tests to detect past infections

- Ventura County residents can get free antibody tests to find out if they've already fought off the coronavirus, officials said Friday.
- The first round of serology testing will begin 10 a.m. Monday in Simi Valley and will be followed by additional testing in Thousand Oaks, Moorpark, Camarillo, Santa Paula Fillmore and Ojai over the next two weeks.
- Ventura residents can get tested at the Barranca Vista Park Wednesday, the Ventura City Fire Department said, adding that officials are expected to announce additional dates for the city in the future.





Health and Medical

- AZ: Reported an average 2,412 daily cases in the week ending June 21, a 94% increase from the previous week
- FL: Issued new Public Health Advisory to increase mitigation measures; purchased 20 million cloth masks which are actively being distributed statewide; Governor directed increased inspections to ensure that businesses are adhering to Phase 1 and Phase 2 guidance
- Jordan's donation of 1.9 million face masks, 30,000 coveralls, and 30,000 goggles arrived to Joint Base Andrews in Prince George's County, MD yesterday; donations will be split between CA, MI, and NY

Response:

- NRCC at Level I; Region I and II RRCCs at Level II; Region III, IV, V, VI and X RRCCs at Level III; Region VII, VIII and IX RRCCs are rostered; Region VII COVID-19 response being worked from the Virtual JFO



California Community Colleges Chancellor's webinar

2020-21 State Budget Agreement

- On June 22, Governor Newsom and Assembly and Senate leadership reached an agreement around a final 2020-21 state spending plan.
- For California Community Colleges, the 2020-21 budget agreement prevents cuts to apportionments and categoricals.
- In order to accomplish this, \$1.45 billion in funding to colleges is deferred to future years and provides no COLA and no enrollment growth.
- Of the \$1.45 billion, \$791 million would trigger-off if Congress approves a fourth stimulus package.



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Apportionments & Deferrals

- Rejects the May Revision proposal to cut apportionment funding.
- Approves the May Revision proposal to extend minimum revenue provisions (hold harmless) under the Student Centered Funding Formula by an additional two years.
- No COLA and no enrollment growth.
- Approves a \$662.1 million deferral from 2020-21 to 2021-22. Includes trailer bill language to allow hardship exemptions.
- Includes a trigger deferral of \$791.1 million Proposition 98. This deferral would be withdrawn if the state receives federal funding.



Block Grant

- Includes \$120 million one-time from Proposition 98 and federal funds to support a basic needs/learning loss/COVID-19 response block grant to colleges.
- Support expenses such as mental health services, housing and food insecurity, re-engagement for students who left college in Spring 2020, technology and development of online courses, and student supports.



Categoricals

- Protects against cuts to any categorical programs, the Strong Workforce Program and Student Equity and Achievement, keeping the programs at 2019-20 spending levels.
- Creates a food pantry expense within the Student Equity and Achievement Program.
- Provides \$10 million ongoing support for immigrant legal services.



Other Provisions

- Reduces funding for Calbright College by \$5 million ongoing and \$40 million one-time.
- Prohibits community college district boards from terminating the services of any permanent or probationary classified employees of the school district or community college district that hold classifications in or are assigned to positions in nutrition, transportation, or custodial services.

June 22 - RUHS Public Health: Riverside County to begin coronavirus antibody testing as part of prevalence study

Riverside County to begin coronavirus antibody testing as part of prevalence study

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About 3,500 randomly selected county residents will be asked if they are interested in taking part in the study, which could determine whether they have been exposed and developed COVID-19 antibodies. The study will help determine the Riverside County prevalence of COVID-19, which will be used to inform planning efforts. Potential participants will be contacted by telephone or email starting later this week.

"We are asking those who are contacted to strongly consider taking part in the study," said Kim Saruwatari, director of Riverside County Public Health. "It's important to know the extent of the spread of the virus have developed antibodies. That information is vital as we move forward."

Residents cannot volunteer for the study, in part, because health officials want a more representative sampling of the community. Antibodies are part of the body's defense against infections, develop and stay in the blood even after the infection is over. Public Health is not creating the list of participants and will not collect the individual information from the study.

As a reminder, the medical community does not yet know the extent of the benefits of testing positive for coronavirus antibodies. For example, it is not yet known if someone can contract the virus again after testing positive for antibodies. Conducting this study will provide valuable information as COVID-19 continues to be researched.


"Public health officials around the world continue to learn about coronavirus and this antibody study could enhance our local understanding of this disease," said Riverside County Board Chair and Fourth District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez. "It is important that Riverside County residents get the regular test for coronavirus to protect their families, coworkers and communities, and, if contacted, to participate in an antibody study as well to help our research efforts."

Those who are selected will complete a survey, then have blood drawn at one of nine sites located throughout the county. These sites are not the same locations where coronavirus testing for active infections is taking place.


RIVERSIDE COUNTY COVID-19 CASES



RIVERSIDE COUNTY DAILY COVID-19 CASES










Tropical Outlook – Central Pacific






Hazards Outlook – Jun 26-30






Fire Weather Outlook
