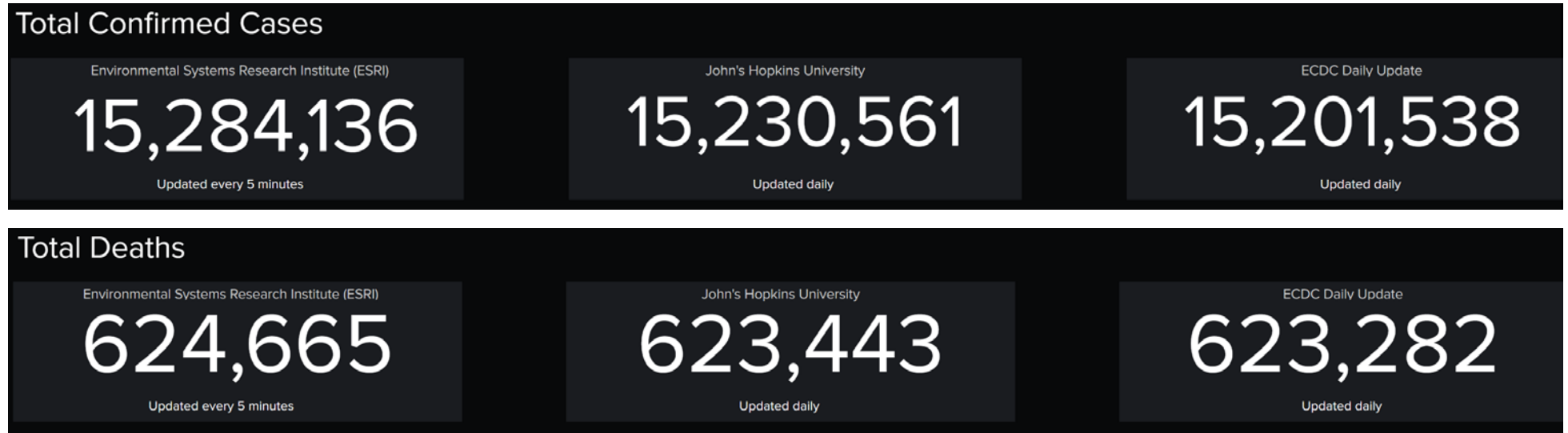

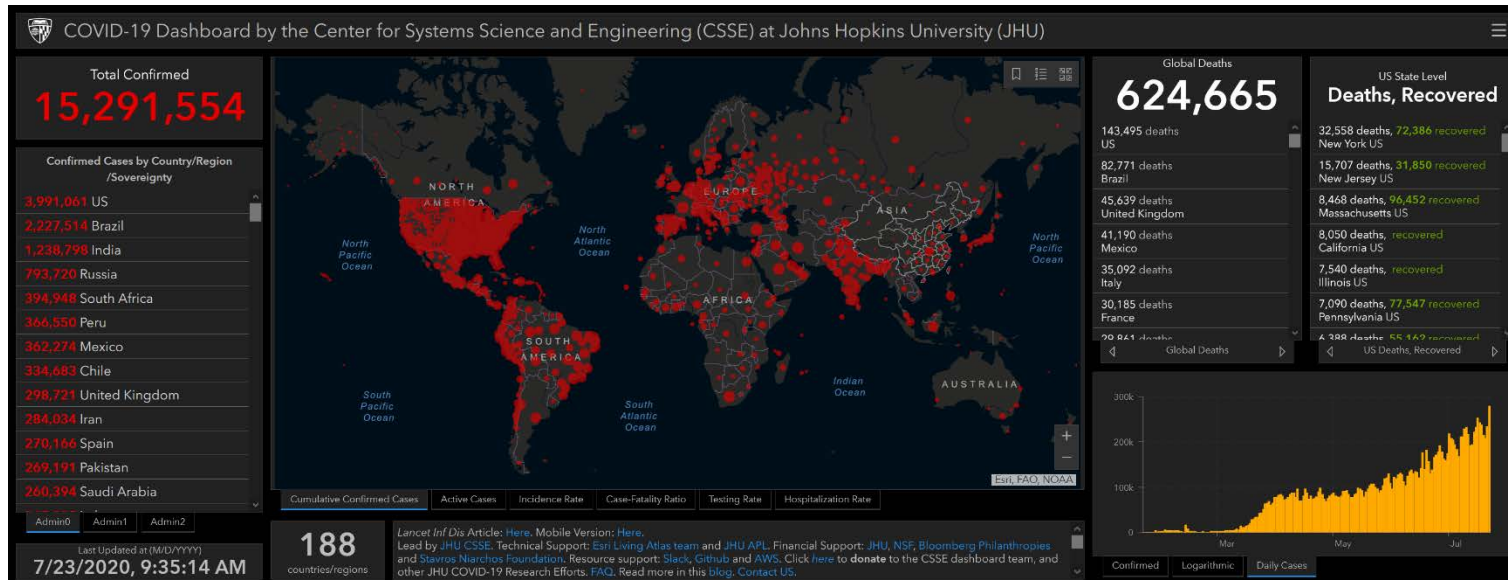

Three out of 10 people in the Americas are at increased risk of severe COVID-19 because of underlying conditions, PAHO Director says

- Three out of ten people – or nearly 325 million – are at increased risk of developing severe COVID-19 illness due to underlying health conditions, Pan American Health Organization Director (PAHO) Carissa F. Etienne said.
- Certain underlying, chronic conditions like diabetes, kidney disease and hypertension, as well as infectious diseases, such as tuberculosis, or immunosuppression, place people at increased risk for more severe COVID-19 disease.
- “Unfortunately, many of these medical conditions are widespread in the Americas, which leaves our region more vulnerable to severe illness,” Etienne told a media briefing today.
- To help address this, PAHO has developed a new data model in partnership with the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine that provides a more accurate picture of the prevalence of health conditions in the Americas.
- “What we see is worrisome,” she noted. “We are talking about 186 million people in Latin America and the Caribbean,” and in the U.S. Canada and Mexico, one in three people are at increased risk of severe COVID-19.
- In the Americas, there are 43 million people at high risk, “which means they would require hospitalization due to their underlying health conditions. And within this group, men are twice as likely as women to be at high risk of developing severe COVID-19,” she said.
- People over the age of 65 are at greater risk of experiencing more severe disease, since the likelihood of developing multiple health conditions increases with age, PAHO’s director said. “But working-age adults – which refers to people from 15-64 – are not immune, as many of them live with one or more underlying health condition. Diabetes and chronic kidney disease, in particular, are especially prevalent among adult populations,” she added.

NIH: Experimental coronavirus vaccine is safe and produces immune response

- Scientists began Phase 1 trials of an experimental vaccine for COVID-19 in mid-March. The vaccine, called mRNA-1273, is being co-developed by researchers at NIH’s National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) and the biotech company Moderna, Inc.
- The two-dose vaccine is designed to prompt the immune system to produce antibodies against a portion of the coronavirus “spike” protein, which the virus uses to bind to and enter human cells. The vaccine uses messenger RNA (mRNA), a molecule critical for the virus to produce protein.
- The team tested the vaccine in 45 healthy adults, ages 18 to 55. Participants were enrolled at study sites in Seattle and Atlanta. The investigational vaccine induced a strong immune response and was generally well tolerated. Antibody levels were higher with higher doses of the vaccine. In both the middle and high dose groups, the researchers observed high levels of neutralizing antibody activity through day 43 after the second injection. These levels were similar to the upper range found in patients who had recovered from COVID-19.

Timeline for release of GOP relief proposal is in flux, White House negotiators say

- Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin called the discussions between White House negotiators and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell “very productive,” but acknowledged that while there is a “fundamental agreement,” both sides still need to review and finalize text – which can be a time consuming process.
- “Whether this gets introduced today or not, we’re still looking at the timing,” Mnuchin said. Senate Republicans had planned to introduce the multi-part proposal on Thursday.
- White House Chief of Staff Mark Meadows acknowledged the time crunch negotiators currently face, given the upcoming weekend and the expected funeral of Rep. John Lewis next week.
- Negotiators are still working through the mechanical details of how to implement that given the issues many states have with their individual systems. The benefit extension would be through the end of the year.
- Mnuchin said on direct payments, “We’re talking about the same provision as last time. Our proposal is the exact same provision as last time.” Senate Republicans have proposed targeting the stimulus checks toward lower-income individuals. In the \$2.2 trillion CARES Act, checks of up to \$1,200 for individuals and \$2,400 for families based on adjusted gross income, and \$500 for each child.

U.S. Existing-Home Sales Rose 20.7% in June

- A sluggish U.S. housing market is staging a recovery amid the pandemic, shaking off high unemployment and a rising number of infections as buyers with pent-up demand seize on record-low mortgage rates.
- Sales of existing homes jumped nearly 21% in June compared with May, according to the National Association of Realtors.
- It was the largest monthly gain since the Realtors began tracking the data in 1968 and came after sharp declines over the previous three months due to the coronavirus pandemic. Sales were still 11.3% lower annually.
- This count is based on closings, so it represents contracts signed in late April and May, before much of the national economy began to reopen and before the most recent surge in coronavirus cases.
- “We are facing an acute inventory shortage especially at the lower price points,” said Yun. “The inventory levels are shrinking and shrinking, which could create a bottleneck for further home sales later.”

Task Force Warns 11 Cities To Take 'Aggressive' Action On Virus

- As the number of new coronavirus cases in the U.S. approached 4 million Thursday, the White House coronavirus task force privately warned 11 U.S. cities to take “aggressive” steps to mitigate the spread of the virus.
- In a phone call with state and city leaders, Dr. Deborah Birx called out cities seeing increases in the percentage of tests coming back positive and urged them to act quickly to stem the outbreaks.
- Among Birx's recommendations were to trace the contacts of patients testing positive for the COVID-19 virus, according to the Center for Public Integrity.

- "When you first see that increase in test positivity, that is when to start the mitigation efforts," she said in a recording obtained by Public Integrity. "I know it may look small and you may say, 'That only went from 5 to 5-and-a-half [percent], and we're gonna wait and see what happens.' If you wait another three or four or even five days, you'll start to see a dramatic increase in cases."
- The cities Bix identified were Baltimore, Cleveland, Columbus, Indianapolis, Las Vegas, Miami, Minneapolis, Nashville, New Orleans, Pittsburgh and St. Louis.

City of Miami has issued 115 tickets for mask violations this week, mayor says

- The City of Miami has issued 115 tickets for face mask violations this week, Miami Mayor Francis Suarez said during a briefing Thursday morning.
- "We have written 115 tickets," Suarez said. The breakdown for tickets issues includes, "59 warnings, 41 \$50 tickets, 15 \$100 tickets and we have closed 15 businesses, 10 for 24 hours and five for 10 hours," Suarez added.
- ""We need to be more disciplined than ever," Suarez said. The mayor said he is not issuing a stay-at-home order for the city at this time. "
- Some background: Suarez announced that the Florida city would increase its penalties for people not adhering to its mask mandate, raising the amount from \$50 to \$100 for first and second offenses.
- The mayor told CNN this morning that 39 officers this week will be dedicated solely to mask enforcement. Funds collected from face mask violations will go to businesses impacted by the pandemic, he said.

CIF announces high school sports season won't begin until December or January

- The start of the high school sports season in California will be delayed until December or January, the California Interscholastic Federation announced Monday.
- "This is the best possible plan we have with what's going on to give students an opportunity to participate," said Vicky Lagos, the Los Angeles City Section commissioner. "There are going to be issues in terms of facilities and multiple-sport athletes, but this is the best scenario for the most people. I have confidence the schools and coaches will work it out among themselves. My take from coaches is they want the opportunity to participate and be with the kids."
- Each of the 10 sections will release their own schedules built around the CIF calendar. The City Section and Southern Section both announced that football practice would begin Dec. 14, with games beginning on Jan. 8. High school football practice was scheduled to begin Aug. 3, with games Aug. 21.

COVID-19 leads to a spike in car thefts

- Car thefts in Los Angeles soared to a record high in the second quarter of 2020. A Crosstown analysis of Los Angeles Police Department data revealed that 5,744 vehicles were stolen from April-June, up 57.7% from the same period last year.

- The spike coincides with the arrival of the coronavirus pandemic. Although crime in general has decreased since mid-March, when schools were closed and businesses were shuttered in the effort to slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus, vehicle thefts have spiked. As Crosstown reported last month, April saw a 31% jump in car thefts, and the numbers have only climbed since then.
- It's a stark contrast to the first quarter of the year, which registered only a slight increase over January-March of 2019. Yet in June, there were 2,055 vehicles stolen, nearly double the 1,167 reported in the same month last year. There were more auto thefts between April-June than during any quarter since the LAPD began making its data public over a decade ago.

San Bernardino County warns of COVID-19 testing scams

- Some self-proclaimed COVID-19 testing sites could be operated by scam predators using fake COVID-19 antibody testing kits to swindle unsuspecting residents out of money and personal information.
- San Bernardino County 1st District Supervisor Robert Lovingood said “the public should be warned about “scam testing sites” that he said tend to pop up in less-fortunate communities”.
- “We understand that these scammers are using this current health crisis to take advantage of people who want to be tested,”
- “I think these predators are looking for people who are scared and desperate to know if they’ve been infected with COVID-19.” the county’s Department of Aging and Adult Services recently released a “Scam Alert” that explains how scammers lure the public to be tested by text message, email, or by setting up a fake testing site that includes legitimate-looking signage, tents and hazmat suits.
- The fraudulent sites do not follow sanitation protocols and can potentially spread COVID-19, the county said. The sites also use fake COVID-19 testing kits and collect personal information such as Social Security numbers and credit card information.

- The threat of COVID-19 is placed into four categories: Green, Yellow, Orange and Red. As the dial moves right (Green to Red), the threat to the community increases. As the dial moves left (Red to Green), the threat to the community decreases.
 - **Orange:** High Risk
 - Minimize contact with people outside of household
 - COVID-19 is spreading at an uncontrolled level
 - Contact tracing and testing is starting to be strained
 - Hospitals are making plans for a surge
 - Wear face mask and do social distancing

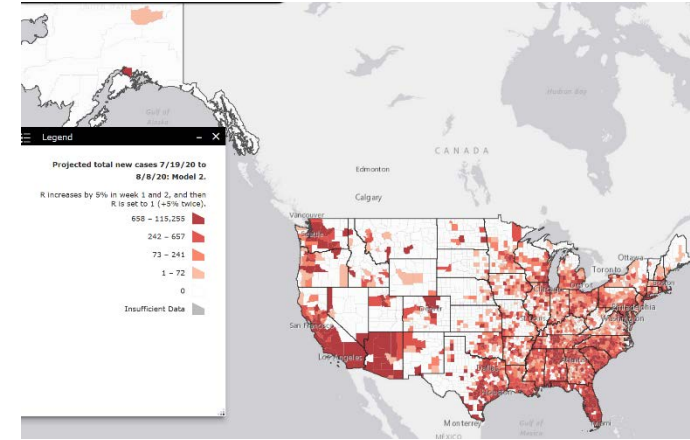
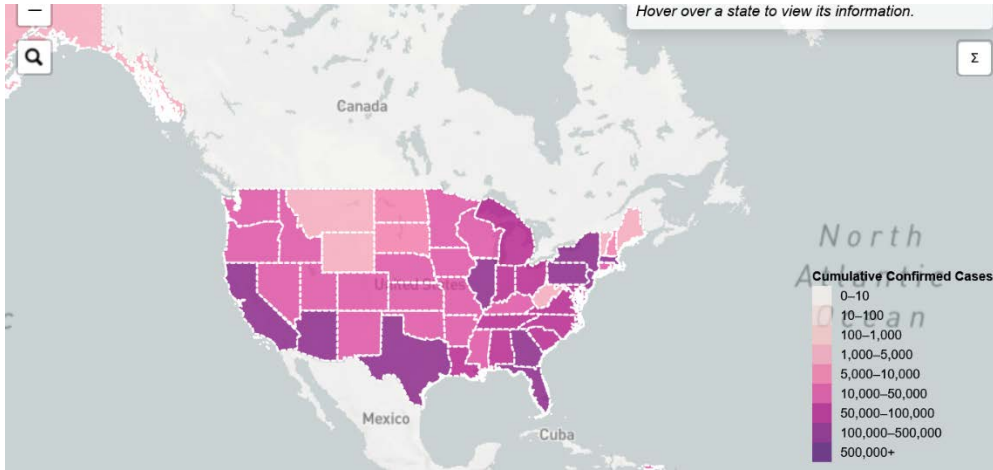

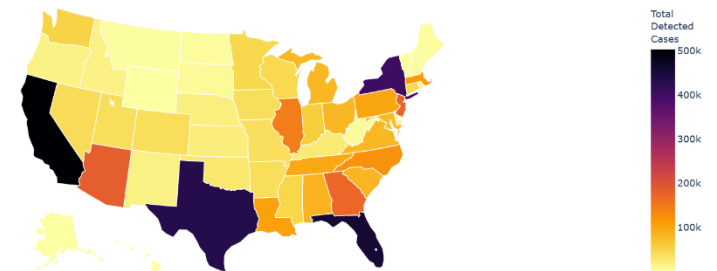
Jul 30, 2020 Predicted US Counts

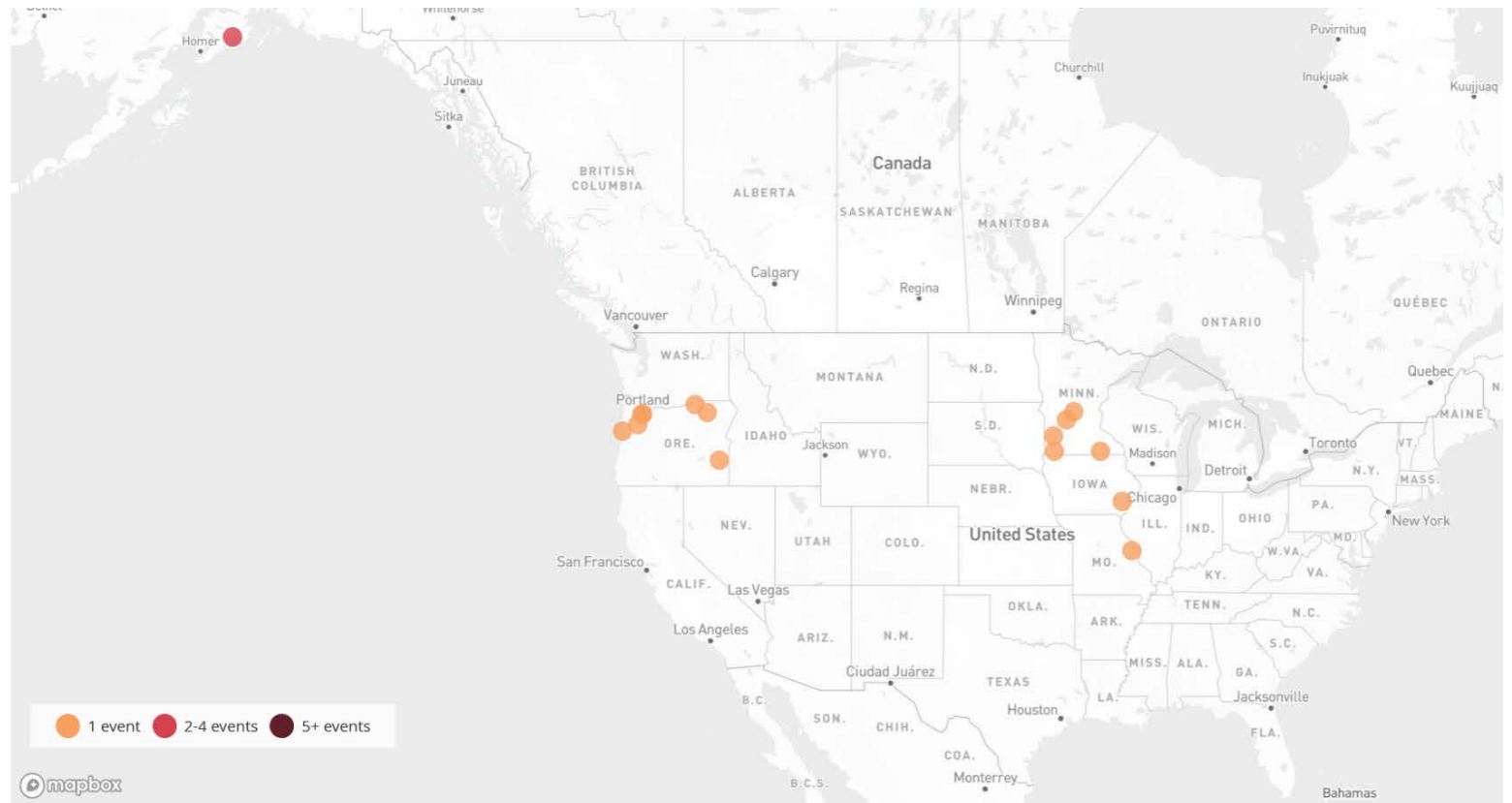

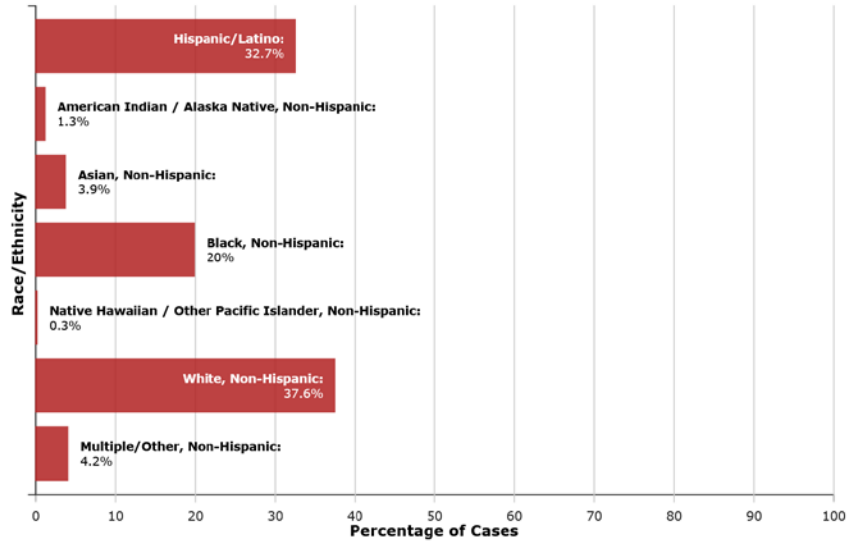

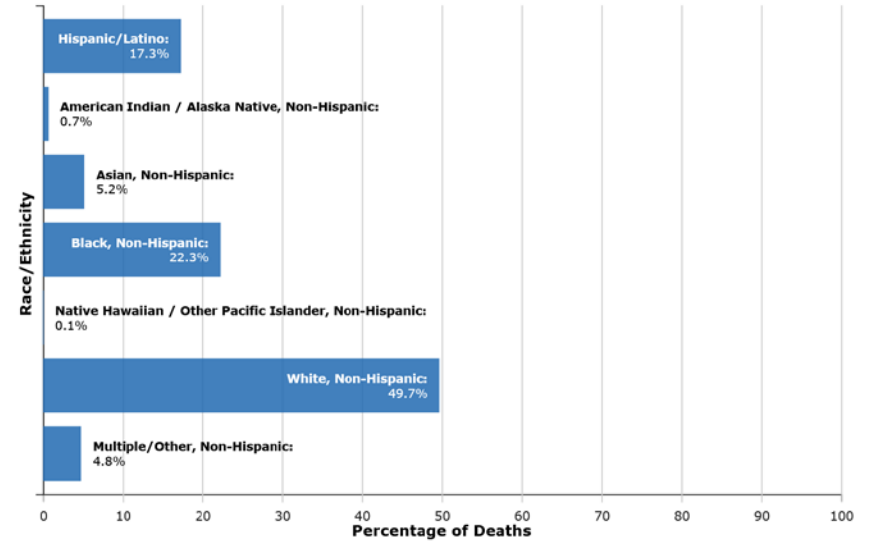

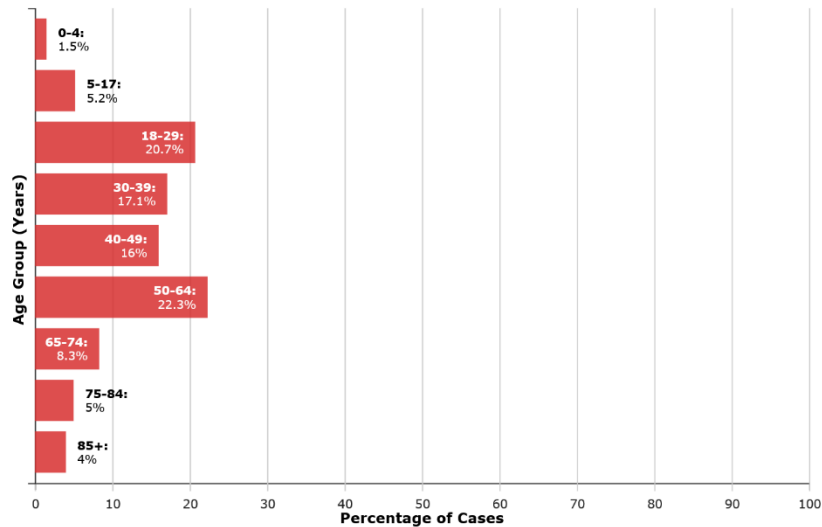

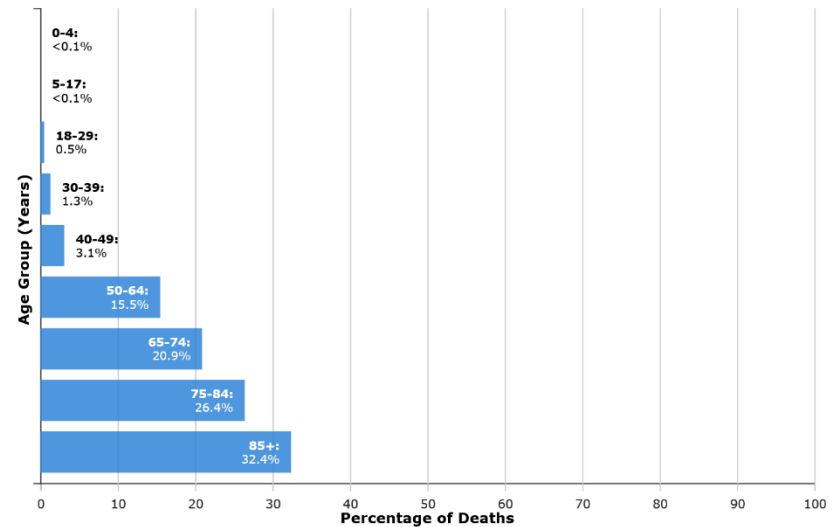

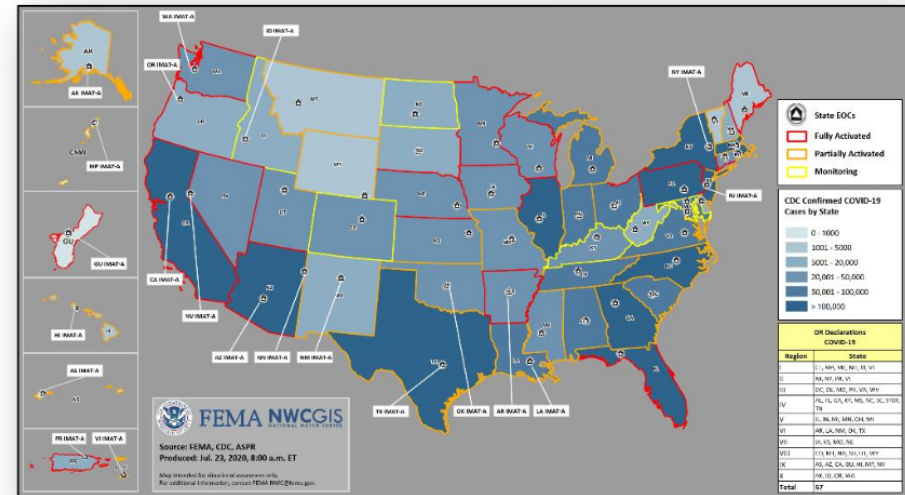

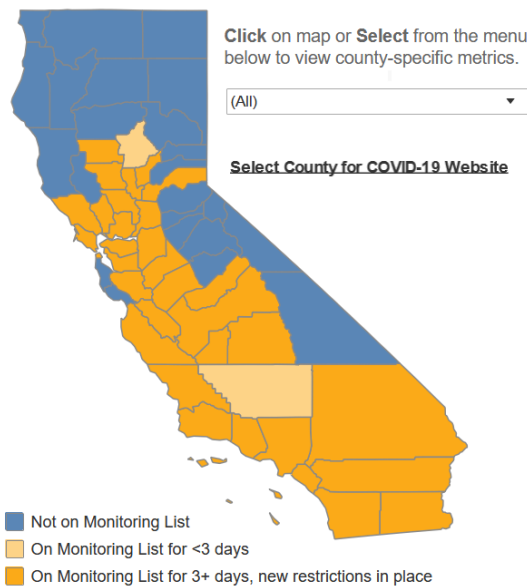

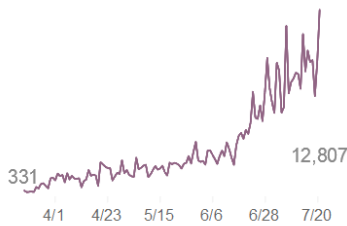

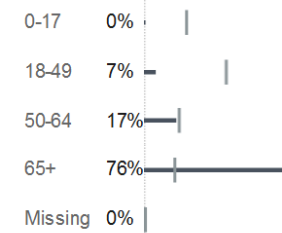

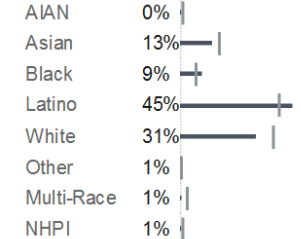

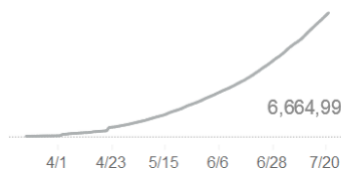

Cumulative Total Tests Reported



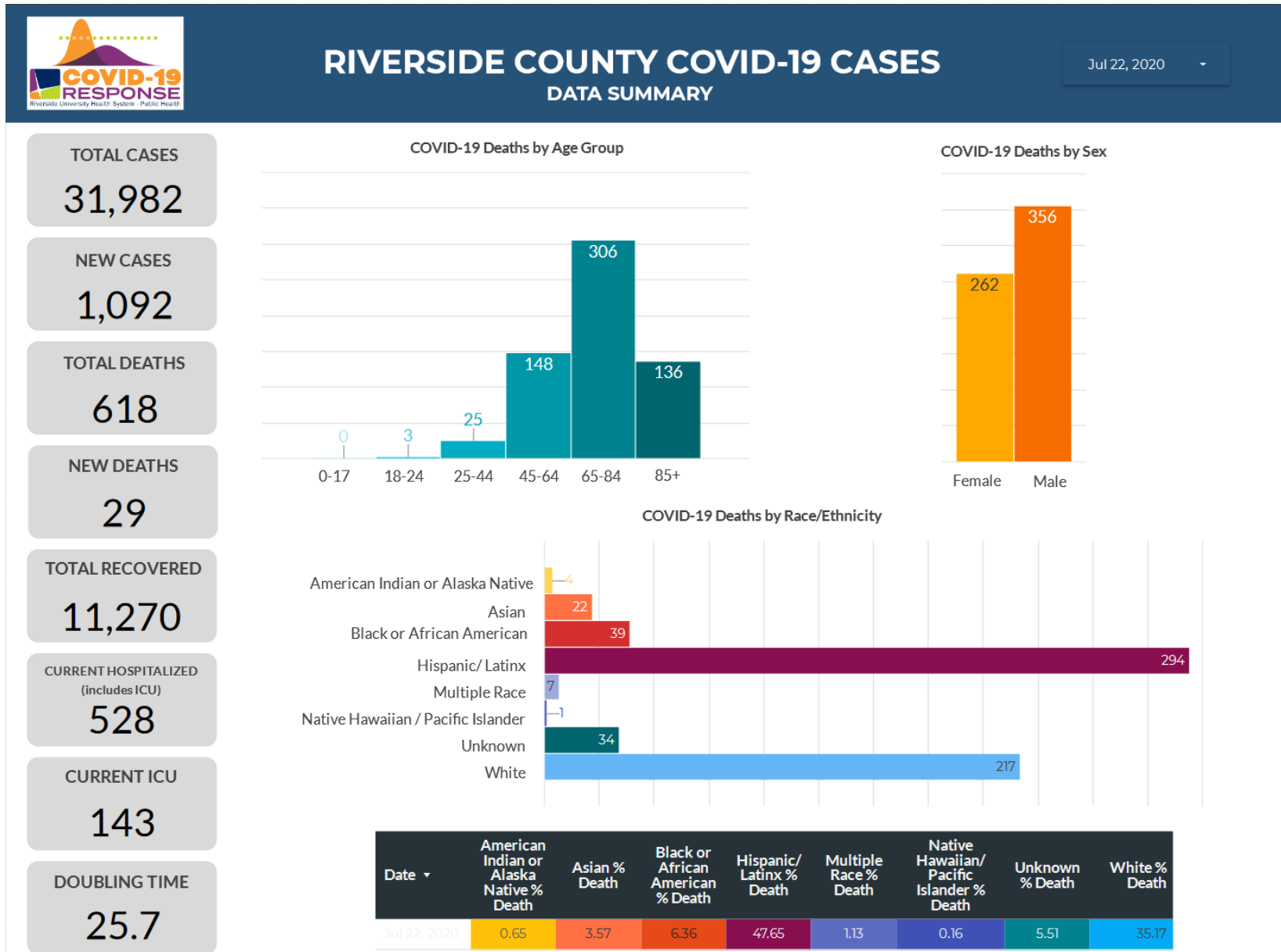

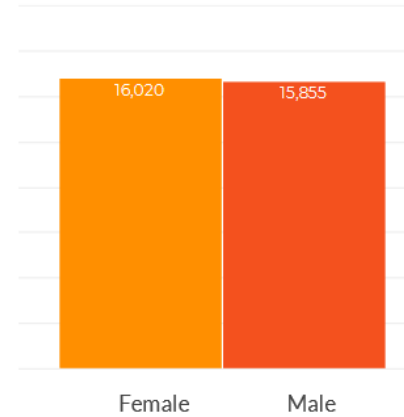

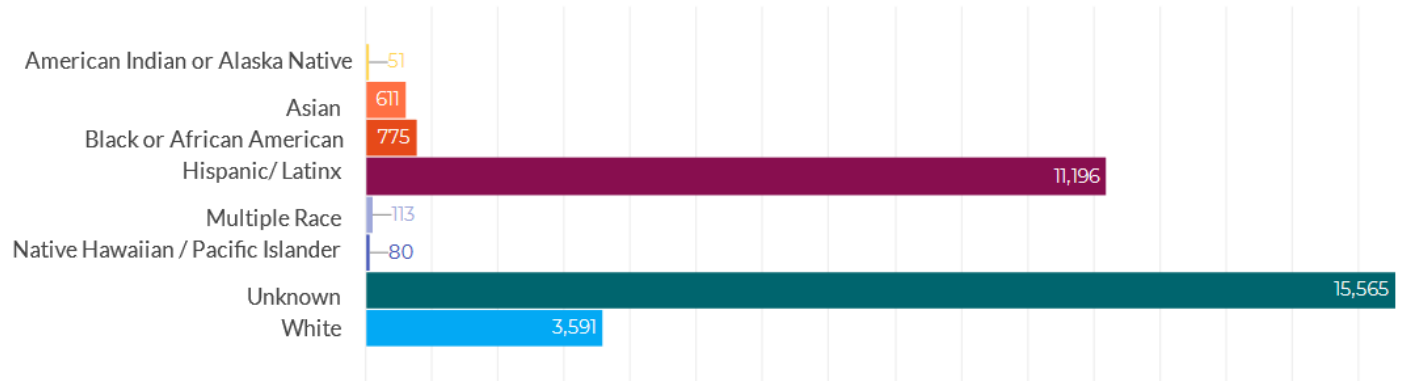
COVID-19 Cases by Age Group

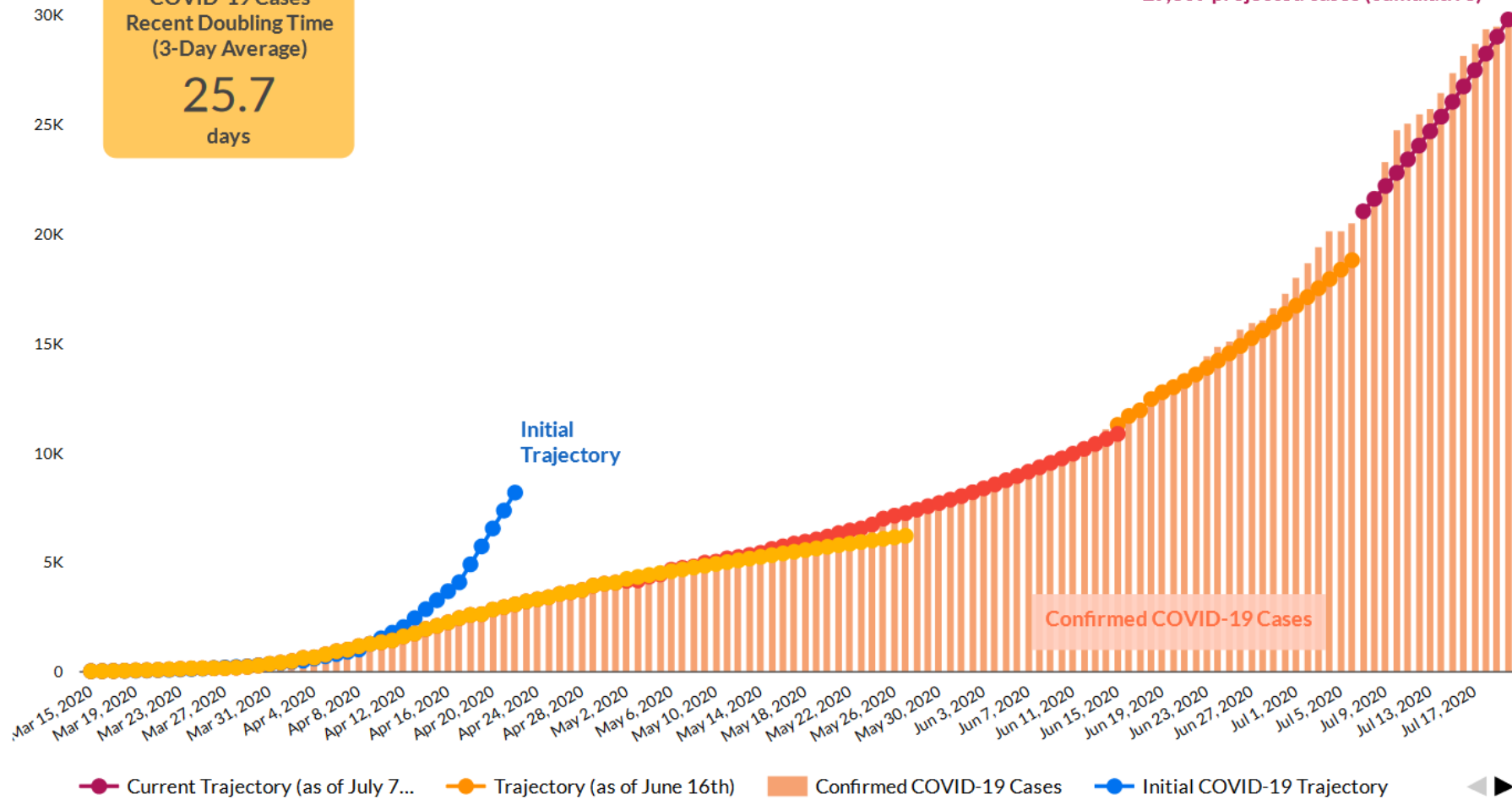

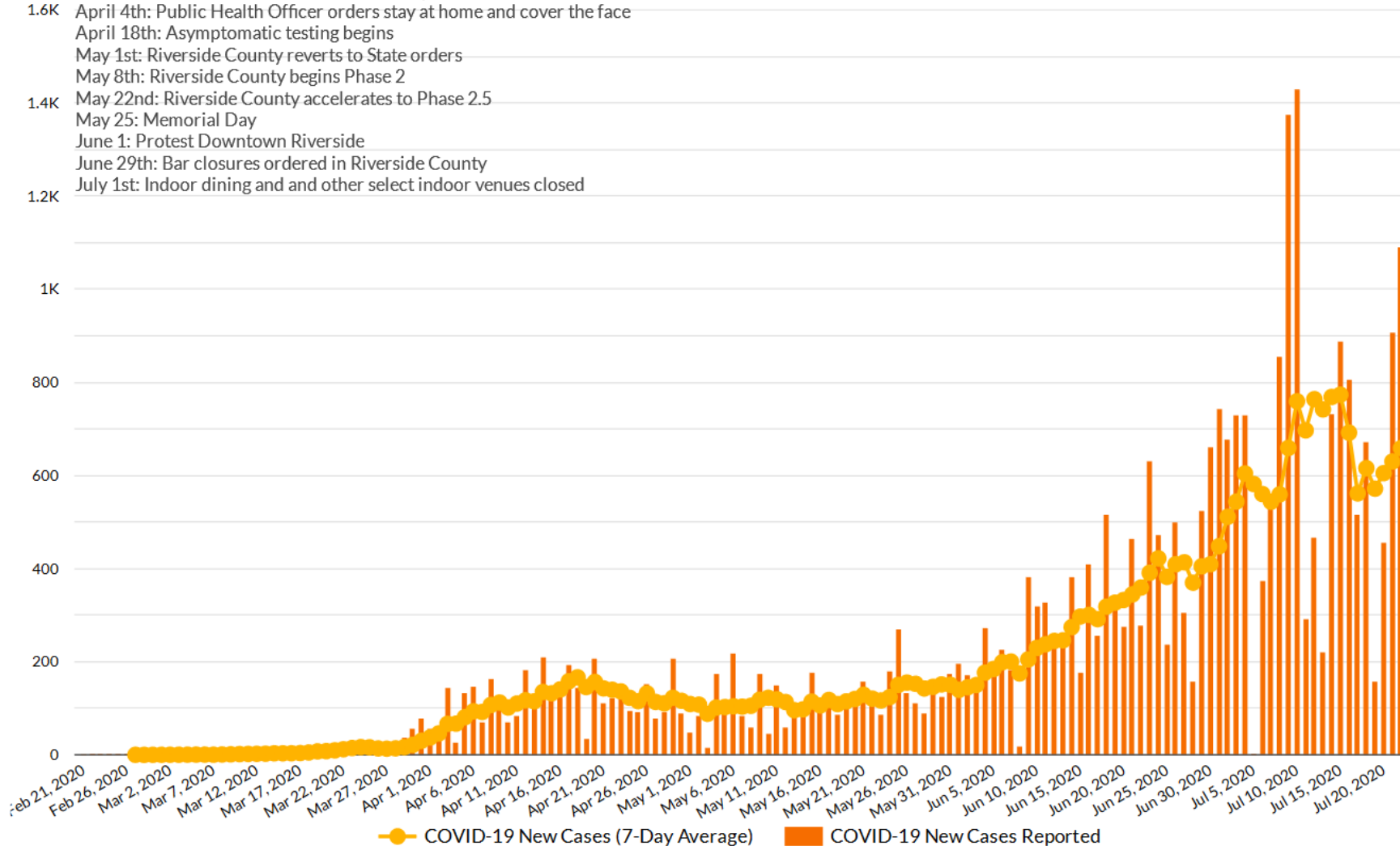

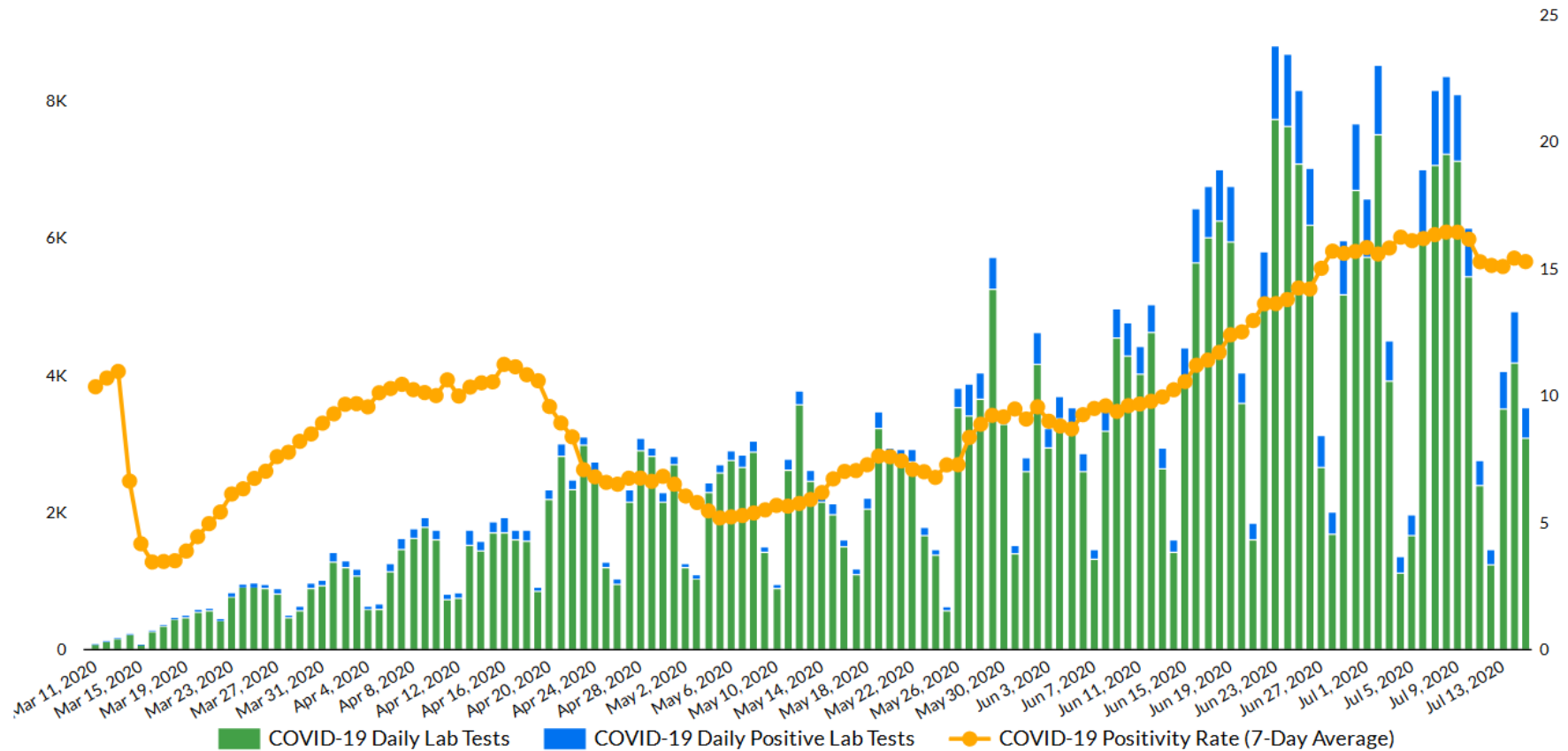

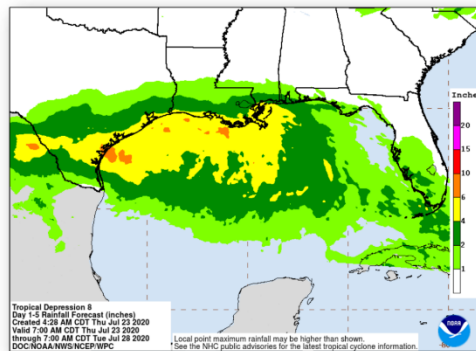
