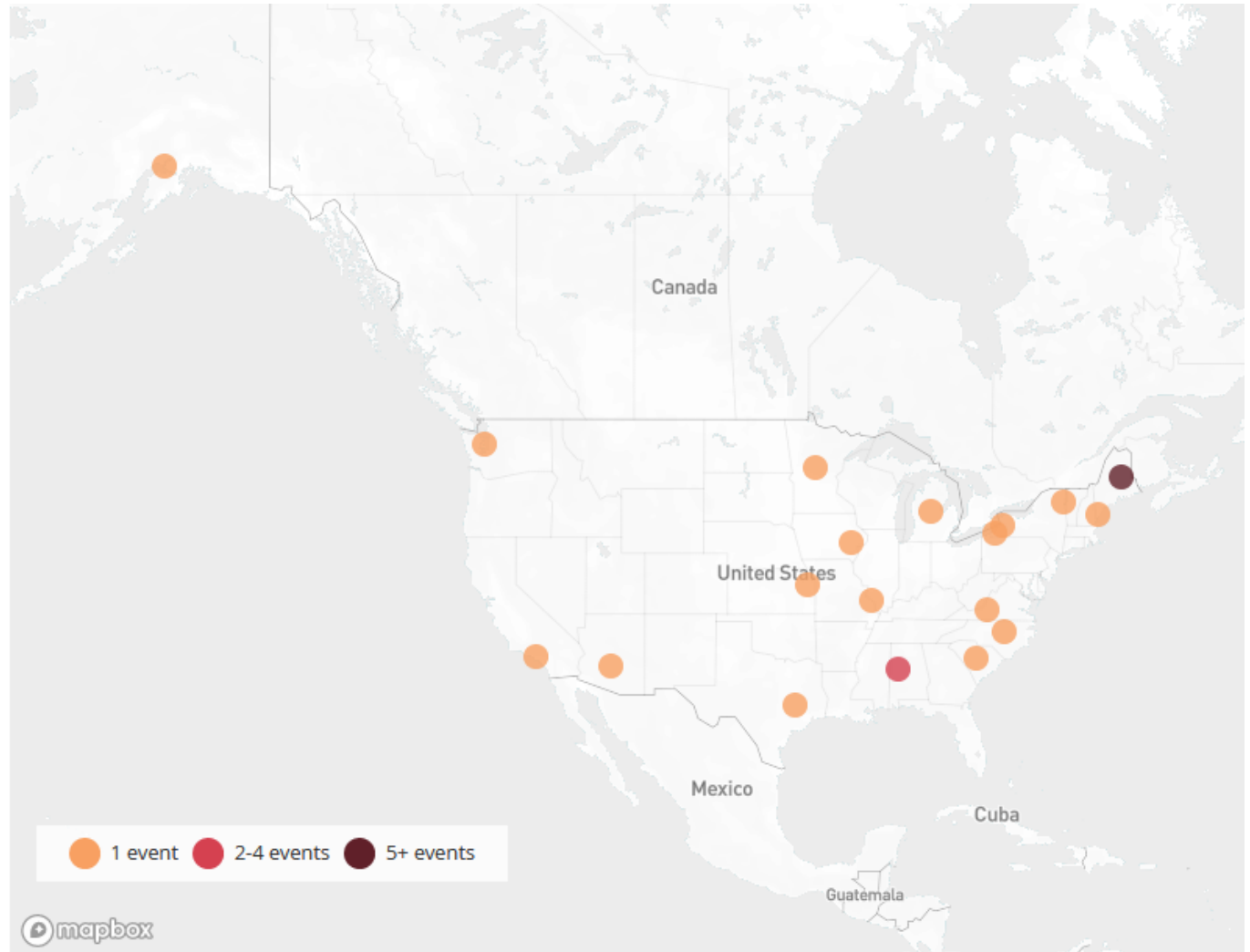

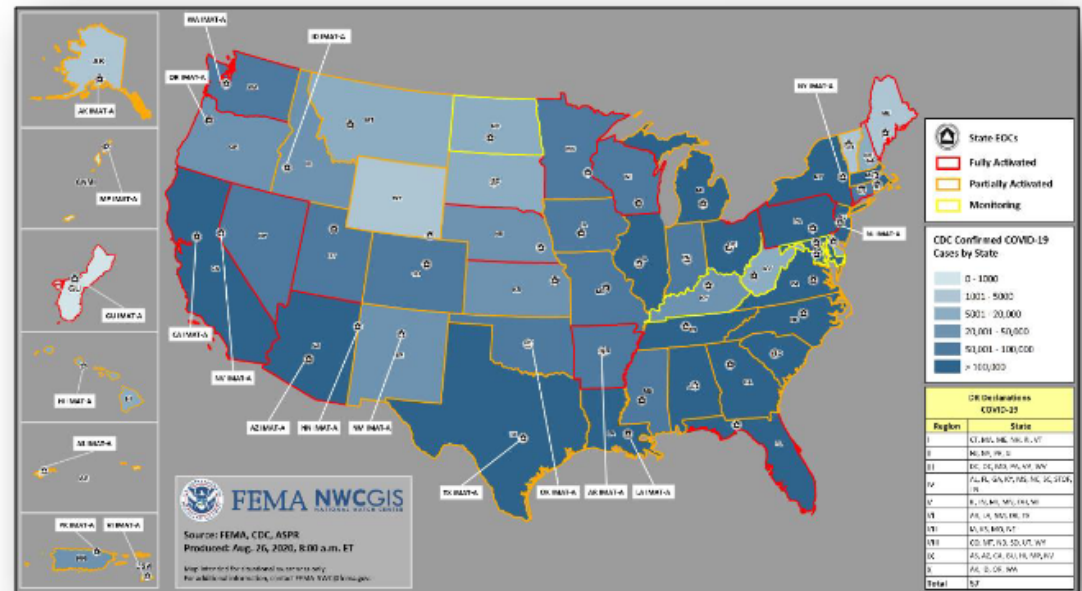

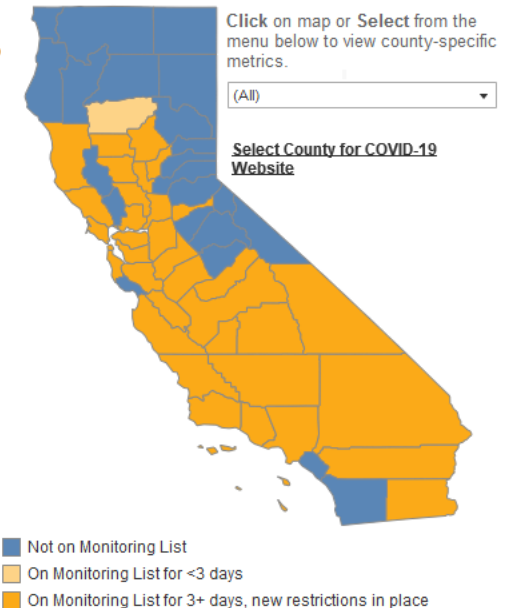

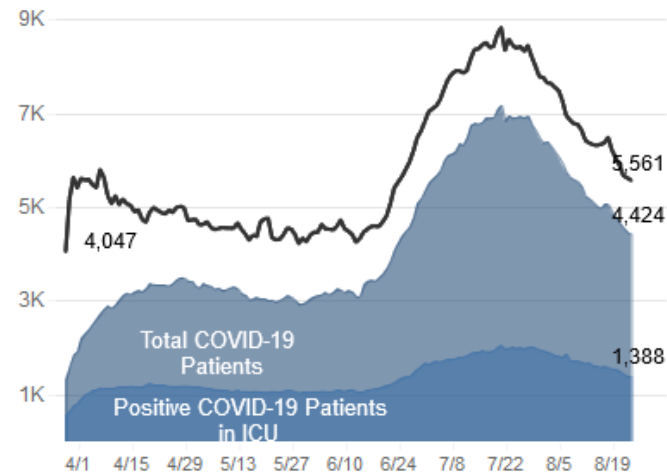

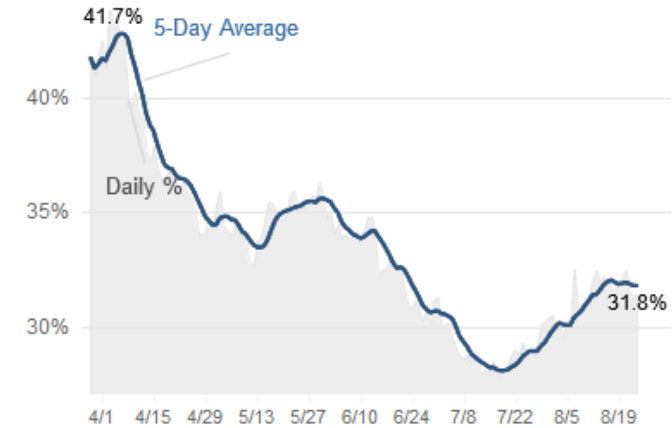

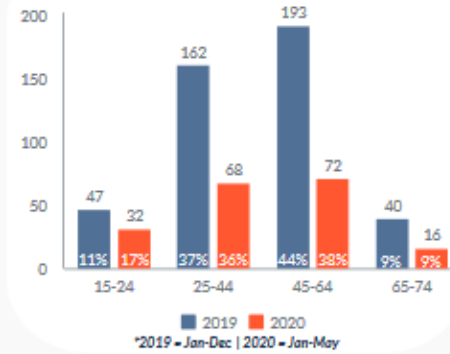

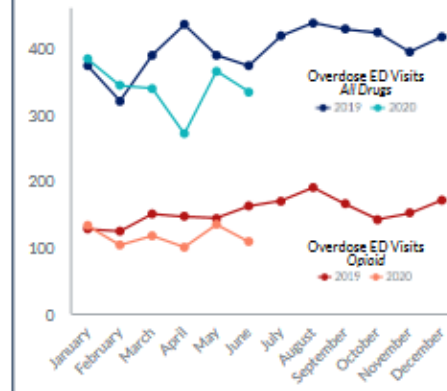

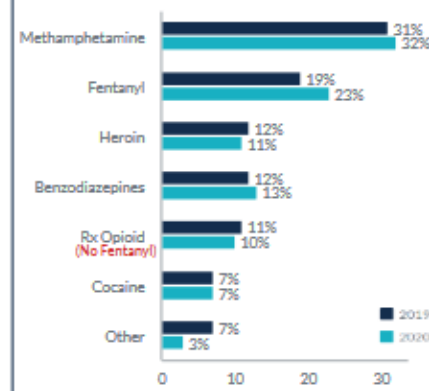
Fatal Overdoses by Age Group

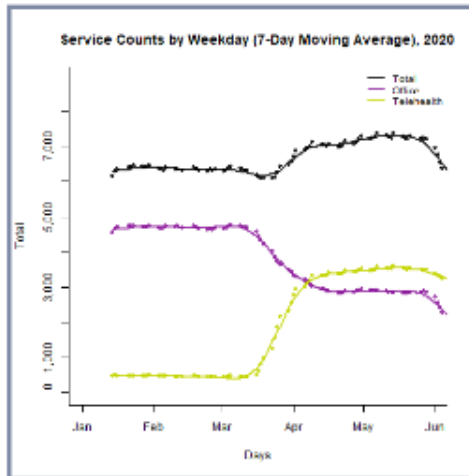

- From March to May 2020, Riverside University Health System - Behavioral Health (RUHS-BH) has seen a 16% increase in the number of services utilized compared to January to February 2020. This increase may be attributed to the availability of telehealth services, improving access to care.
- 27% decrease in the number of new individuals starting substance use and/or mental health services.
- Crisis stabilization services have remained relatively unchanged. However, there was a 4% decrease in the number of individuals who received crisis stabilization services.
- RUHS-BH HOPE team has supported the Housing Authority's Project Room Key initiative by helping house over 400 homeless individuals since the beginning of the pandemic.
- No significant increases in the primary substance of choice among individuals seeking treatment during the pandemic (approximately 23% alcohol, 9% marijuana, 34% methamphetamine/amphetamine and 34% opioids).

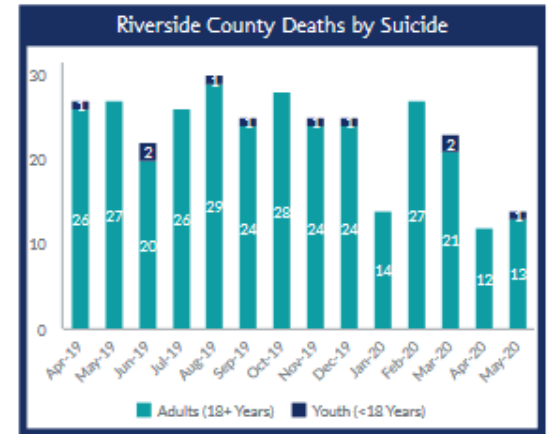

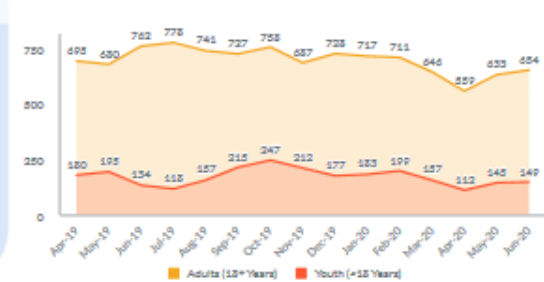

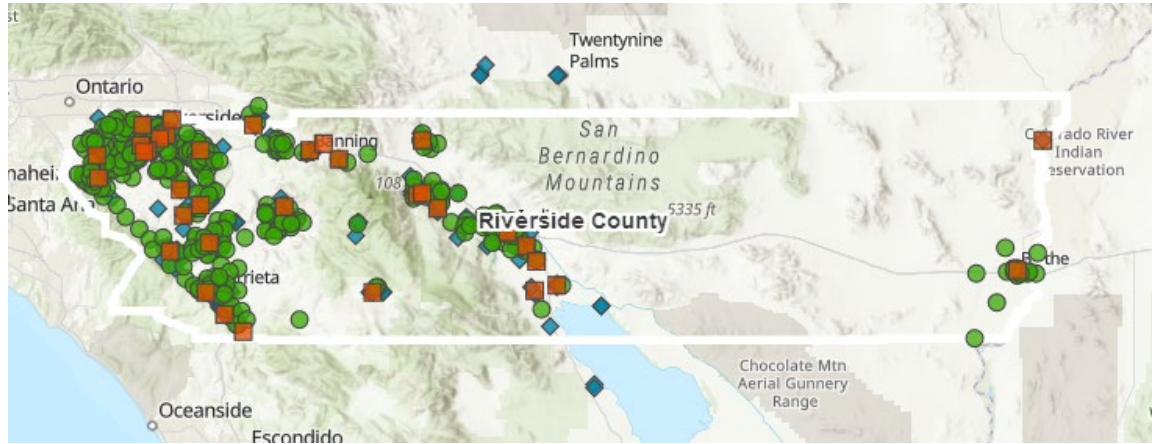

**Forecast Discussion**

Temperatures will continue to increase region-wide today. Inland areas will trend drier through the end of the week, allowing for the excessive heat to peak today through Thursday, especially across the deserts and inland valleys. The heat risk will persist through Friday across the Inland Empire. Warm and humid conditions will persist across coastal areas through the end of the work week. Cooler conditions will take hold of the region for the second half of the weekend into next week, with high temperatures returning to near seasonal averages.

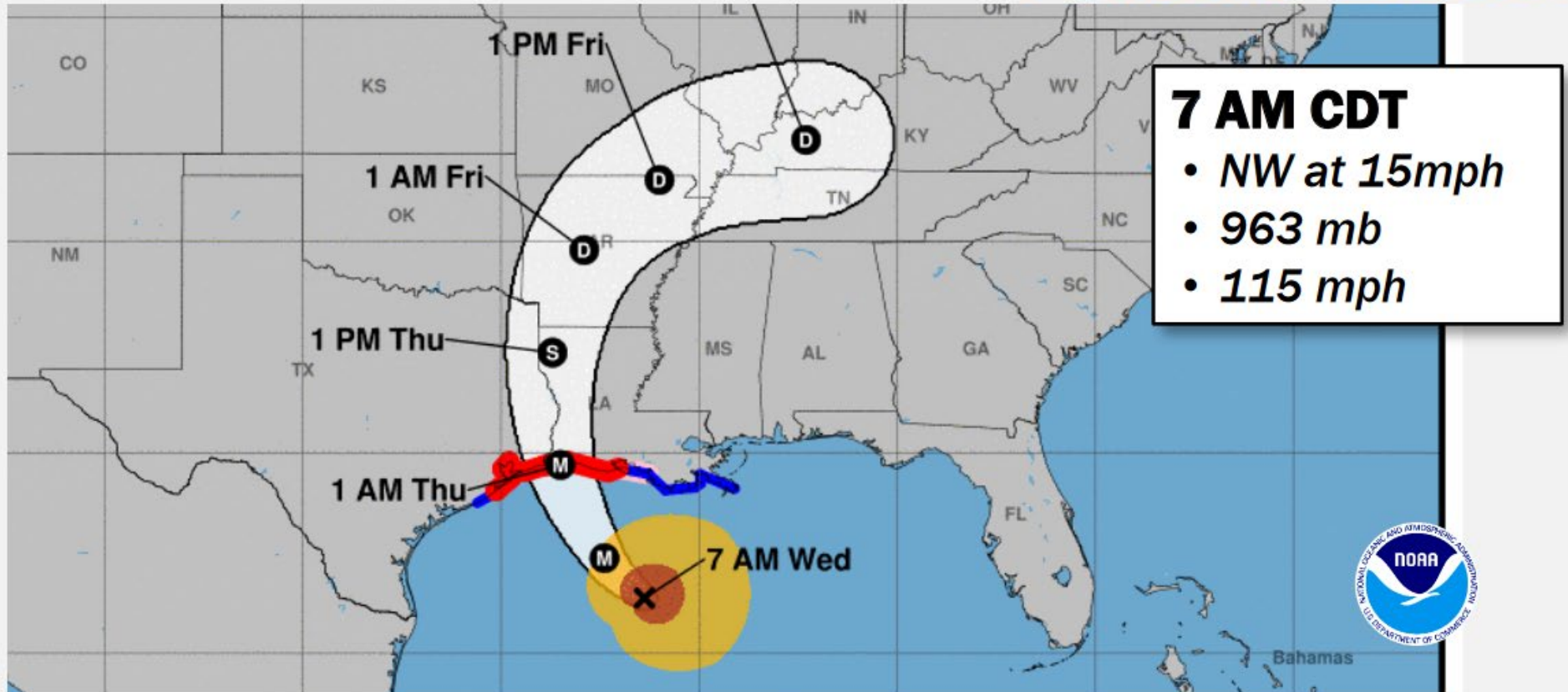

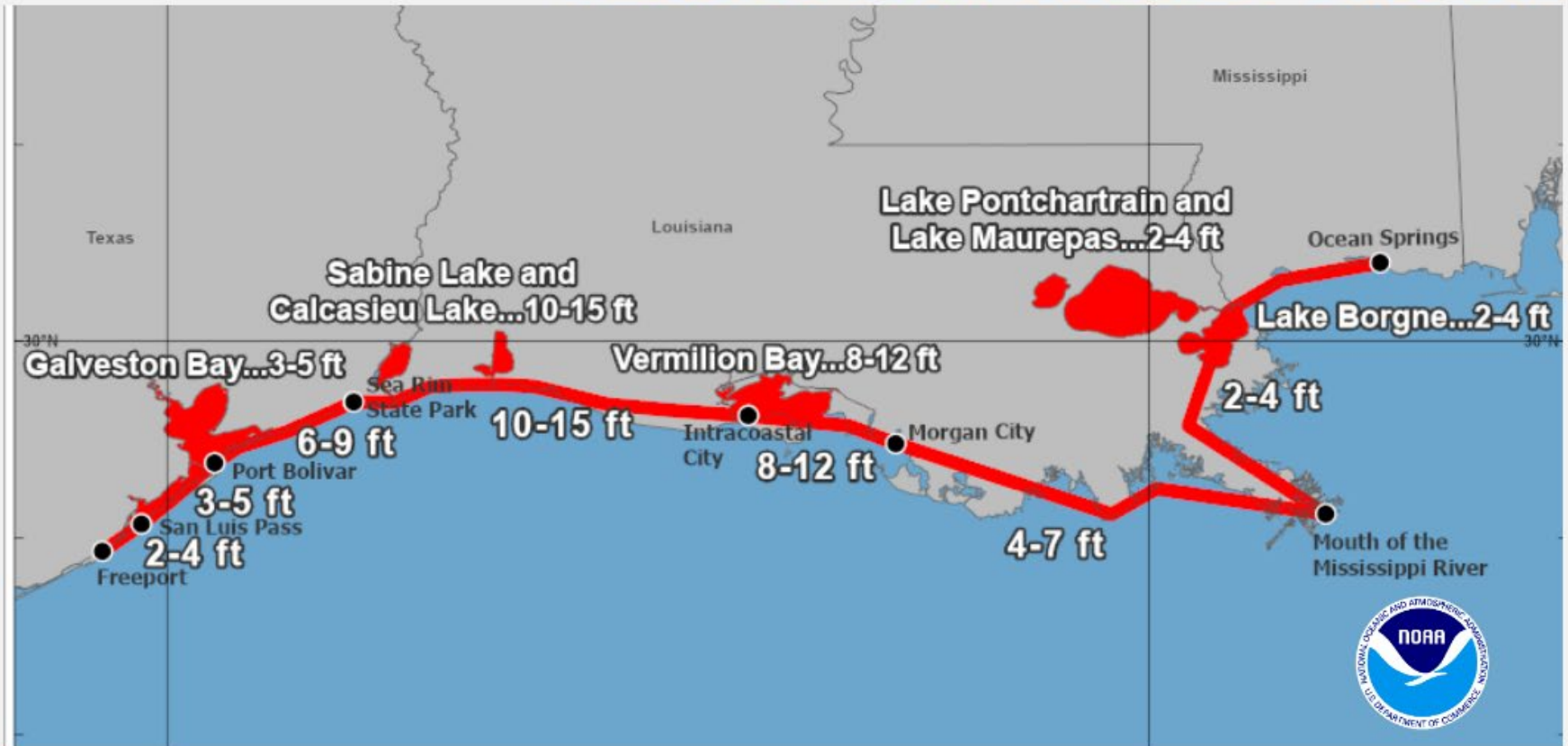

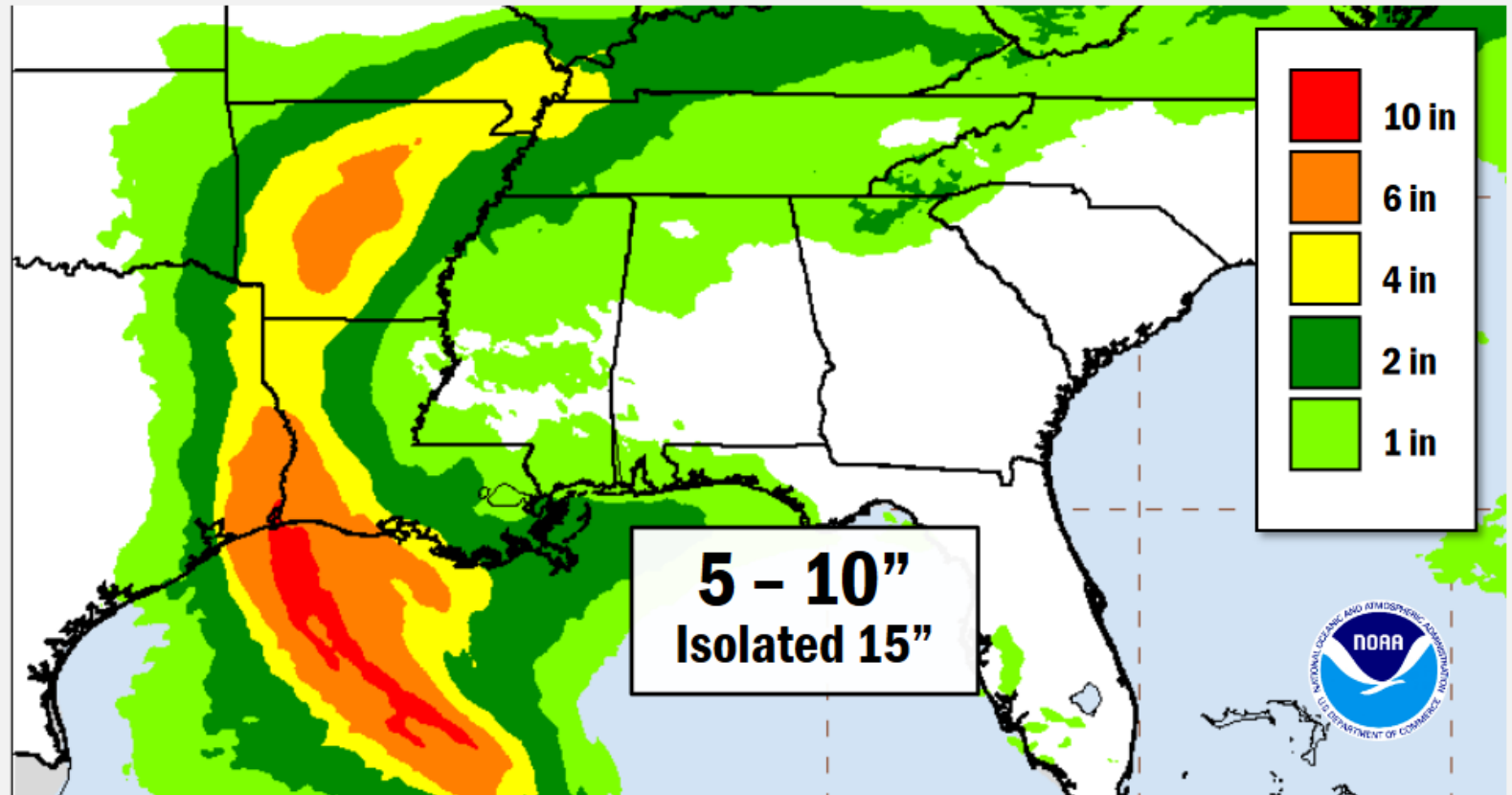

### Flood Hazard Messages (associated with Hurricane Laura)

- The National Hurricane Center (NHC) is forecasting life-threatening storm surge along the east Texas and western Louisiana coasts.
- Rainfall from Laura is expected to impact east Texas through central Louisiana this afternoon and move northward into eastern Oklahoma and Arkansas on Thursday.
- From east Texas through central Louisiana and into Arkansas, expected rainfall storm totals of 5 to 10 inches, with isolated maximum amounts of 15 inches, will cause widespread flash and urban flooding, small streams and creeks to overflow their banks, and minor to isolated moderate freshwater river flooding.
- Current River Forecast Centers (RFC) forecasts shown on this map account for water that is forecast to push up the rivers due to storm surge.
- Friday into Saturday, rainfall totals of 2 to 4 inches, with isolated maximum amounts of 6 inches are likely across the mid-Mississippi and portions of the Lower Ohio and Lower Tennessee Valleys as tropical moisture from Laura moves through the region. This rainfall may lead to localized flash and urban flooding and rapid rises on small streams.
- Interests in the aforementioned regions should continue to monitor their local National Weather Service forecast and ensure they have their flood plan in place.

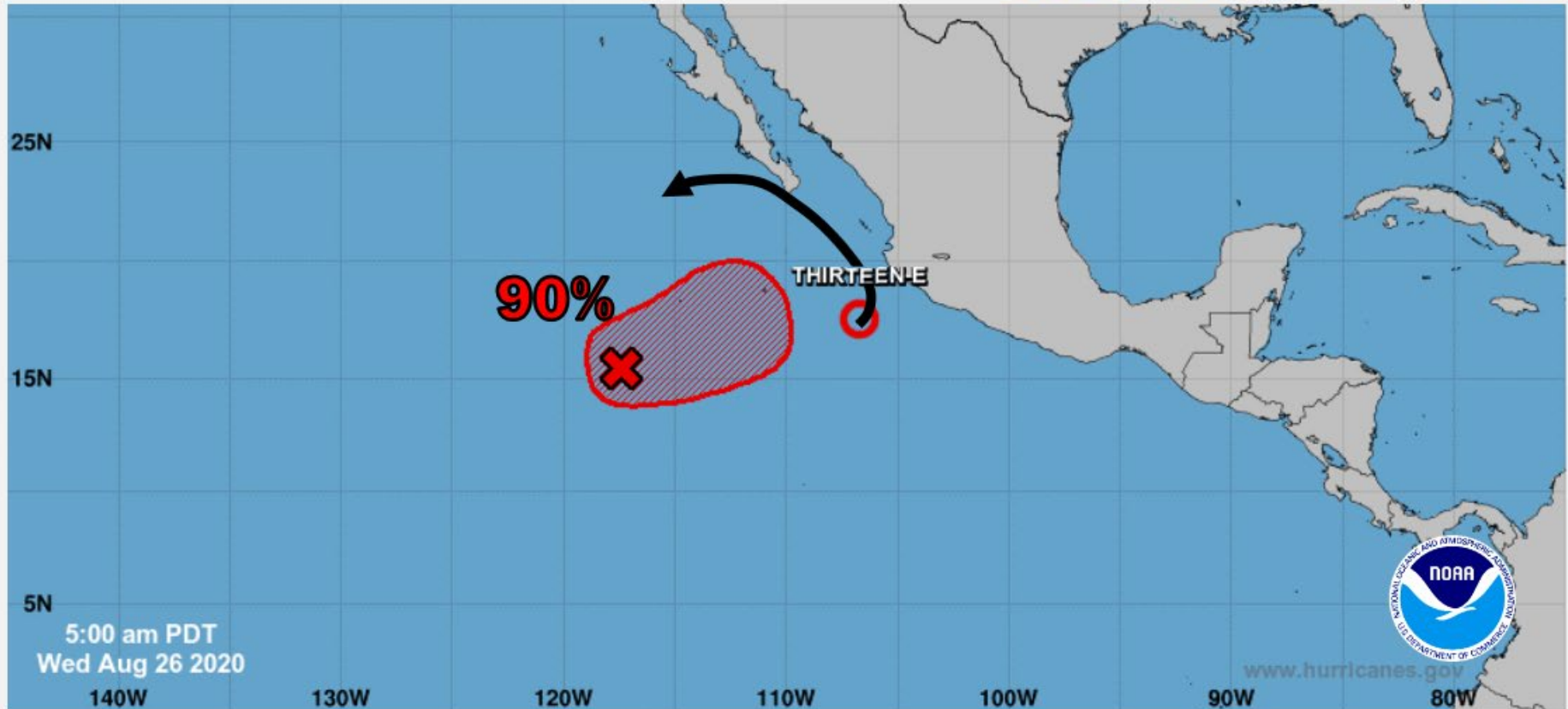

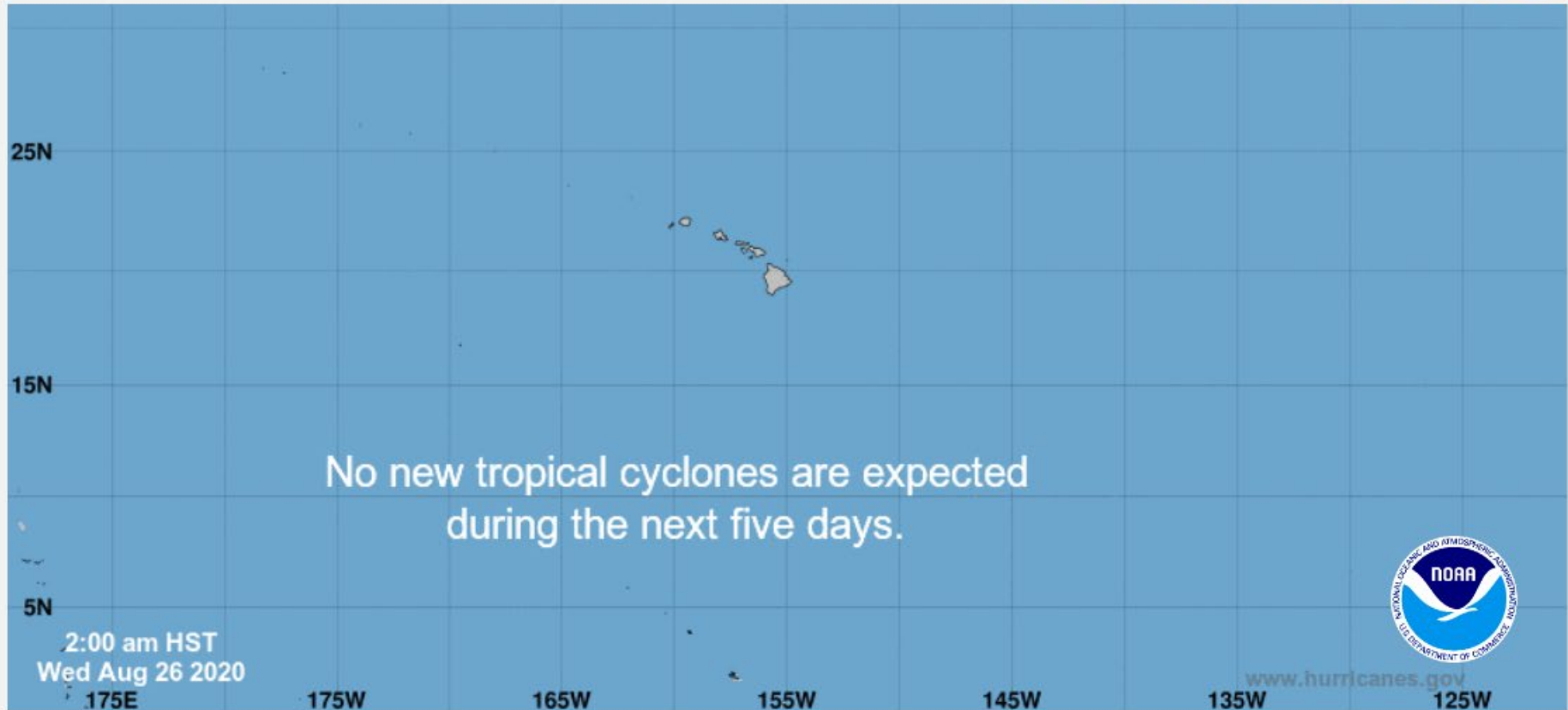

# California Wildfires – Response



## Situation:

There are 367 fires currently burning across CA, 21 (-4) are classified as Major Fires. 6 have FMAGS approved with a combined 880k acres burned, 82k homes threatened and 1k homes destroyed. Air Quality Alerts in effect for 11 counties.

## Lifeline Impacts: (FEMA Region IX Tri-Fold, as of Aug 26)

### Safety and Security

- Evacuations: Mandatory and Voluntary in effect for 19 counties

### Food, Water, Shelter

- Shelters:
  - Congregated: 15 open; 1,329 occupants
