### **California adopts CDC’s recommendation to reduce social distancing in school to 3 feet**

- In alignment with new federal guidance, Gov. Gavin Newsom and the California Department of Public Health have halved the minimum social distancing requirement in schools from 6 feet to 3 feet.
- The change may enable many school districts to resume full-day, in-person instruction before the end of this school year, instead of having to remain in full distance learning or resorting to a hybrid model, with fewer students at one time attending fewer hours per week, because of distancing constraints.
- The revisions, which will also enable middle and high schools in counties with high rates of Covid infection to reopen sooner, should help resolve a lawsuit that parent groups from six school districts in San Diego County filed against the state and their districts. The lawsuit charged that state public health officials failed to provide a scientific rationale behind stricter reopening rules. Last week San Diego County Superior Court Judge Cynthia Freeland agreed and [issued a temporary injunction](#) against the state, pending a hearing on April 1.
- The California Department of Public Health’s revised guideline is simpler: 3 feet social distancing is “strongly recommended” but not required, as long as other safety measures are in place and enforced. These include requiring students and staff to wear masks, install proper ventilation and have contact tracing and virus detection protocols in place. Covid vaccinations also must be offered to all school staff before the reopening of schools. Social distancing will increase during lunch and breakfast to 6 feet, under the new state guidelines.

### **School Reopening Guidance Updates as of 03/20/2021**

- The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) developed the following framework to support school communities as they decide when and how to implement in-person instruction for K-12 Schools in the 2020-2021 school year.
- Updated March 20, 2021 to reflect reopening guidance changes under "Criteria to Reopen for In-Person Instruction" and COVID-19 Safety Plan (CSP) Posting and Submission Requirements for In-person Instruction" and to reflect physical distancing guidance under "Classroom Space."
- Layers of Safety: Infection Mitigation Strategies
  - Face coverings.
  - Stable groups.
  - Physical distancing.
  - Adequate ventilation.
  - Hand hygiene.
  - Symptom and close contact exposure screening, with exclusion from school for staff or students with symptoms or with confirmed close contact.
  - Surveillance or screening testing.

### **Junior Lifeguard Program Reopening In Los Angeles County**

- The 2021 Junior Lifeguard program is back and heading to the beach this summer following a hiatus due to the pandemic.
- "With the approval and support of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, the Los Angeles County Fire Department (LACoFD) plans to safely reopen a modified version of its Junior Lifeguard Program (JLP) this summer," the Los Angeles County Fire Department announced Tuesday.
- The program is for Los Angeles County kids ages 9 through 17. It's designed to help youth develop beach and ocean skills, providing instruction in water safety, swimming, body surfing, surfing, physical conditioning, competition skills, first aid, lifesaving rescue techniques, CPR, and how to use professional, lifesaving equipment.

### **California's Special-Needs Children Still Seek Help After Year Adrift**

- Many parents report that their special-needs students have gone backward in development during the pandemic-isolating past year.
- Many of those students — whose disabilities can range from autism to deafness, and most of whom have gone more than a year without in-person services such as speech therapy — appear to have regressed physically and academically.
- "No one is publicly saying, 'Hey guys, all hands on deck, we need to rally around these kids, we can't let them fail,'" said Lisa Mosko, director of advocacy for special education and education for Speak Up, a Los Angeles-based parent advocacy group.
- When the pandemic hit, experts warned that many services and activities critical for the development of special-needs students would simply not work well online. Those with learning or physical disabilities benefit most when they are socializing with classmates and teachers in person, they said.
- Now, advocates and parents say drastic efforts are necessary to curb the lost learning and development. They're calling for widespread screening and assessments of struggling students with disabilities that might have gone undiagnosed this year. And they want an immediate return to school, in person.

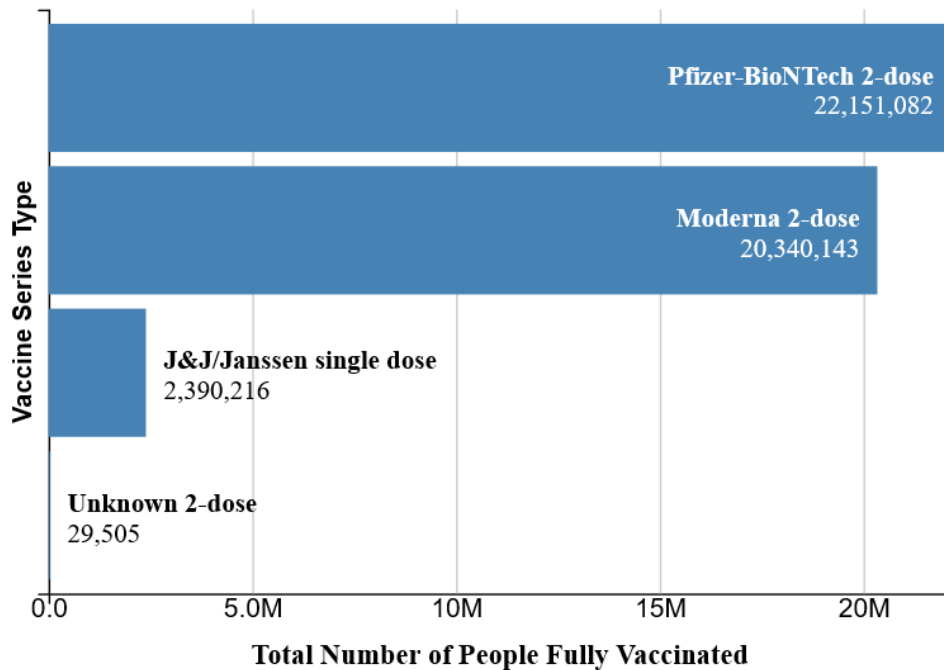

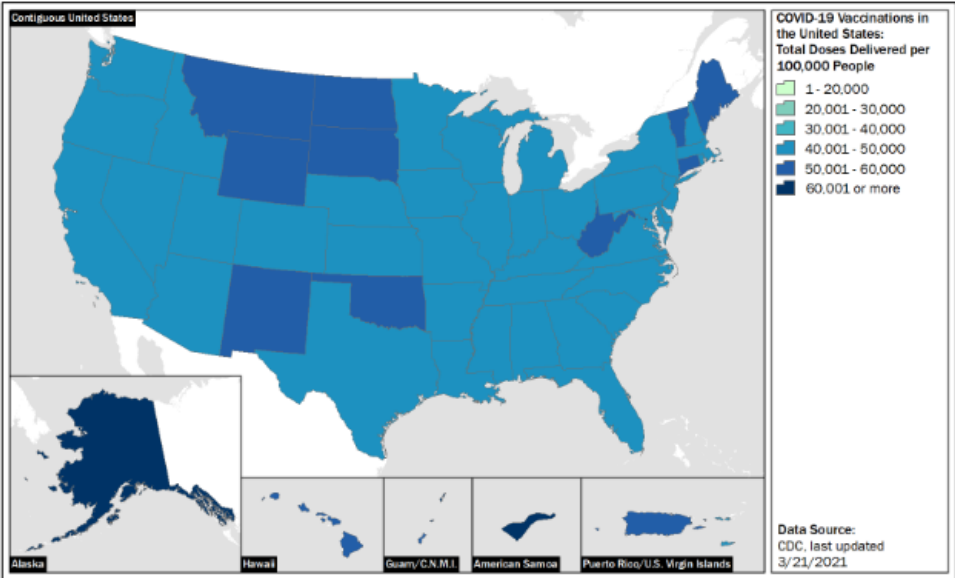
**Number of People Fully Vaccinated in the U.S. by COVID-19 Vaccine Series Type**

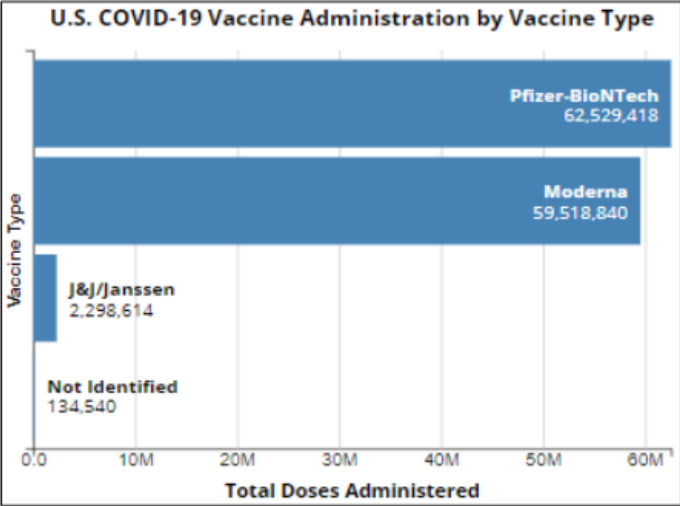

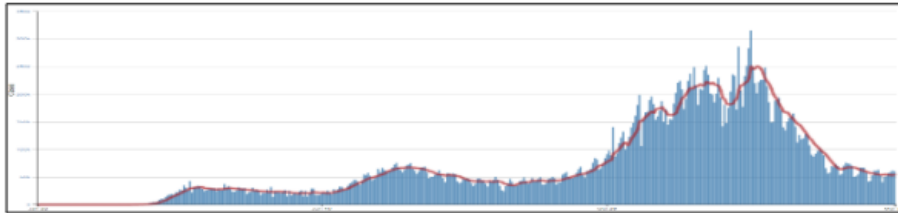

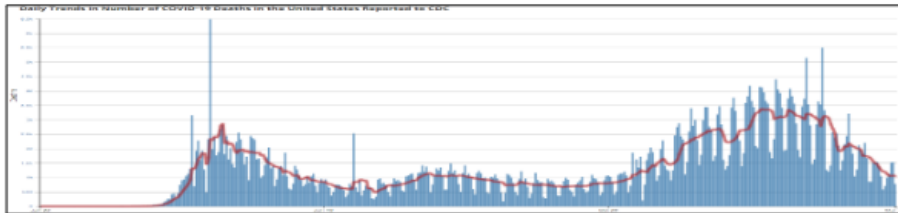

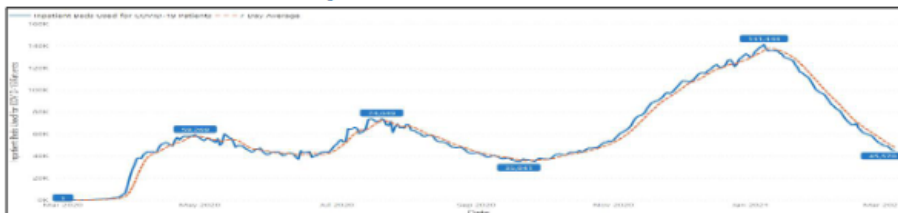
# COVID-19 Weekly Update *(CDC data, as of March 21)*



Daily Trends of COVID-19 Cases



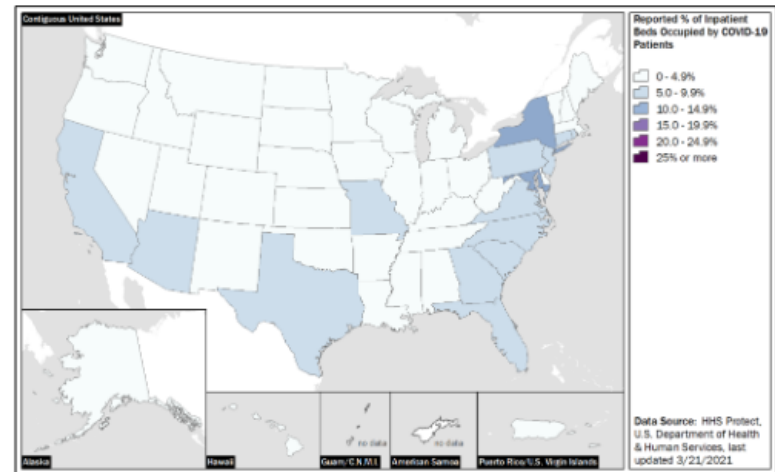
Daily Trends of COVID-19 Deaths

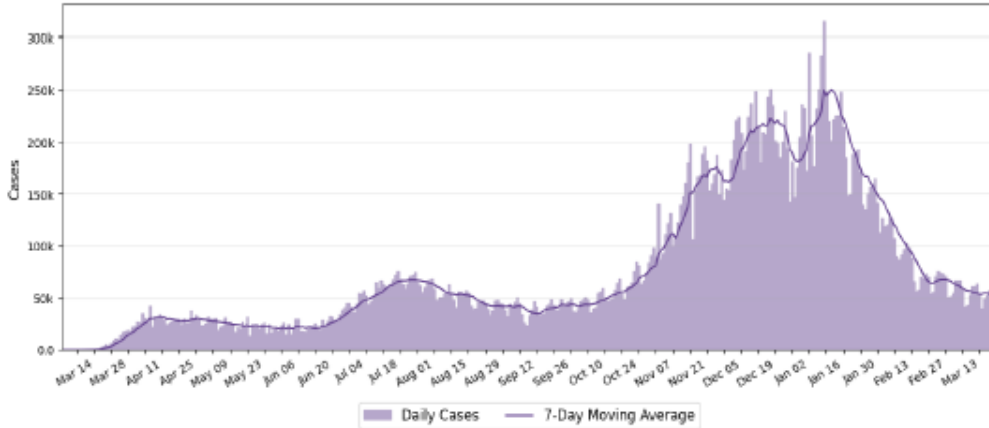

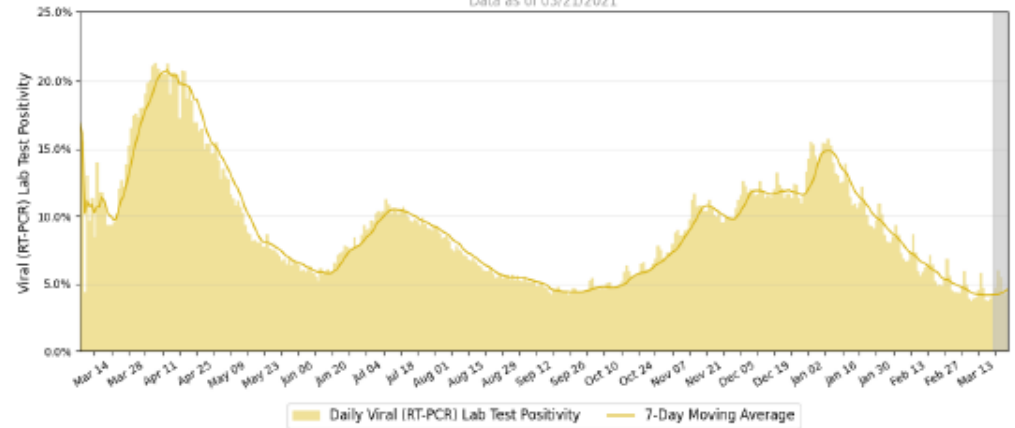

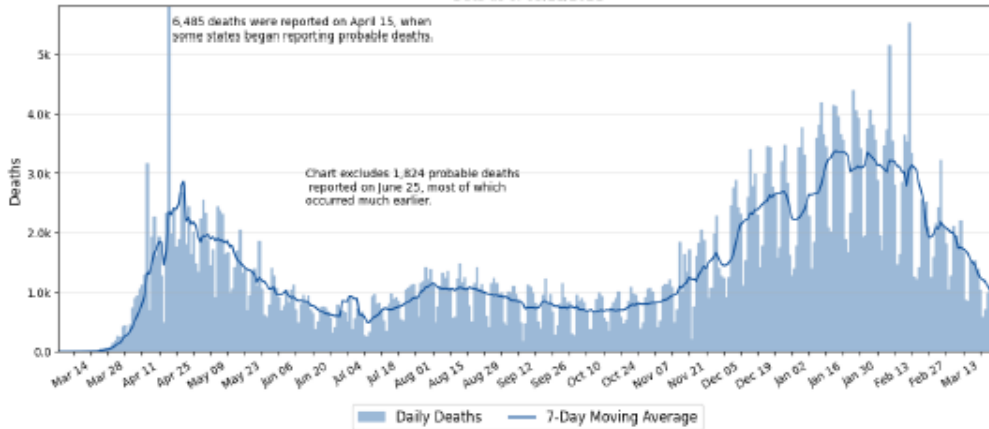

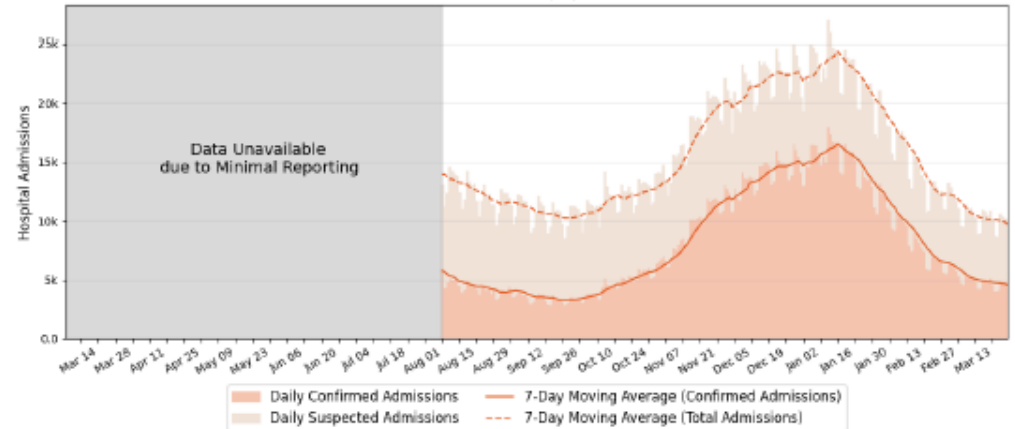

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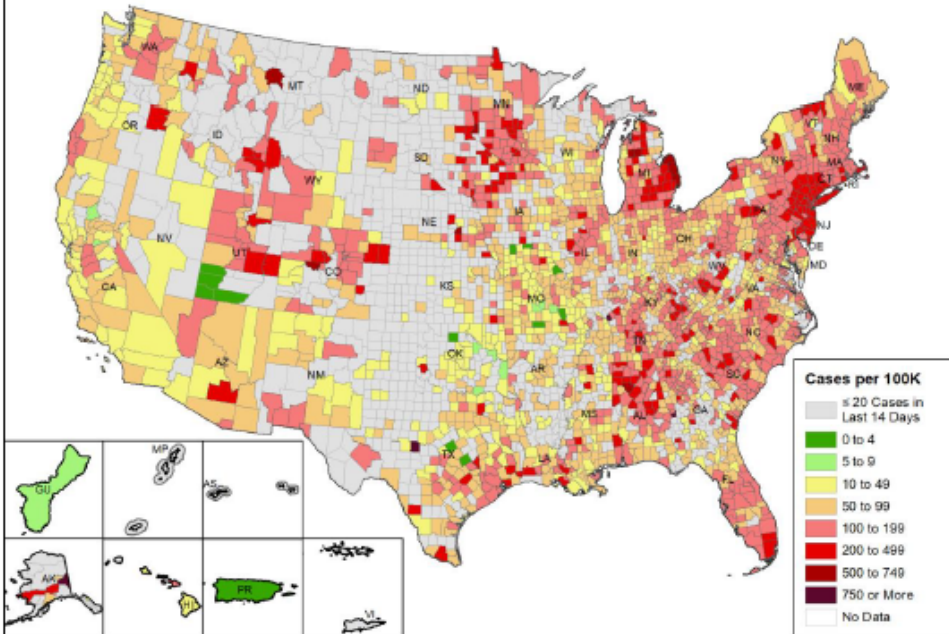

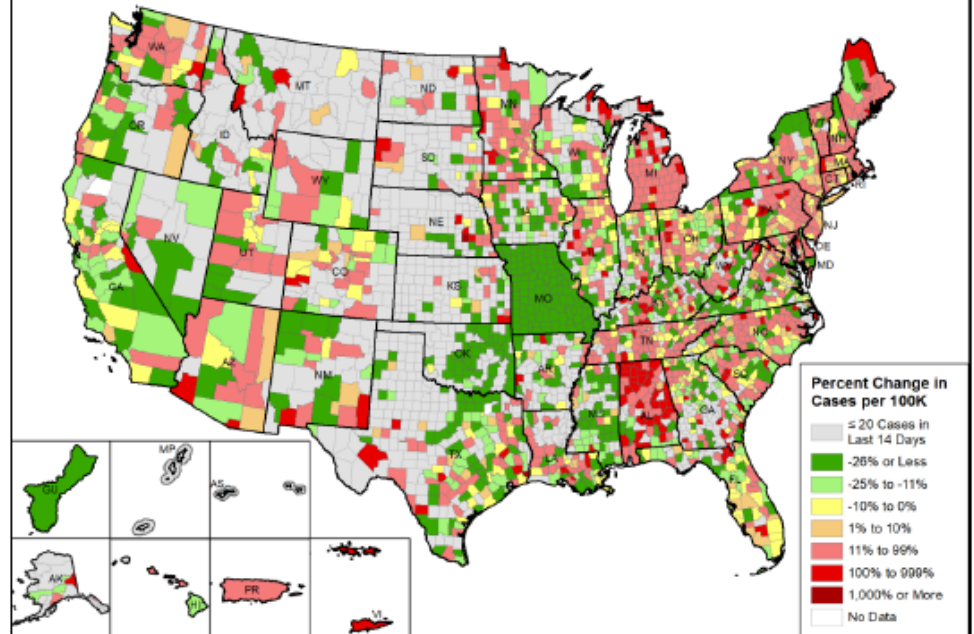

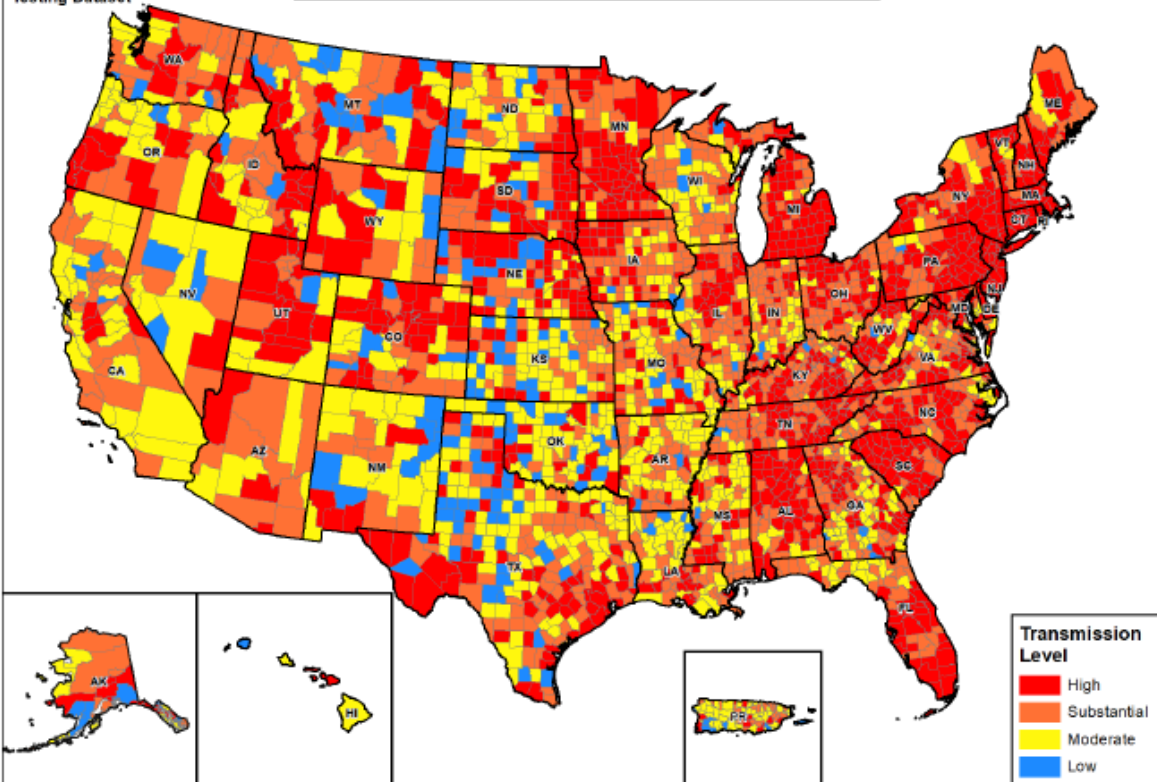

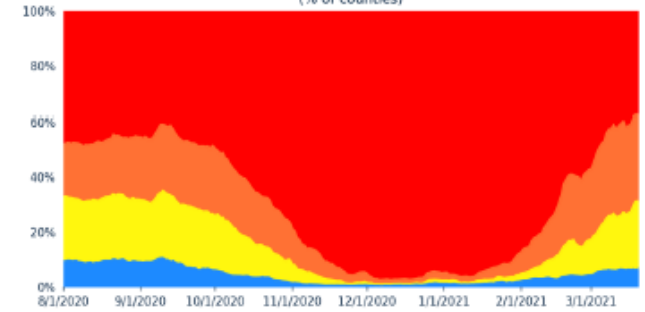

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# TRENDS IN VIRAL (RT-PCR) LAB TEST POSITIVITY BY AGE GROUP AND REGION

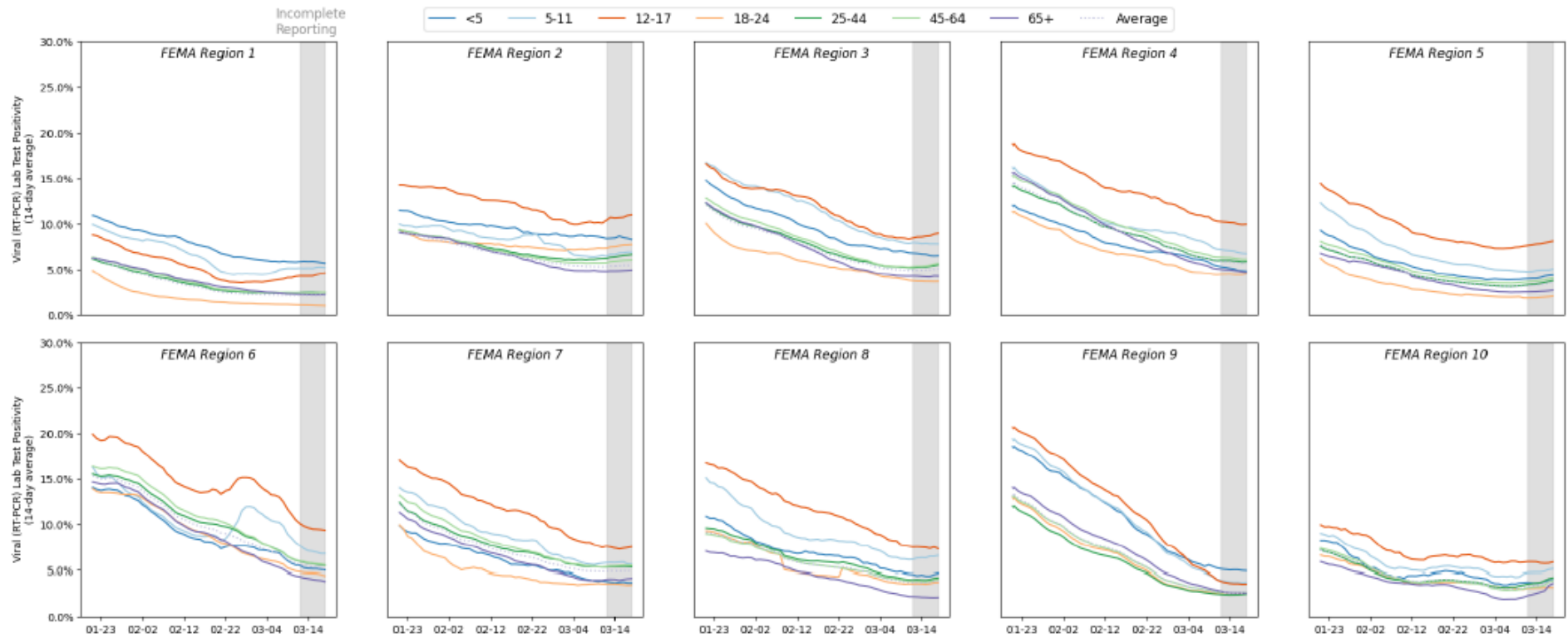

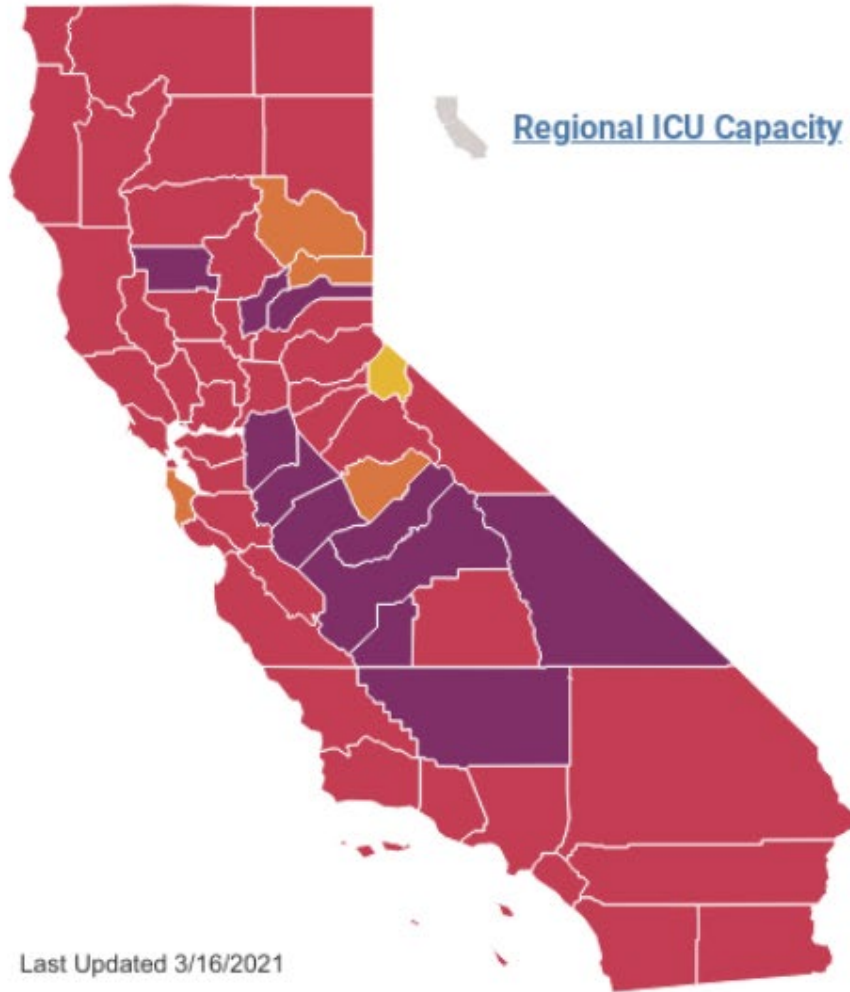
