A Year of Covid - What Scientists Wish They Knew a Year Ago About the Covid-19 Pandemic

- On January 20, 2020, the first known case of covid-19 in the U.S. was reported—a man in his 30s who had traveled back to Washington State from Wuhan, China, where the first cases of the novel viral disease had been discovered in December 2019. Nearly everyone failed to predict the full scale of the devastation that would follow, largely fueled by those in power who did little to prepare us for the worst.
- Of course, the coronavirus was likely circulating in the U.S. well before the official first case on January 20. Twelve months later, covid-19 has claimed at least 2 million lives worldwide, including more than 400,000 Americans. And though we now have several effective vaccines available against the virus, it may still take months to turn the tide.
- We asked several public health experts and scientists to reflect on the past pandemic year. If they had the chance, what would they tell the public—and themselves—in late January 2020 about what was coming?

Dr. Fauci says new data shows Covid vaccines appear to be less effective against some new strains

- New data shows that the Covid-19 vaccines currently on the market may not be as effective in guarding against new, more contagious strains of the coronavirus, White House health advisor Dr. Anthony Fauci said on Thursday.
- A handful of new strains of the coronavirus have emerged overseas that have given scientists some cause for concern. Some variants that have been identified in the United Kingdom, South Africa and Brazil appear to be more transmissible than previous strains but not necessarily more deadly.
- While it's no surprise the virus is mutating, researchers are quickly trying to determine what the changes might mean for recently developed lifesaving vaccines and therapeutics against the disease.

'Packed us together like sardines': Guard deployed to Capitol struggles to contain Covid

- The National Guard has struggled to implement a plan to test troops flowing into and out of Washington, D.C., for Covid-19, with some Guard members being forced to find their own tests and others pressured to leave their quarantine early to report to duty.
- Already, hundreds of Guard members who poured into Washington, D.C., after the Jan. 6 assault on the U.S. Capitol have tested positive for Covid-19 or are quarantining in nearby hotels, three Guard sources said. Guard leadership has declined to release an official number of positive cases, but troops and lawmakers alike worry that the deployment is becoming a superspreader event.
- "Ideally, these guys should all be in hotels. When they're taking rest time, they should be taking it outside the campus with an ability to be separated and socially distanced," Sen. Chris Murphy (D-Conn.) said. "Ultimately we've got to make sure that they're not taking their extended rest time on campus, that they're in hotel rooms."

Executive Order on Protecting Worker Health and Safety

- Issue, within 2 weeks of the date of this order and in conjunction or consultation with the heads of any other appropriate executive departments and agencies (agencies), revised guidance to employers on workplace safety during the COVID-19 pandemic
- Review the enforcement efforts of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) related to COVID-19 and identify any short-, medium-, and long-term changes that could be made to better protect workers and ensure equity in enforcement; launch a national program to focus OSHA enforcement efforts related to COVID-19 on violations that put the largest number of workers at serious risk or are contrary to anti-retaliation principles; This campaign shall include engagement with labor unions, community organizations, and industries, and place a special emphasis on communities hit hardest by the pandemic.

Executive Order on a Sustainable Public Health Supply Chain

- This order directs immediate actions to secure supplies necessary for responding to the pandemic, so that those supplies are available, and remain available, to the Federal Government and State, local, Tribal, and territorial authorities, as well as to America's health care workers, health systems, and patients. These supplies are vital to the Nation's ability to reopen its schools and economy as soon and safely as possible.
- Take appropriate action using all available legal authorities, including the Defense Production Act, to fill shortfalls.

Demand For COVID-19 Vaccine Crashes Riverside County System

- Residents were allowed to sign up at noon Thursday to receive one of 3,900 COVID-19 vaccine doses to be administered at a series of county-run clinics, but all appointments were quickly taken.
- During the sign-up process, the county's website crashed multiple times due to the number of people attempting to book appointments. Patch heard from dozens of disappointed community members who tried for hours to log onto the county site, only to learn that all appointments were filled.
- "Residents are understandably frustrated that the appointment website did not perform today," said Juan C. Perez, Interim County Executive Officer. "While we worked with our vendor to ensure it would be operational today, unfortunately, it was not. Frankly, that's unacceptable. We apologize for this unfortunate situation and will soon direct residents to a new website."
- A new link will be announced soon for residents to sign up for COVID-19 vaccinations.

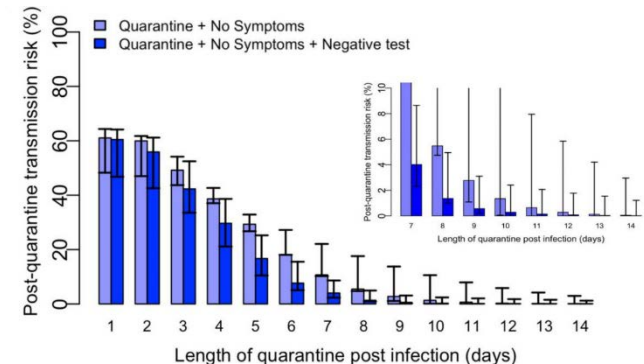
The nation's food supply chain is showing signs of strain, as increasing numbers of workers are falling ill with the coronavirus in meat processing plants, warehouses, and grocery stores.

Options to Reduce Quarantine for Contacts of Persons with SARS-CoV-2 Infection Using Symptom Monitoring and Diagnostic Testing

Local public health authorities determine and establish the quarantine options for their jurisdictions. CDC currently recommends a quarantine period of 14 days. However, based on local circumstances and resources, the following options to shorten quarantine are acceptable alternatives.

- Quarantine can end after Day 10 without testing and if no symptoms have been reported during daily monitoring.
 - With this strategy, residual post-quarantine transmission risk is estimated to be about 1% with an upper limit of about 10%.
- When diagnostic testing resources are sufficient and available (see bullet 3, below), then quarantine can end after Day 7 if a diagnostic specimen tests negative and if no symptoms were reported during daily monitoring. The specimen may be collected and tested within 48 hours before the time of planned quarantine discontinuation (e.g., in anticipation of testing delays), but quarantine cannot be discontinued earlier than after Day 7.
 - With this strategy, the residual post-quarantine transmission risk is estimated to be about 5% with an upper limit of about 12%.

In both cases, additional criteria (e.g., continued symptom monitoring and masking through Day 14) must be met and are outlined in the full text. - <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/more/scientific-brief-options-to-reduce-quarantine.html>

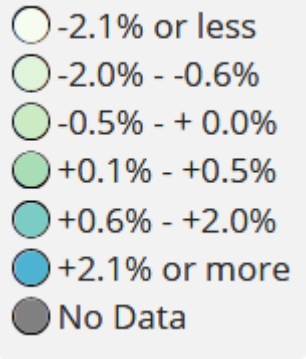
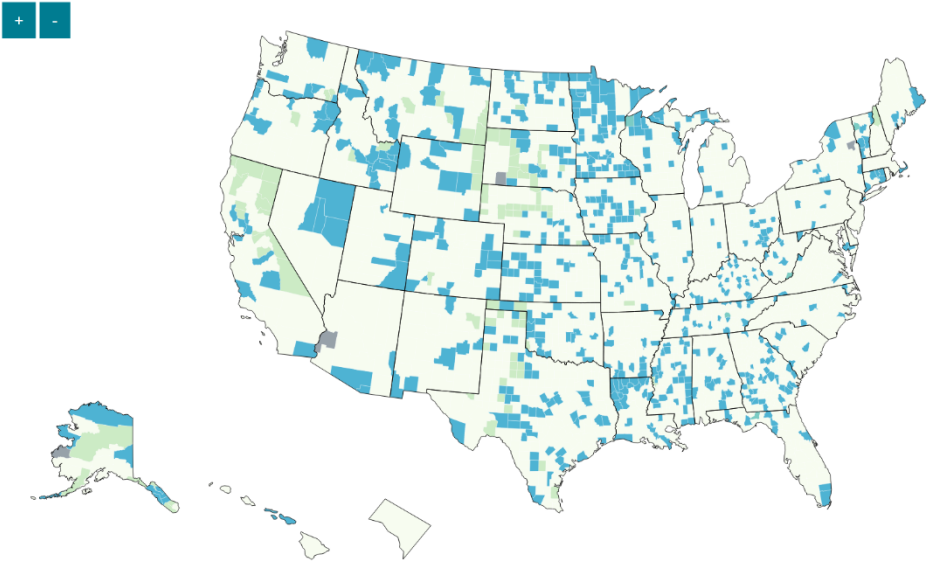

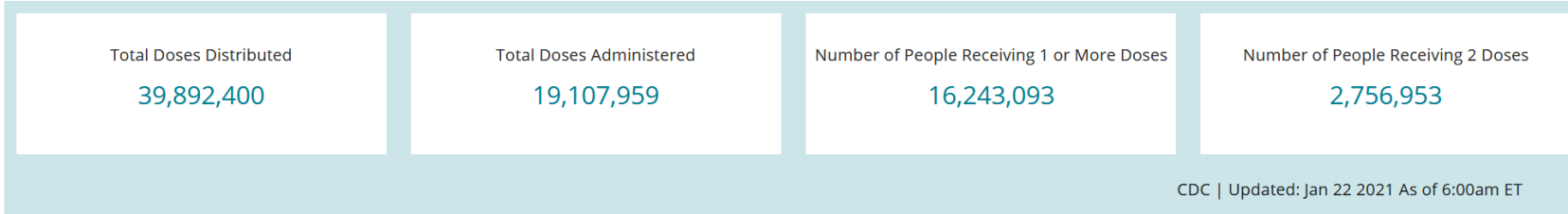

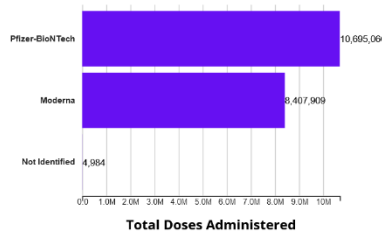

U.S. COVID-19 Vaccine Administration by Vaccine Type



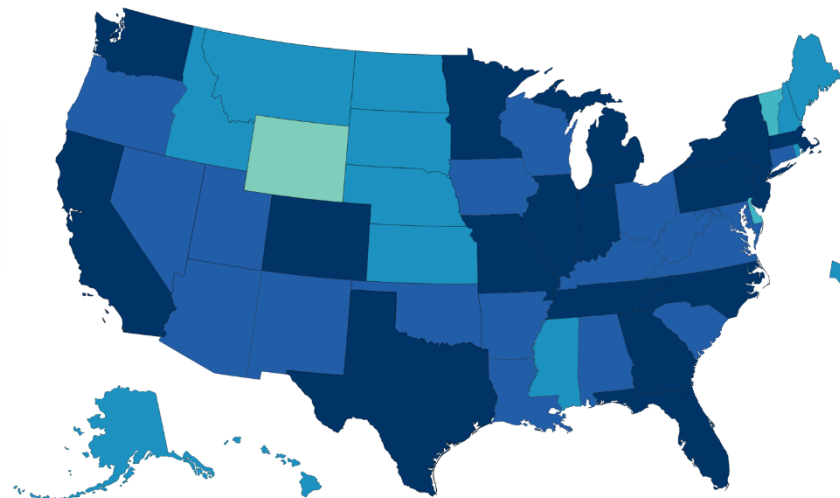

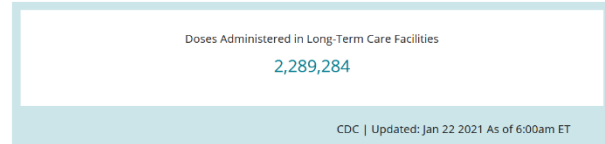

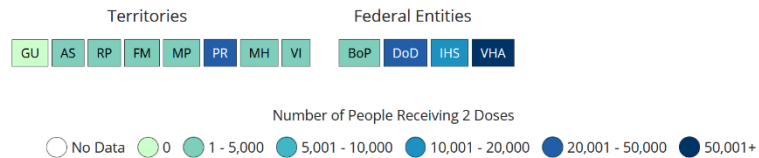


Federal Pharmacy Partnership for Long-Term Care Program (Subset of Overall Numbers)

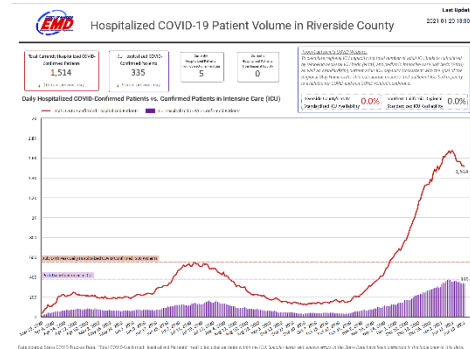

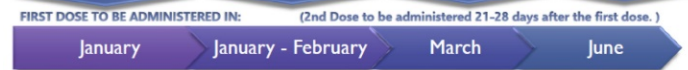

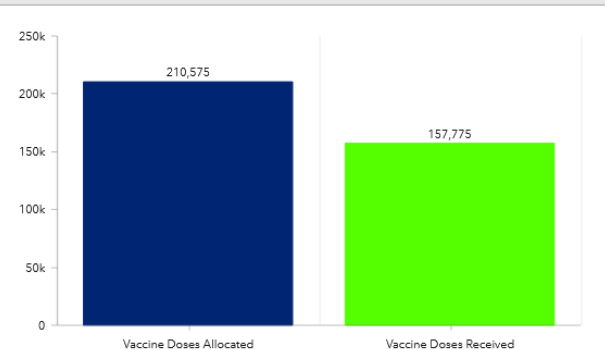

Highlights for 2 storms

January 22 to 26, 2020



Active cold weather pattern aims at Socal with widespread precipitation late Friday into Saturday, and again early next week Monday and Tuesday

Heavy snow in the mountains each storm but storm 2 is much stronger and colder with snow levels down to 3000 feet –

(storm 1: 1 to 5 inches and storm 2: 4 to 10 inches for mountain communities)

Rainfall is widespread but heaviest in San Diego County

(Storm 1 – 0.25 to 0.75 inches and Storm 2 - 1 to 2 inches most cities)

Storm 2 rainfall is heavier rates (but colder storm) so urban flooding possible

Each storm is preceded by southwest winds – strongest on Monday with gusts to 50 mph in the passes and ridges

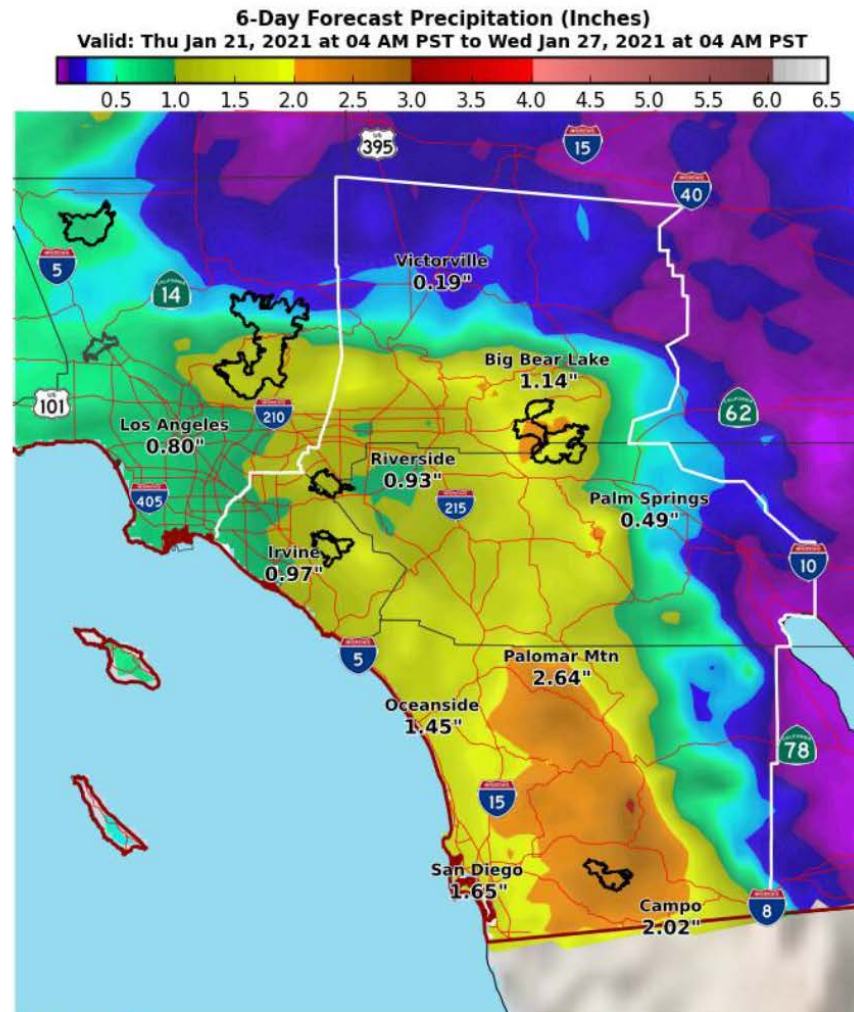
