


### Social Impact COVID-19 Events in the United States





#### **Behavioral Health Service Utilization**





- From March to May 2020, Riverside University Health System Behavioral Health (RUHS-BH) has seen a 16% increase in the number of services utilized compared to January to February 2020. This increase may be attributed to the availability of telehealth services, improving access to care.
- 27% decrease in the number of new individuals starting substance use and/or mental health services.
- Crisis stabilization services have remained relatively unchanged. However, there was a 4% decrease in the number of individuals who received crisis stabilization services.
- RUHS-BH HOPE team has supported the Housing Authority 's Project Room Key initiative by helping house over 400 homeless individuals since the beginning of the pandemic.
- No significant increases in the primary substance of choice among individuals seeking treatment during the pandemic (approximately 23% alcohol, 9% marijuana, 34% methamphetamine/amphetamine and 34% opioids).

#### Suicides, Suicidal Ideations and Attempts





### coronavirus (covid-19) Economic Impacts







# Hurricane Laura FORECAST TRACK








# Hurricane Laura PEAK STORM SURGE FORECAST




# Hurricane Laura 5 DAY RAINFALL

# California Wildfires – Response



#### Situation:

There are 367 fires currently burning across CA, 21 (-4) are classified as Major Fires. 6 have FMAGS approved with a combined 880k acres burned, 82k homes threatened and 1k homes destroyed. Air Quality Alerts in effect for 11 counties.

#### Lifeline Impacts: (FEMA Region IX Tri-Fold, as of Aug 26)


- · Evacuations: Mandatory and Voluntary in effect for 19 counties
- Food, Water, Shelter
- Shelters:
  - o Congregated: 15 open; 1,329 occupants
- Non-Congregated: 2,054 occupants in 588 rooms at 39 hotels Health and Medical
- 6 confirmed fatalities

#### State / Local Response:

- State of Emergency declared Aug 19<sup>th</sup>
- CA EOC at Full Activation (Wildfires & COVID-19)

#### FEMA Response:

- 6 FMAGS approved statewide
- FEMA-4558-DR-CA approved on Aug 22<sup>nd</sup>
- Region IX IMAT-1 deployed to CA (Wildfires)
- · SMT (2) deploying to Sharp Army Depot in Lathrop, CA
- · MERS assets deployed to Tracy, CA and enroute to Mather, CA
- · NWC and Region IX RWC continue to monitor






