Please see the attachments for further details, contact information, and hyperlinks regarding the Tesla Battery Power Pack program. This program provides a free power pack (and standard maintenance for 10 years) to eligible entity facilities that meet the criteria. Some work may need to be performed on an entity's current infrastructure such as modifications or upgrades in order to utilize the power pack battery.

Only commercial and governmental entities (including tribal governments) are eligible for this program and they need to meet the outlined criteria. This is **not** for residential customers. A good portion of Riverside County is located in the CPUC Tier 2 or 3 High Fire Threat Districts maps which is part of the criteria.

Pakistan, China cooperate on virus vaccine

- Pakistan's foreign ministry spokesman says his country and China agreed to strengthen cooperation in developing a vaccine for the coronavirus.
- The ministry spokesman Zahid Hafeez Chaudhri says Beijing has agreed to keep supporting Pakistan to overcome the impact of the coronavirus. He says this understanding was reached during a recent visit of Pakistani foreign minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi to China.
- The announcement comes days after Pakistan's drug regulatory agency approved final-phase testing of a Chinese-made vaccine against coronavirus. Pakistan reopened business in May and plans to reopen schools next month.

New CDC Testing Guideline Is 'Recipe For Community Spread': AMA

- Newly updated testing guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention now say people who have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for the COVID-19 virus do not necessarily need to seek a test if they are not showing symptoms.
- Dr. Anthony Fauci, told CNN he's "worried it will give people the incorrect assumption that asymptomatic spread is not of great concern. In fact it is," reporting from the AP states.

- The American Medical Association, in a statement, called the change "a recipe for community spread."

Doctors On The Front Lines Are Testing New Therapies To Treat Coronavirus

- Researchers have been working furiously to identify medications and treatments to combat the novel coronavirus that causes COVID-19. While there are still no definitive answers, the Food and Drug Administration recently authorized emergency use of what's called convalescent blood plasma, an antibody-rich fluid that's donated by people who have survived a previous COVID-19 infection. This emergency use authorization (EUA) will make it easier for doctors to give donated plasma to COVID-19 patients as part of a standard course of hospital treatment.
- Other Experimental Drugs: Beyond supportive care such as oxygen, researchers are studying several therapies other than convalescent plasma that could ease symptoms and possibly ward off life-threatening complications. "We do not currently have any known treatment that will kill the virus or decrease its growth,"
- Doctors sometimes trying multiple drugs in seriously ill patients, when people recover it's hard to know what—if anything—helped. Or whether a drug caused harm. That's why clinical trials are so important
- However, even after a vaccine goes through all the necessary testing to prove that it's safe and effective, it still takes time to ramp up a global supply, she says. We'll know more by then about who the at-risk groups are and who we should prioritize to get the vaccine.
- Like the flu vaccine, a COVID-19 vaccine is unlikely to provide complete protection against the virus.
- The real goal is to protect against severe disease, so that even if you do get infected, you'll be more likely to have a mild case and avoid serious complications, such as pneumonia.

- Hundreds of teachers on Tuesday rallied against a full in-person school reopening. For hours, teachers protested outside East Haven High School while inside the auditorium, the Board of Education applauded the district's work on its reopening plan.
- By the end of the night, some board members said they were surprised by teachers' reaction, noting they were not required to approve the reopening plan, saying they were "not really involved." The board ultimately added to their agenda to talk about teacher concerns.

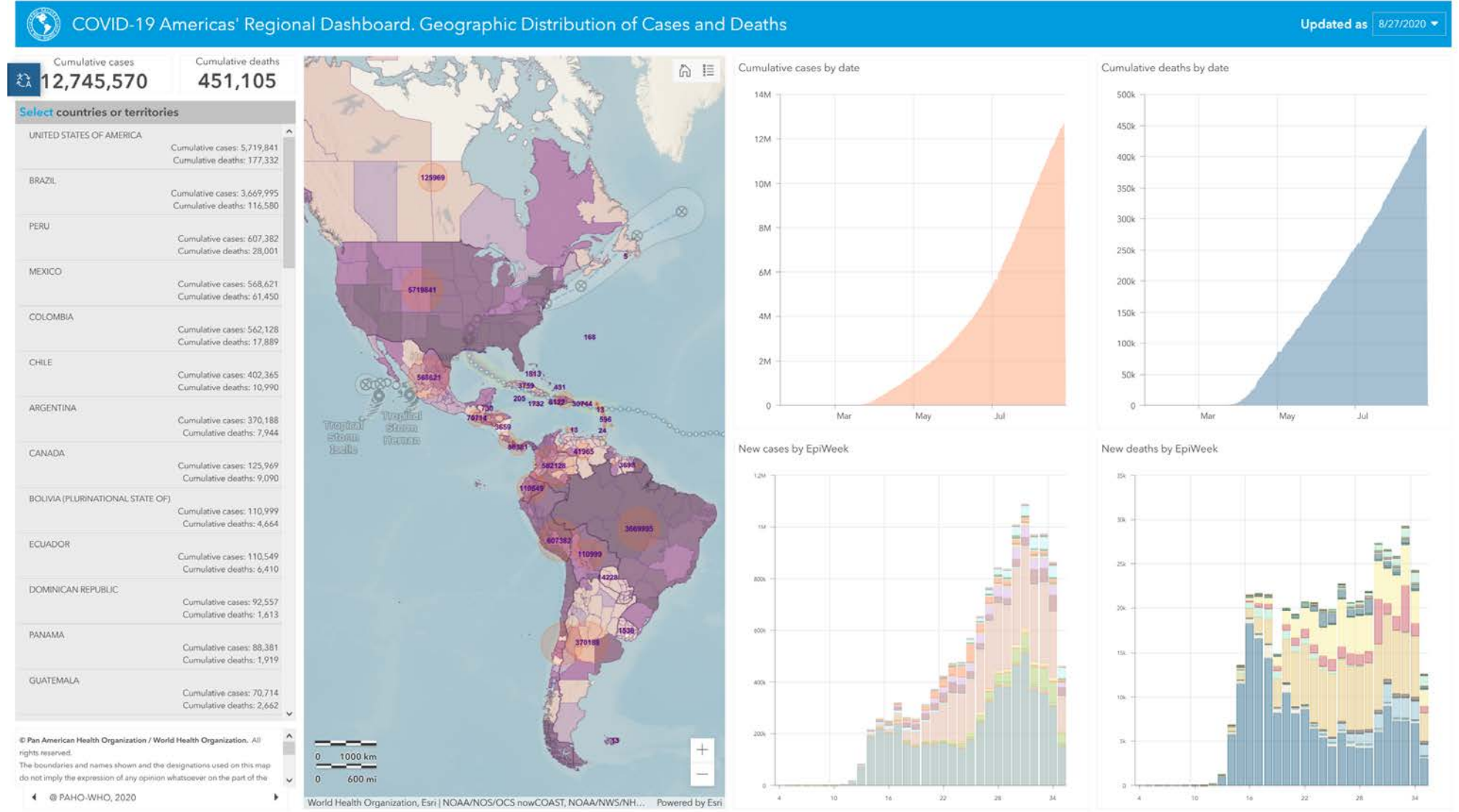

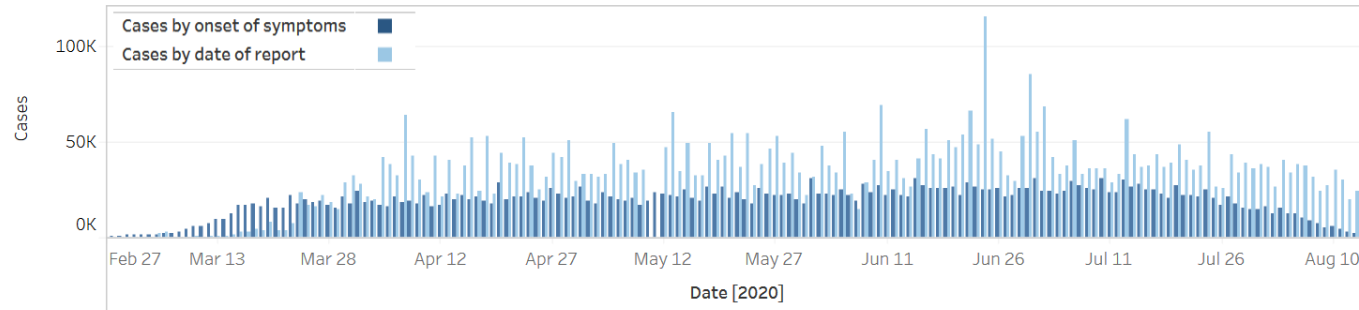

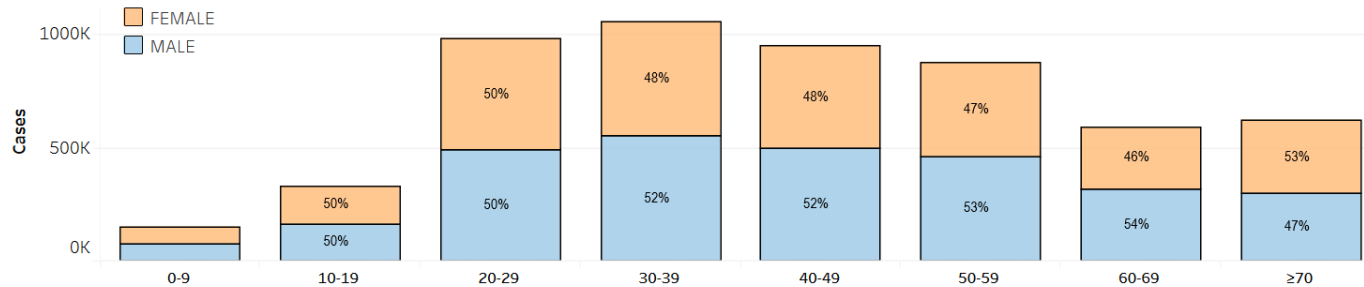

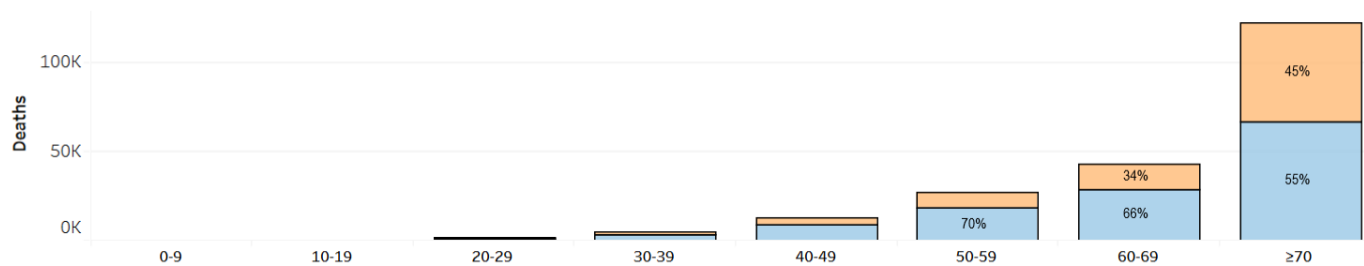
Epidemiological curve



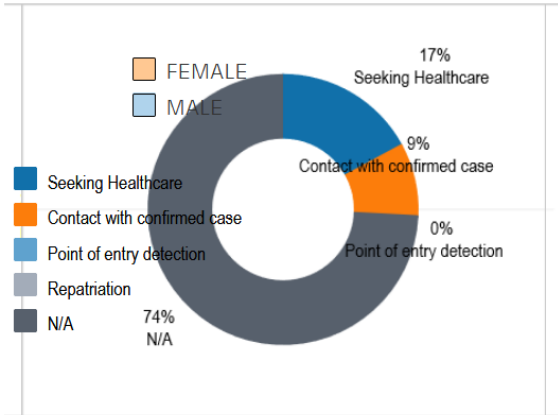
Total confirmed cases by age group



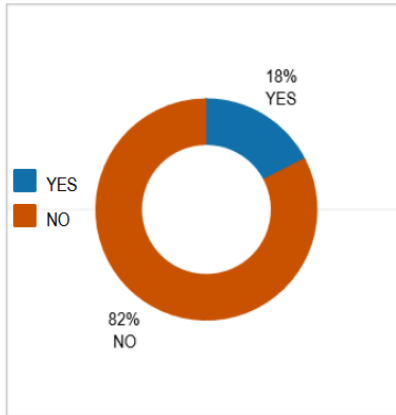
Total confirmed deaths by age group



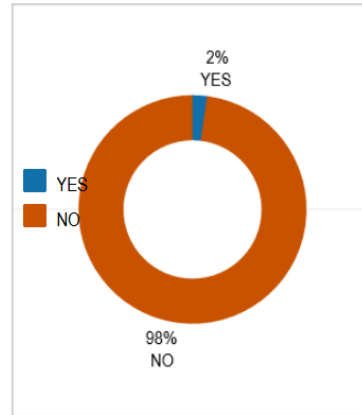

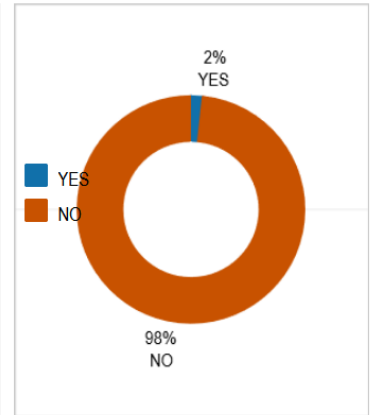

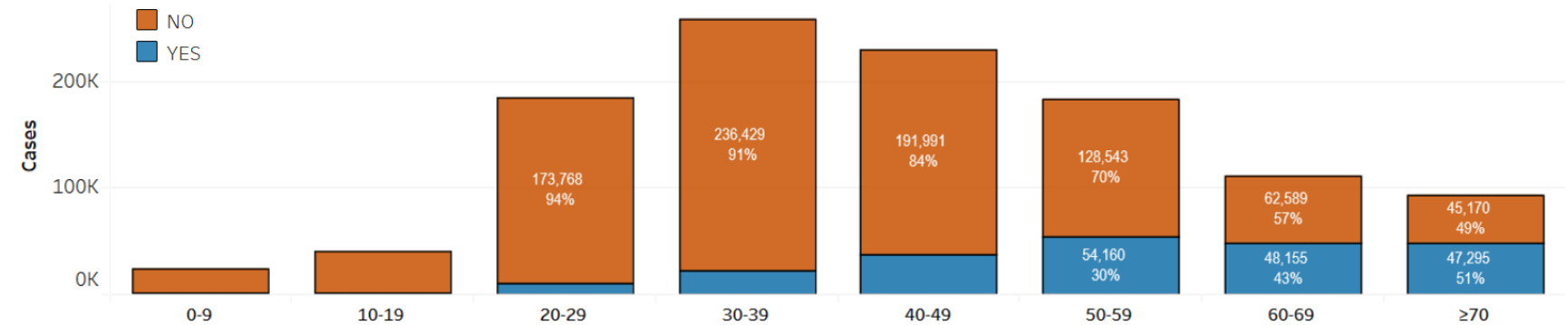

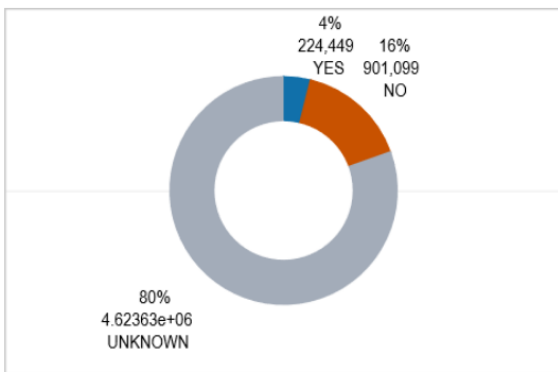

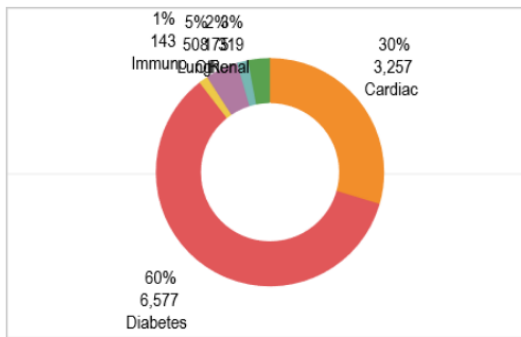

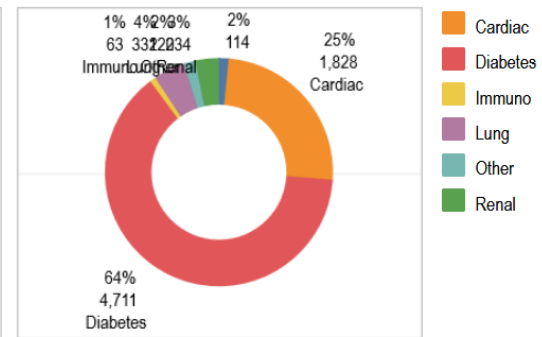

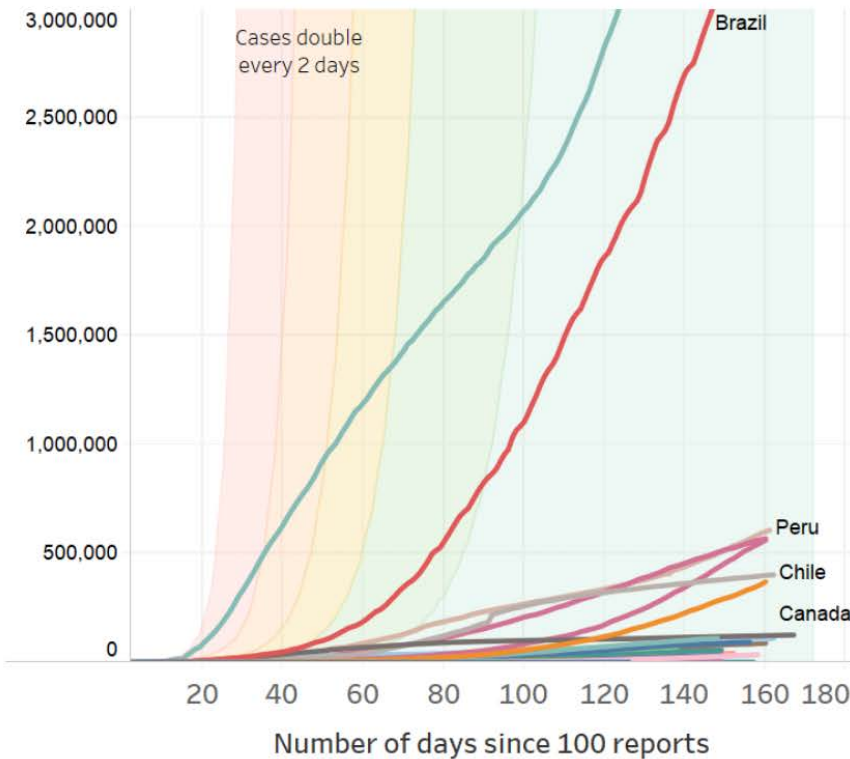

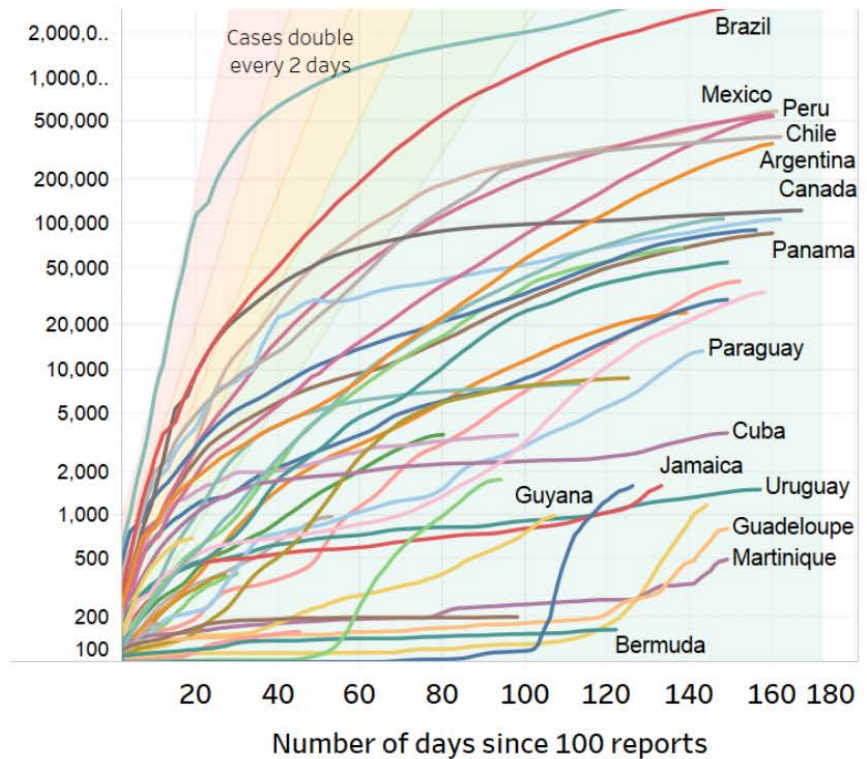

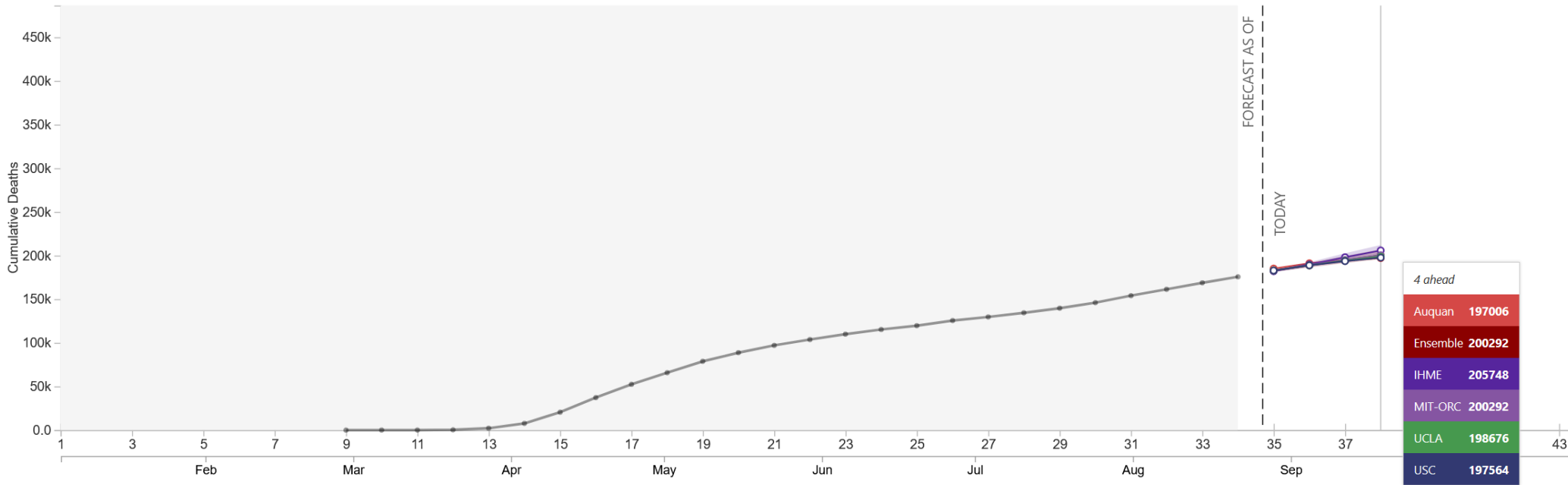

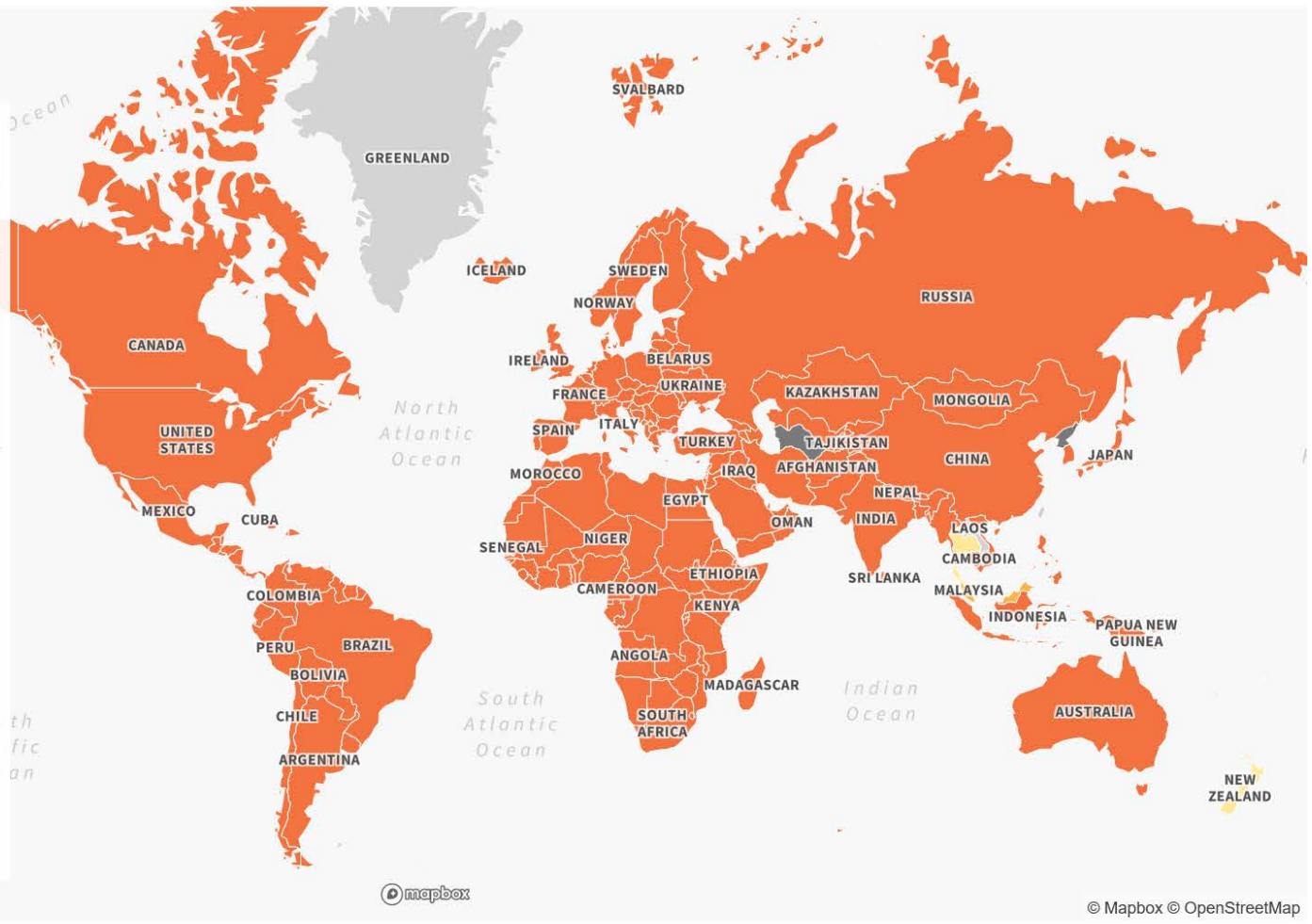

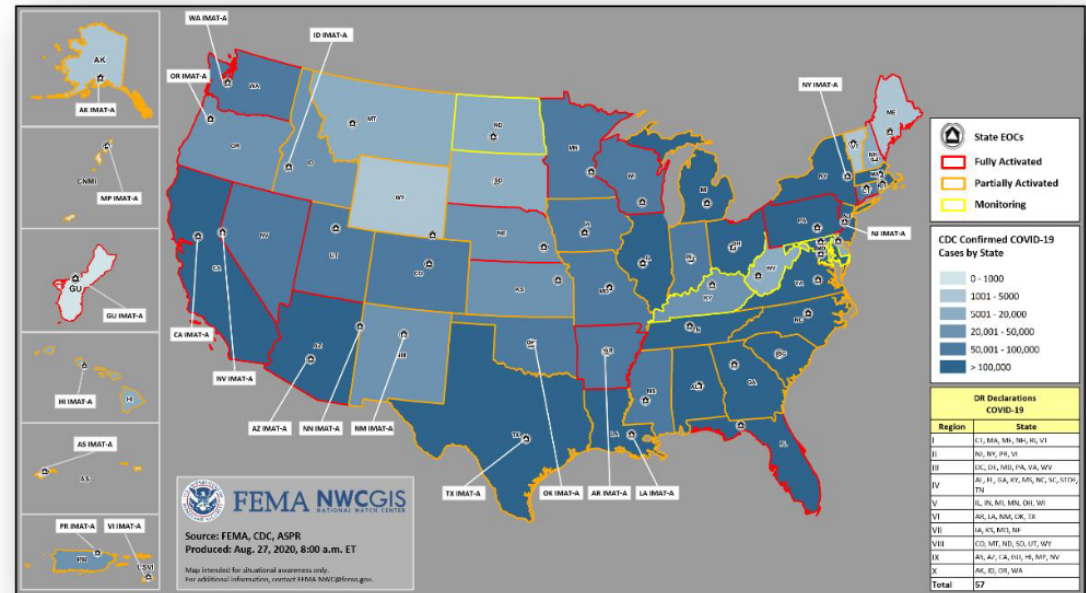

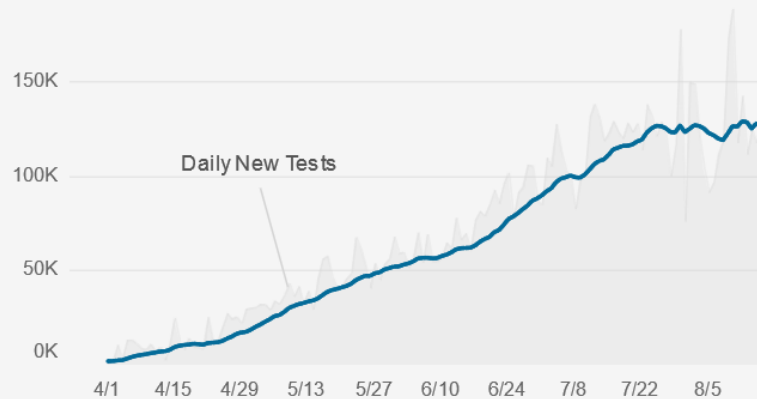

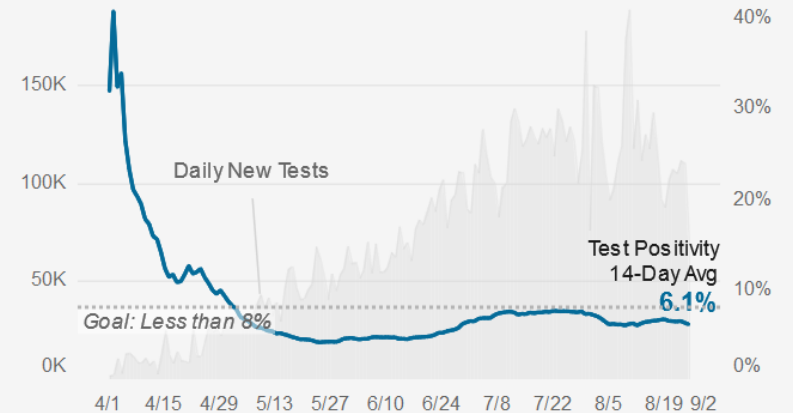

County Administrative Center and other county buildings reopen for limited in-person services

The County Administrative Center, located at 4080 Lemon St. in Riverside, will again reopen to the public on Tuesday, Sept. 8. Other county facilities will also reopen, although in-person services at all locations will be limited.

Community members are asked to call ahead or check the county department's website to find out if the service they need can be done remotely. Some in-person services may require an appointment.

"County services are even more important during this pandemic, as so many of our programs help to improve the lives of our residents," said County Executive Officer George Johnson. "We've also started brand-new services to help lessen the consequences from this pandemic. Using both high-tech and low-tech ways, we can continue to serve our residents and keep everyone safer."

County facilities closed to the public in March, then again in July following a surge of coronavirus hospitalizations. The number of new coronavirus cases have decreased over the past few weeks, reflected in fewer patients throughout Riverside County requiring hospitalization or intensive care.

Upon arriving at a county facility, community members and employees will be asked if they are feeling well or have any COVID-like symptoms. Face coverings are required for everyone to enter. Face masks or face shields will be made available to anyone without one.

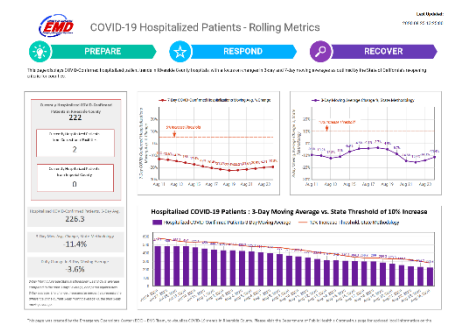
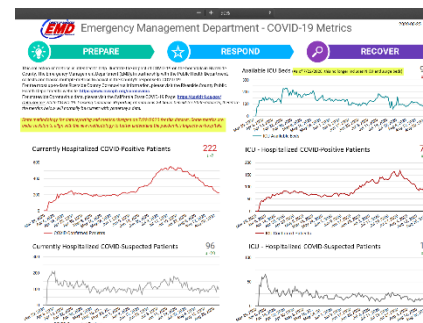
When anyone reports symptoms, residents will be directed to conduct their business over the phone or online. Employees reporting symptoms will be sent home until cleared to return to work.

In addition, clear partitions have been installed at front desk or counter areas, as well as floor markings to keep people distanced by six feet when standing in line. Elevators are also limited to no more than four people at a time.

Licensed Hospital/ICU Beds Utilization Trends

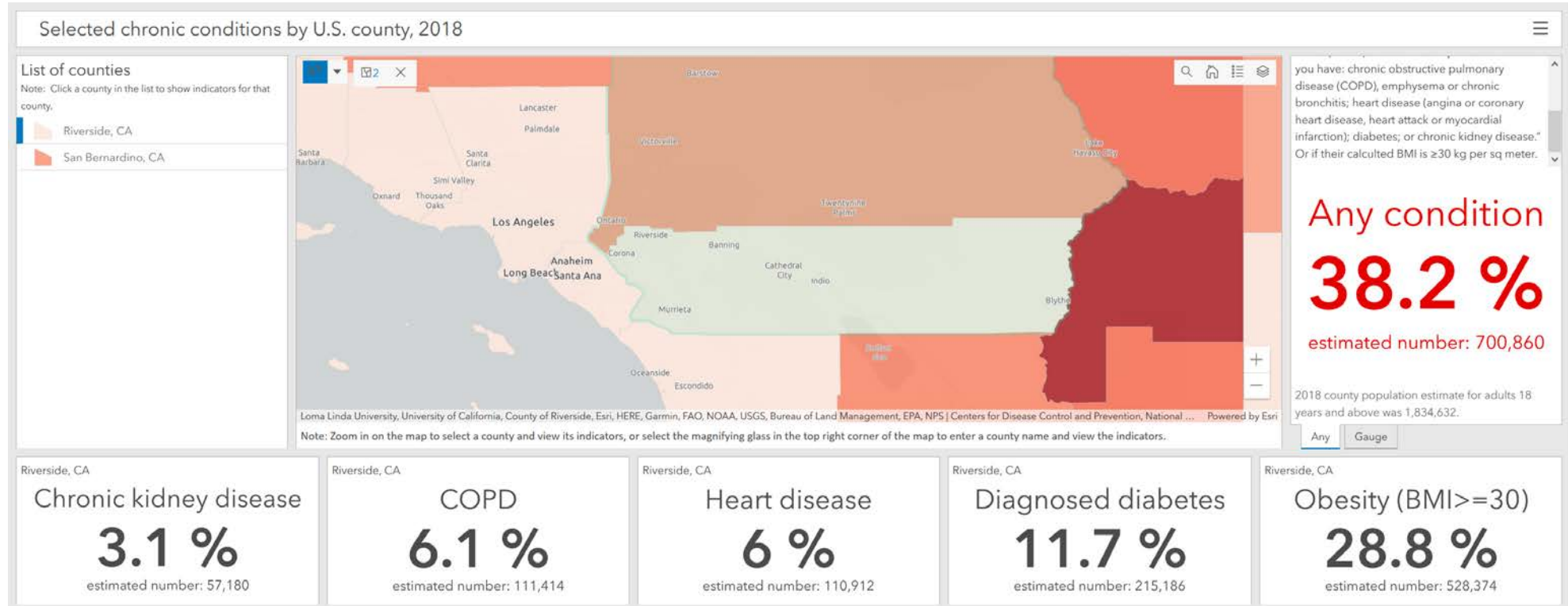

Forecast Discussion

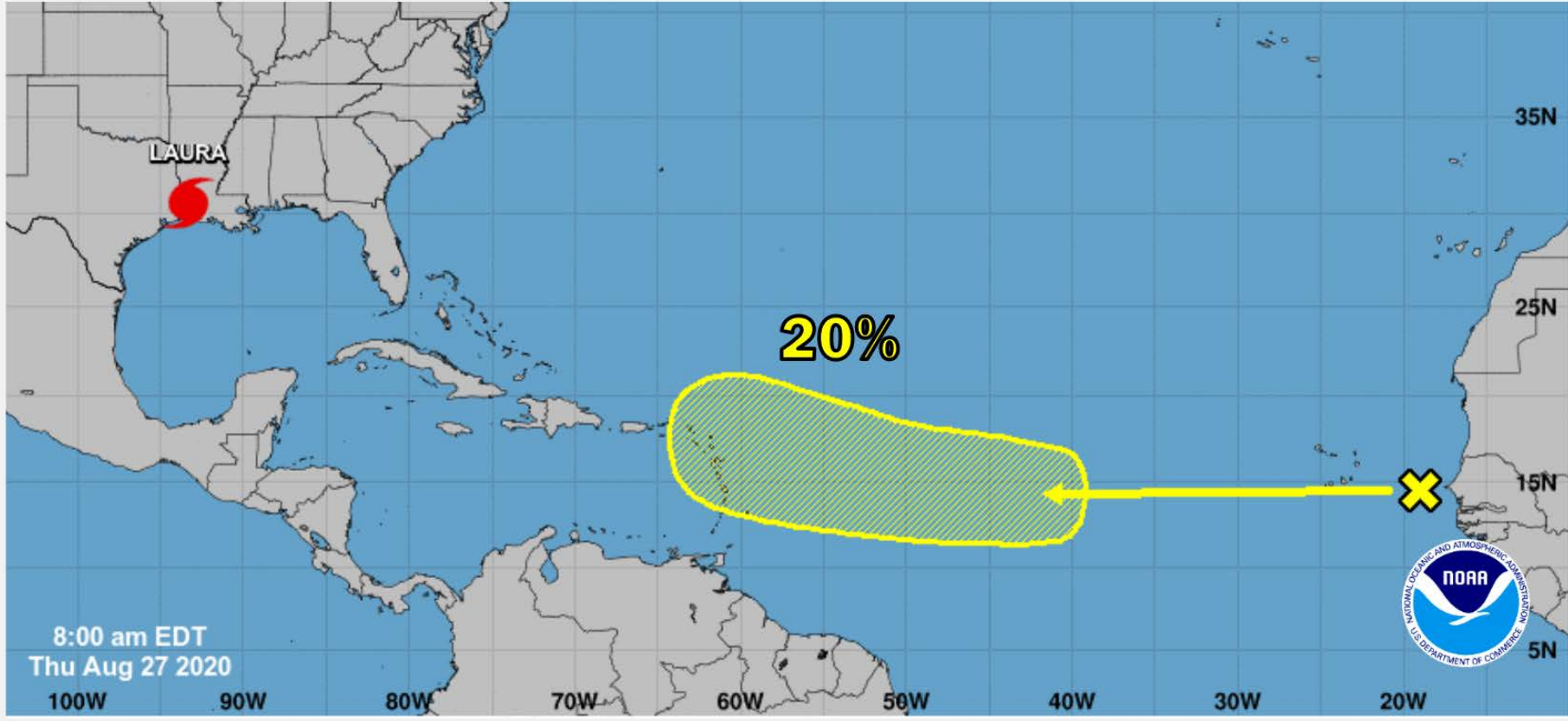

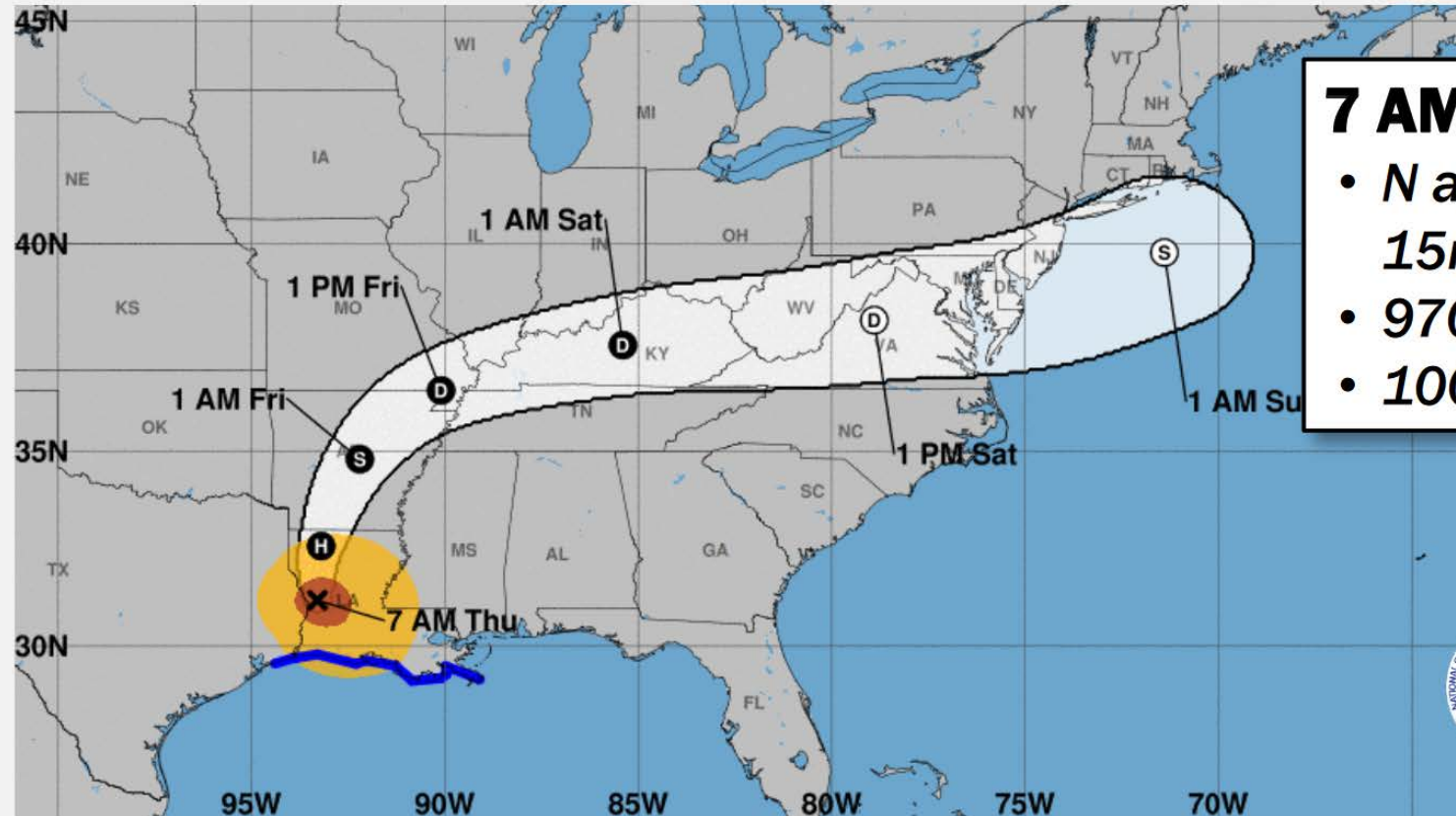

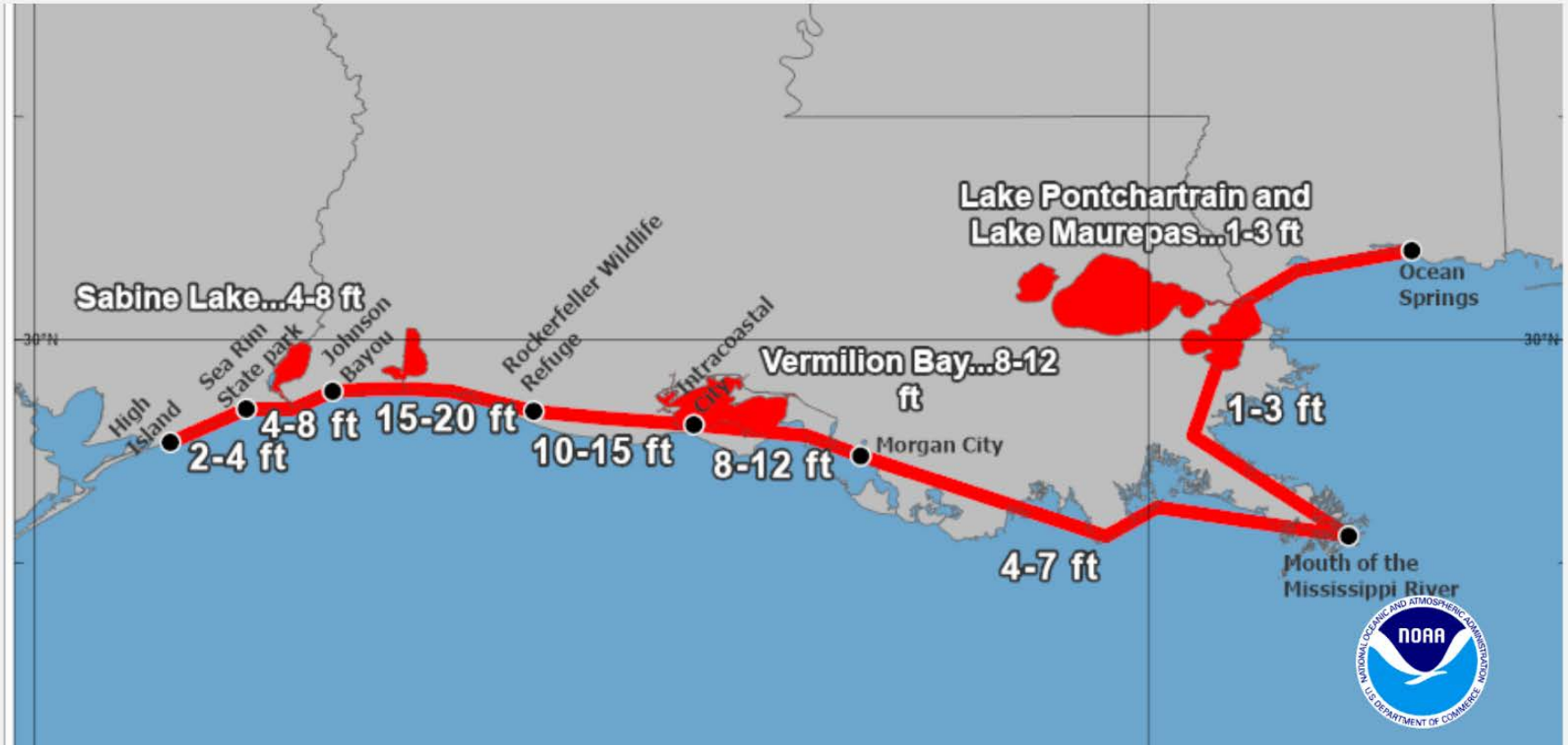

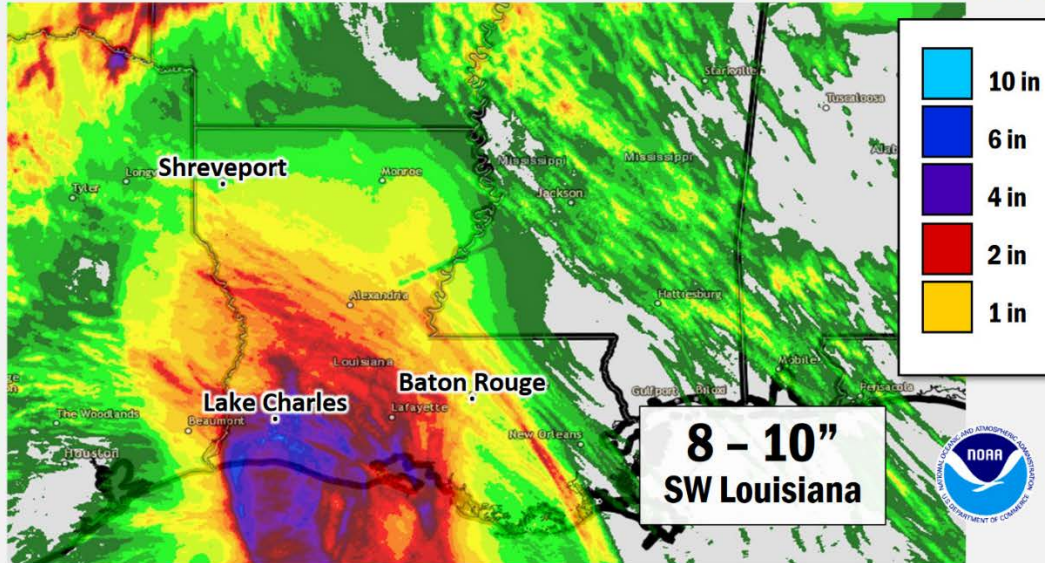

PEAK STORM SURGE FORECAST



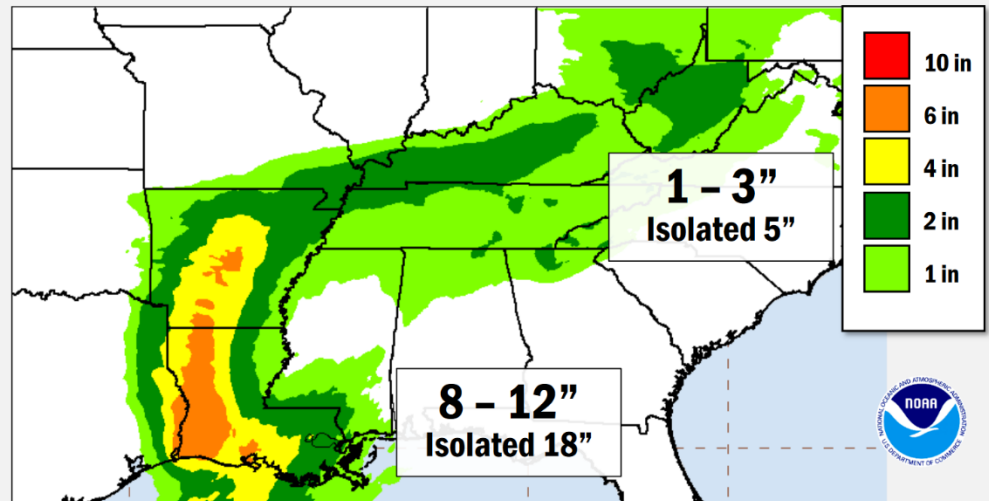

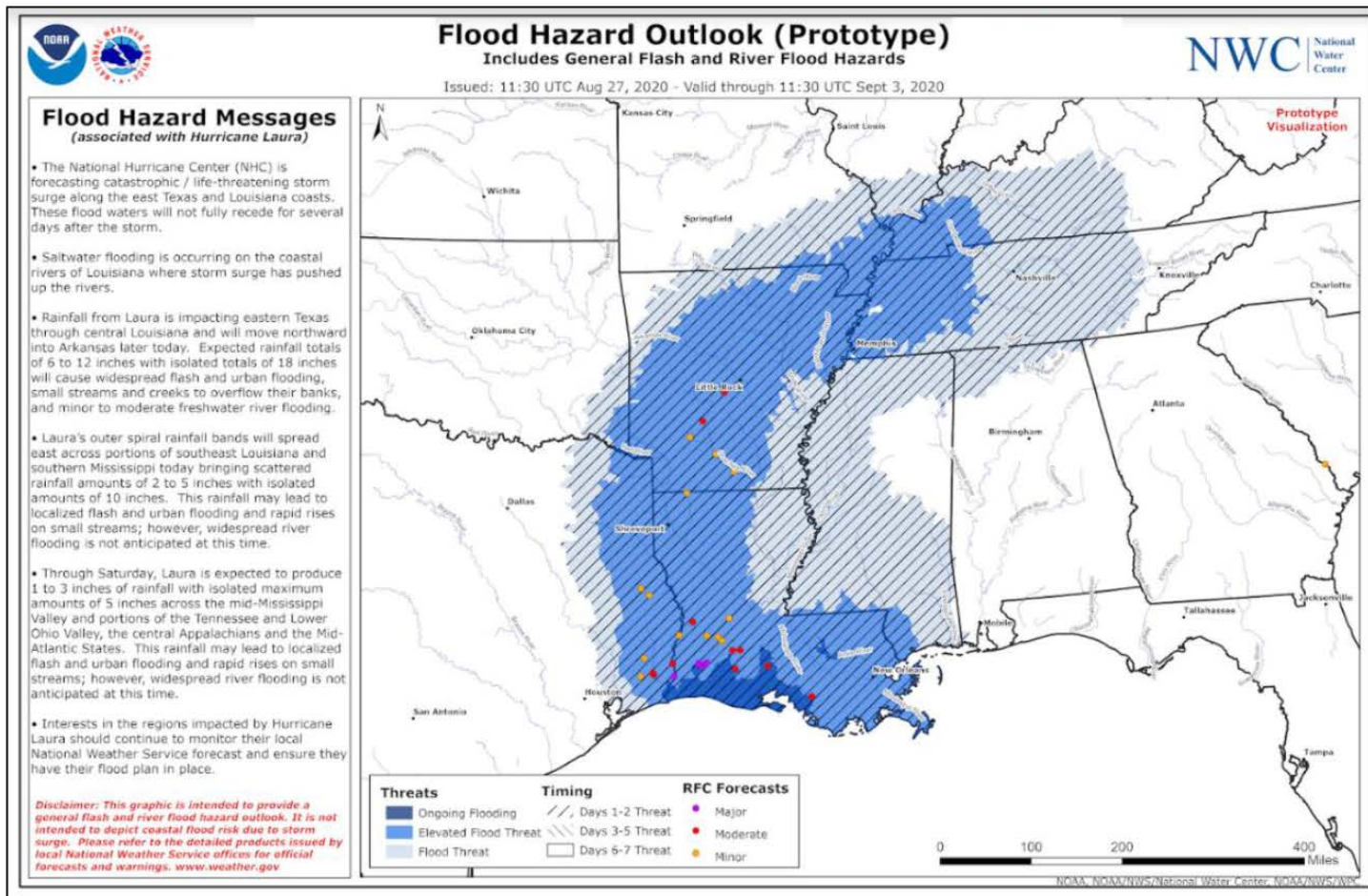
3 DAY RAINFALL

Laura is a Category 2 Hurricane that made landfall near Cameron, LA at 2:00 a.m. ET. Rapid weakening is forecast, and Laura is expected to become a Tropical Storm later today.

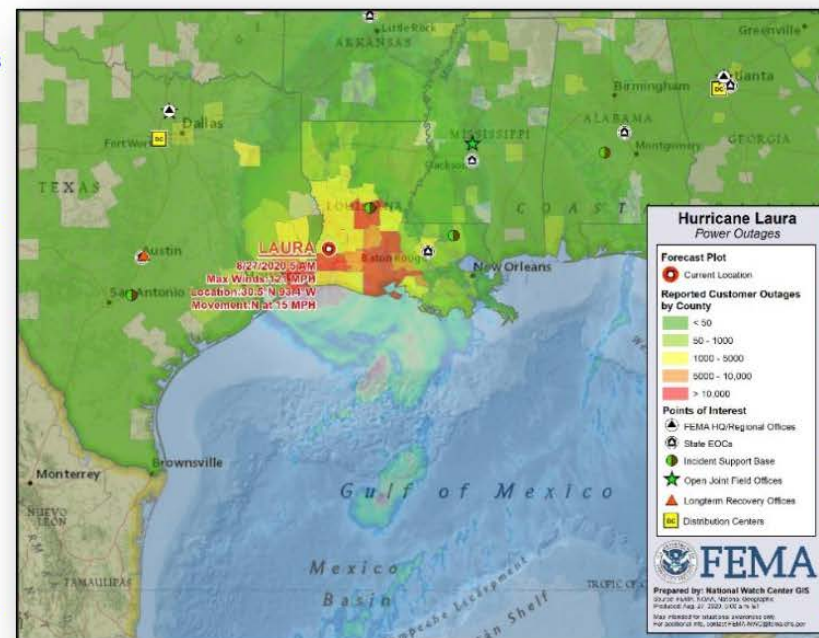

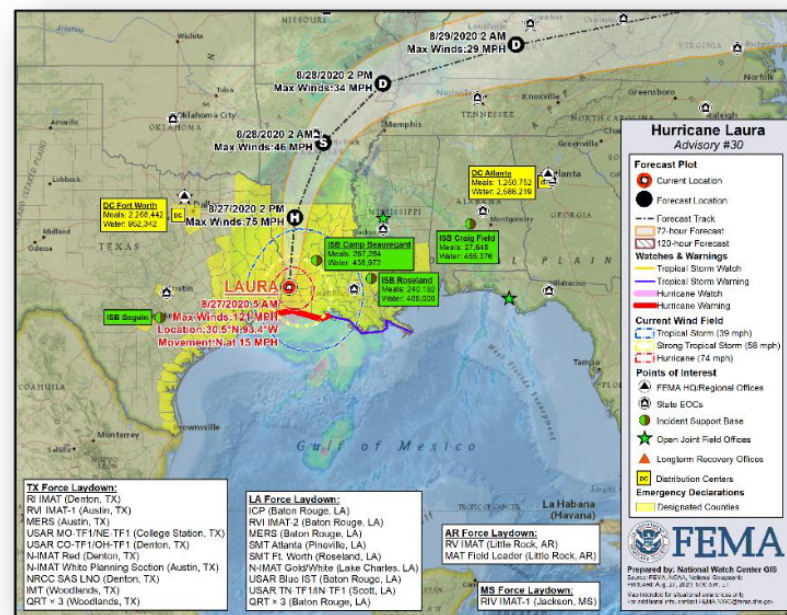

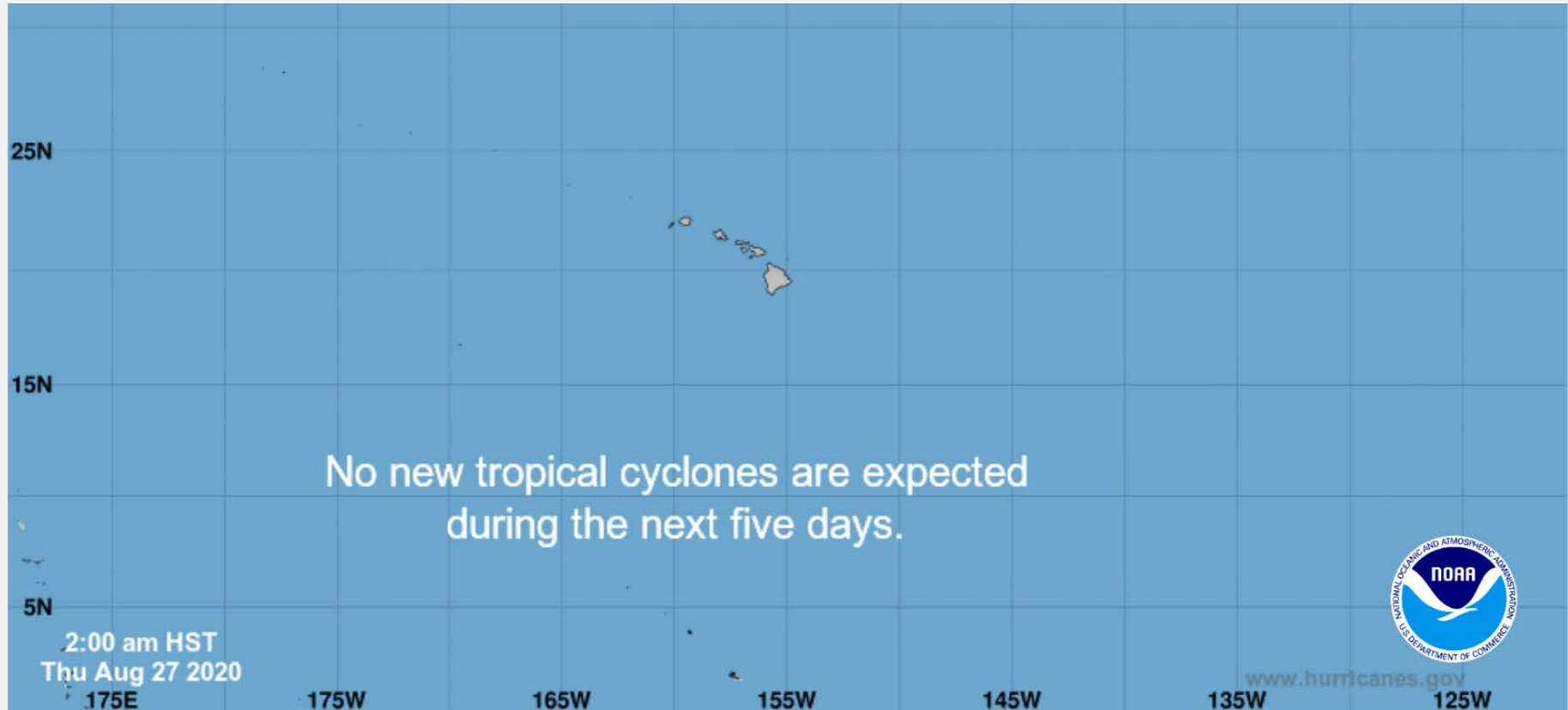

There are 367 fires currently burning across CA, 24 are classified as Major Fires. 6 have FMAGS approved and are reporting a combined 1.4 millions acres burned, 80k homes threatened and 1k homes destroyed. Air Quality Alerts in effect for 11 counties.

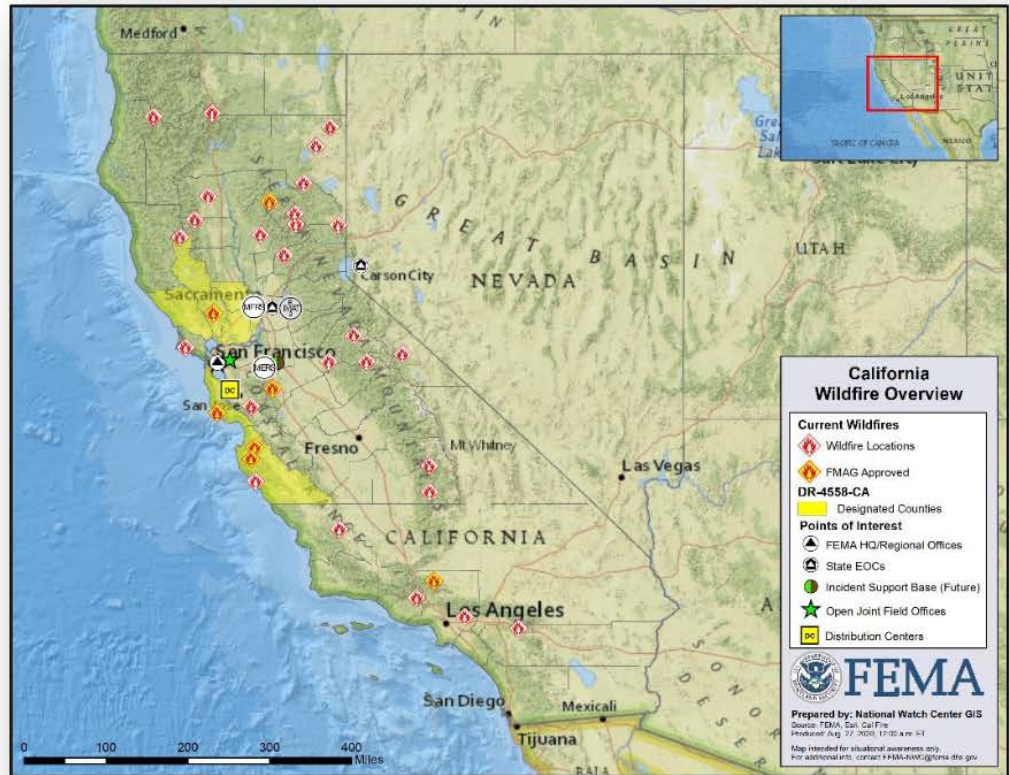
